## ELECTIONS SET SATURDAY, TUESDAY

### 10 CANDIDATES FOR FIVE CITY PLACES; 3 UP FOR TRUSTEES

Voters of this school district go to the polls Saturday to choose two trustees for three year terms. Then Tuesday two elections are to be held here; one is to name four aldermen and a mayor to serve the city for two year tenures, and the other is a vote on beer for Callahan county and also for this justice precinct which comprises Cross Plains, Dressy and Caddo Peak.

Three candidates will be in the running for the school trustee places. They are E. I. Vestal, C. W. Kemper and Ben Atwood. Only two are to be elected.

Candidates for city aldermen, four of whom are to be elected are: B. A. Pierce, R. E. Wilson, H. C. Freeman, T. E. Baum, C. W. Kemper, C. R. Cook, J. A. Caton and Martin Neeb. Candidates for Mayor are C. S. Martin and T. D. Little. The city election will be held at the offices, next door to J. L. Settle tailor shop.

Probably most interest is centered about the beer vote for both the county and this justice precinct Tuesday.

Should the county vote dry, this precinct would remain dry, regardless of the outcome of the local option question. However, if the county votes wet, this precinct will be declared wet or dry, according to the verdict.

### F.S.A. Borrowers To Dig 50 Trench Silos In County This Year

Approximately 50 trench silos will be constructed in Callahan County by Farm Security Administration borrowers, according to J. S. McKnight, rural supervisor for FSA. These silos, which require no investment except labor to dig the trench, will preserve the fodder of corn and corn sorghum which otherwise lose much of their feeding value. They will also supply dairy cows with the green stuff through winter months or drought. The trench silo campaign is expected to be one of the chief factors in helping FSA borrowers to a system of farming more profitable than that which forced them to seek FSA assistance, the supervisor said.

The tenant farmer takes a more active interest in the land which he is renting when he begins to make improvements of this kind, Mr. McKnight said. FSA is seeking to promote longer terms for lease agreements in order that tenants will feel justified in making such improvements, which they would not make if faced with the likelihood of being forced to move at the end of each year.

### 2 INCHES MOISTURE ABSORBED BY EARTH DUE TO SLOW FALL

Along with most of West Texas, the Cross Plains trade territory was visited by opportune showers and moisture over the week-end. The total precipitation was reported slightly less than two inches.

The rain was received jubilantly by farmers, stockmen and ranchmen, as March winds had dried out top soil and small grain and pasture were beginning to suffer. The moisture came slowly, being absorbed as it fell, greatly benefitting all vegetation.

Low overhanging clouds began dangerously low are not adequate to last through the Summer. Practically no streams in this section ran during the week-end. A few tanks, mostly those with large watersheds, filled up some.

Greatly revived and giving promise of a bumper yield is one of the greatest grain acreages ever planted in this immediate vicinity. Barring insects, hail and wind damage, and rust, a bumper crop is virtually assured, the Review is told.

Years of blindness ended for J. K. Gafford, 86, well known Cross Plains citizen shortly after two o'clock Tuesday afternoon when an attack of pneumonia ended his long and eventful life. Funeral services were conducted from the Cross Plains Methodist church, with Revs. S. P. Collins and Floyd W. Thrash officiating. Interment was made in the family plot of the local cemetery.

Deprived of his sight for the past five or six years, Mr. Gafford had been in declining health for a long time.

Mr. Gafford was born in Mississippi, July third, 1851. He came to Texas in early manhood settling near Cross Plains. In later years, however, he moved to Cross Plains, and resided in the East part of town on highway 206. It was at his home that he died Tuesday afternoon.

### Devises New Plan For English Instruction Cross Plains Girl Teaching At Big Spring

Creating a mild sensation among West Texas English teachers is a plan recently employed by Miss Eloise Haley, former Cross Plains teacher and the groom's mother, in the instruction of her classes in Big Spring high school.

In reporting the item the Big Spring Daily Herald had the following to say of the new plan in the Sunday morning edition.

"Radio has been used to bring the rarest music and drama to the barest cabin in Arkansas—it has brought incalculable joy to shut-ins—waited freights chairs across the nation and over the seas—it has brought news of floods, fires and other major disasters to your own cozy cottage in an incredibly short time—it has employed thousands and added millions to the income tax of screen stars—and now it brings a new slant on the old fundamentals of English to Big Spring high school seniors.

"Beginning Monday, for the first time in the annals of local high school English, a seven weeks course is to be inaugurated employing the radio as a means of teaching grammar, pronunciation and literary appreciation. Miss Eloise Haley, promoter of the idea and instructor of the new class, says the course is being offered with the hopes of stimulating interest in the essentials of good English.

"After a study of the fundamentals of radio, the group will take scenes from various plays, adapt them to a script and broadcast over KBBT at regular intervals. Later on, Miss Haley says they will write original radio scripts for broadcast and it is possible that the innova-

tion team was late in getting started with workouts, and consequently is hardly up to average strength. Most entries in senior boys athletics were also basketball players and have had about half enough time to prepare for the track meet, says coach Beans Morris.

Martin Van Buren Harlow, 82, died at his home in the South part of town here Wednesday morning after an illness of several days. Funeral services were to be conducted from the Cross Plains Church of Christ Thursday afternoon. Interment was to be made in the local cemetery with ceremonies in charge of the local LODGE lodge, of which the deceased was a member.

Born in Illinois, February fifth, 1856, Mr. Harlow came to Texas early in life. He settled in Cross Plains before the turn of the century and for a number of years was closely identified with the upbuilding of this section being an early day grain merchant and a director in the Bank of Cross Plains, the first financial institution to do business here.

Although ill for a short while, Mr. Harlow's condition grew steadily worse and members of the family and friends who had been at the bedside for days knew there was no hope for his recovery.

Survivors include a host of relatives and friends throughout this section of Texas.

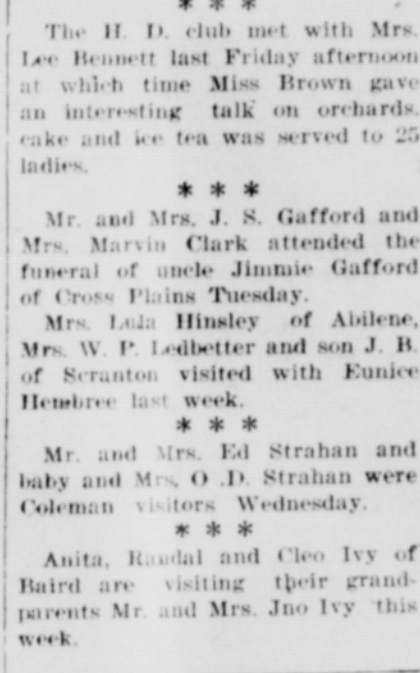
