

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



One of the saddest words in the English language is the word "LOST". In the temporal realm we consider it a tragedy for a small child to be lcst. Those interested in earthly fortunes have killed themselves when a million dollars has been lost in their business. It deeply grieves many of us when we lose something of sentimental value. But, friend, if these illustrations convey sorrow they cannot compare with the emptiness that shall be ours in Judgment if our soul is forever lost! Our Lord once asked a penetrating question:




