PUBLIC SCALES ARE CONDEMNED

NEW SCALES MUST BE INSTALLED SAYS STATE MAN TUESDAY

Weighing heavy loads became a real problem in Cross Plains this week when all but one large weighing device was closed down by a representative of the state department of weights and measures. The public scales, closed last week, remain condemned. The scales at Bond Gin Company are serviceable, however, and most large loads were weighed there yesterday. Scales at the Planters Gin Company are to be repaired within the next few days, the Review was told yesterday by E. I. Vestal, manager.

Unable to weigh at the public scales many loads of peanuts were weighed by buyers and sellers on small platform scales—capacity of which is less than 1,000 pounds. I. E. Loving, public weigher, said in an interview yesterday that new 22 foot 10 ton scales—the type needed to handle the bulk of business here—would cost in the neighborhood of \$750. Recent repairs on the old scales, he declared had proved dissatisfactory with the weights and measures department. A committee of Jesse McAdams, George R. Neel and E. M. Howard, was appointed from the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday to investigate the public weighing situation and recommend ways and means of removing the irregularity. It was understood yesterday that plans for forming a local company to purchase scales was being considered, however, nothing definite had been decided upon at publication time Thursday.

Despite the difficulty in weighing Cross Plains remained this week one of the most active peanut markets in this section with several thousand bushels being sold here. Three local buyers are bidding for the crop and Cross Plains prices are reported comparing favorably with other Texas markets.

CHARLIE BAIRD GIN DESTROYED BY FIRE THURSDAY MORNING

Fire of undetermined origin totally destroyed the C. D. Baird gin, six miles west of Cross Plains, about seven o'clock Thursday morning. The loss of several thousands of dollars was only partially covered by insurance.

The blaze was first noticed by Carl Klints, nearby farmer, who walked into the building to settle for some ginning done yesterday. Observing the blaze about the process, he shouted "Fire!" All gin hands immediately started to combat the blaze, and Cross Plains fire department was summoned. When firemen arrived, however, the blaze had gained sufficient headway that it was impossible to save the gin. Connecting a truck pump to a nearby swimming pool, firemen were able to save a granary and quite bit of feed.

A bale of cotton owned by N. L. Long was being ginned at the time the fire broke out.

Exact amount of the loss was not immediately learned.

HERD'S LAST HOME GAME WITH COLEMAN HERE FRIDAY NIGHT

What promises to be the most interesting game on Cross Plains' 1938 schedule will be played here Friday night when Coleman Bluecats invade Williams Field for a conference conflict with coach Bill White's hard running Buffaloes.

The game will be the last on Cross Plains' home schedule. The remaining two contests with Winters and Rising Star are both to be played on enemy soil.

Smarting under the knowledge that a Coleman team hasn't defeated Cross Plains in 11 years, several hundred fans are expected to accompany the Bluecats here for what they believe will be a "turn of tables".

Comparative scores indicate Cross Plains and Coleman are of about equal strength, notwithstanding the fact that the Bluecats have improved sensationally within the past month. Coleman defeated Moeslie 42 to nothing, while Cross Plains trounced the same team 39 to zero. Coleman lost to Brady 13 to nothing, and Cross Plains was defeated by the same upset last week by Winters 14 to six, while Cross Plains has yet to meet the Blizzards.

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"
BY JAMES V. ALLRED
Governor of Texas

As I write this column the special session has been over two days. I regret exceedingly the unfortunate outcome of the thirty-day session of the legislature. The sad and pitiful part of it is that nothing was done to help the needy people, the blind and our underprivileged children—notwithstanding repeated exhortations and warnings. Not only that, but Texas will lose several million dollars of federal funds to carry on this program.

The people are confused and ignorant over the outcome. Certain people such as the representatives of special interests apparently are well contented with the report brought me at the close of the Legislature by the Senate notification committee, which advised me rather fully they "had done their work."

The question uppermost in the minds of the people however, is who, or what, is to blame for the lamentable conditions resulting in the failure to provide funds for the social security program? Conflicting statements have been heard since the session by certain legislators and house members. Some of the people are unable to fix any responsibility. Why?

The present two-house system of the Legislature is made to order by shrewd parliamentarians. It is not the first session to end in each house blaming the other. The difference is that with the changing and complex problems of our times this condition has become worse. Not all the members of either house are to be commended; yet, the good, the patriotic and diligent, the sincere members find themselves condemned by reactionaries and demagogues.

Lawyers will tell you that delay of time are the greatest aids to man charged with crime. Delay of time are likewise the most powerful weapons that can be employed to defeat progressive legislation. Under our present legislative system these weapons are readily available and freely employed. During the past session the people witnessed a strange situation. The special session was called for the purpose of raising revenue for the needy. A powerful group declared no taxes necessary and employed every device possible to defeat the purpose of the session. Certain newspapers criticized the call and added no taxes.

It was that the session had ended and that the spokesmen for the minority group and for the newspapers criticize the legislature for not passing a tax bill. The very thing they said should be done. Shall we have more to say later when this session.

The untimely death of Judge O. W. Moore shocked the entire state. The beloved judge had spent with outstanding distinction many years. Friends and close relatives as well as admirers from all parts of the state, testified to the high esteem in which Judge Moore was held as they gathered to pay final tribute to a distinguished son of Texas. With appointment of his successor, I chose Harry N. Graves, Georgetown who resigned from the legislature to accept the judge-
