TRUSTEES LEASE 11 ACRE SCHOOL TRACT THIS WEEK

After being shut down two days and a half because of a water shortage, work was resumed Tuesday at noon on the Phillips Petroleum Company's 4000 feet test on the Cozart farm, two miles Northwest of Scranton. Drilling was going forward at a depth of 300 feet yesterday.

To secure ample water with which to drill a line was laid to a spring about a mile Northwest of the well. Drillers told a representative of this newspaper Wednesday morning that they believed the spring would furnish an ample supply and that further shut-downs would be unnecessary.

With most acreage in the vicinity of the well tied up, that which is available is commanding good offers. A 11 acre tract on the school campus was leased this week by the Scranton board of trustees for \$25.00 an acre. The tract is more than a mile from the well. Only a few small tracts are said to be yet unleased.

PIONEER DEFEATED 37 TO 0 BY OLDEN FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Pioneer high school Panthers suffered their first conference setback Friday afternoon when they were overwhelmed 37 to nothing by the powerful Olden Hornets.

The lighter Pioneer team battled the visitors on comparatively even terms through the first quarter, but the weight advantage and the Panthers lack of reserve material proved disastrous as the contest grew older.

Olden scored late in the first quarter but the counter was due only to a costly break. Quits Tax Post

A political feud which Cross Plains voters heard aired in last year's primaries was revived this week when Congressman Clyde L. Garrett and Thomas L. Blanton met in an Abilene courtroom, as counsel and witness.

Blanton appearing as his own counsel in his suit for damages alleging slander against Garrett and J. W. Cockrill of Eastland, called Judge Garrett as the first witness in a hearing in 42nd district court on the defendants' plea of privilege. Defendants sought to have the suit transferred to Eastland county, their home, for trial.

Judge Blanton, who had represented this, the 17th congressional district nearly 20 years in all, was defeated for re-election last year by Mr. Garrett. Mr. Cockrill, former Gorman newspaper publisher, is now Garrett's secretary.

Mr. Blanton seeks damages totaling \$100,000. In the plaintiff's petition, 54 pages long, which was read to the jury Monday afternoon by Thomas L. Blanton, Jr., of Albany, counsel for his father, were listed numerous allegations connected with last year's congressional campaign.

For an hour and a half before Judge Milburn S. Long recessed the hearing, Congressman Garrett, questioned by the man he defeated and who, before going to congress, presided eight years as judge of the court in which the hearing is being held.

First subject brought into the questioning by Mr. Blanton was a picture printed in a copy of the Gorman Progress when it was published early last year by the codefendant, J. W. Cockrill. It showed Mr. Garrett walking down the steps of the national capitol. After a series of objections to questions and comments of counsel thereon, Mr. Garrett said he did not send the picture to the Gorman paper.

Asked how that paper got it, the witness said, "I disremember the man's name with the United Press who had the picture made and prepared mats. I knew it was to be sent to that paper. It was sent to many others and was printed in others."

TOM PAYNE DIES AT HOME HERE FRIDAY

Thomas M. Payne, 61, who died at his home Northeast of town Friday was laid to final rest in the Cottonwood cemetery Saturday afternoon. Services were conducted by the Rev. Ross Reesop, Baptist minister.

Mr. Payne had been in declining health for sometime. Death resulted from a heart complication, the Review was told.

Among the survivors are two brothers and three sisters. Funeral arrangements were in charge of Higginbothams, Cross Plains.

3 YEARS OLD CHILD KILLED IN STREET WRECK HERE FRIDAY

A three year old child was instantly killed and the mother seriously cut about the neck, when a car occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Howard and their two children, of Texon, crashed into a Main Street lightpost here shortly after one o'clock Friday morning.

The Howard's were enroute to Rising Star to be at the bedside of her father who had suffered a stroke of paralysis several days before.

The child, Ann Howard, 3, was riding in the mother's lap. Impact from the crash threw her into the windshield cutting the mother's neck and killing the child instantly. Neither Mr. Howard nor the other child were seriously injured.

Physicians administered unto Mrs. Howard here before rushing her on to a Gorman hospital.

The post struck was the furthermost South on Main Street. City officials have removed the light standard from the middle of the street. Several local people, as well as a number of transients have crashed into the structure in recent years. Injured at the same place last year were Mr. and Mrs. A. H. McLeod, of this city.

Sentiment was running high here this week to have all light standards removed from the center of Main Street and placed on the sides.

SANTA ANNA GAME UNDER ARCS AT 8 O'CLOCK TONIGHT

Cross Plains high school Buffaloes will christen their newly lighted football field Friday night at eight o'clock when they meet the powerful Santa Anna Mountaineers in the second hurdle of their district 25-B championship campaign.

20 fans met in the home economics building Saturday night at 9:30 and decided to erect a class A high school—K.W.—lighted field in time for the Santa Anna game Friday night. It was also decided at the meeting to construct additional seats. The entire program called for a cash outlay of \$1,400.00.

It was agreed that shares of stock should be issued for every \$10 subscription and that all proceeds from home games in excess of \$400—the amount taken in last year—should go to the retiring of stock and paying back of subscribers.

Fireboys Help

Fire Chief J. L. Settle quickened enthusiasm with the announcement that the local fire department had just met and voted unanimously to donate \$200.00 to the fund, and wished no stock in return.

With only \$1,200.00 more needed, the 20 men were divided into two sides, each team charged with the responsibility of raising \$900.00 by Friday night at 7:30. At noon Monday, however, a check-up was made and it was found that the amount had been oversubscribed. Additional subscriptions continue to trickle in and at the meeting Tuesday night the fund was reported to have reached \$1,747.50.

An athletic council was elected Tuesday night to have supervision of funds subscribed, to oversee any further construction that may be undertaken, to issue stock to subscribers and to begin as soon as possible making remittances on the stock retirement. It was pointed out yesterday by F. V. Tunnell, member of the council, that all funds not spent will be used in reimbursing share holders pro rata.

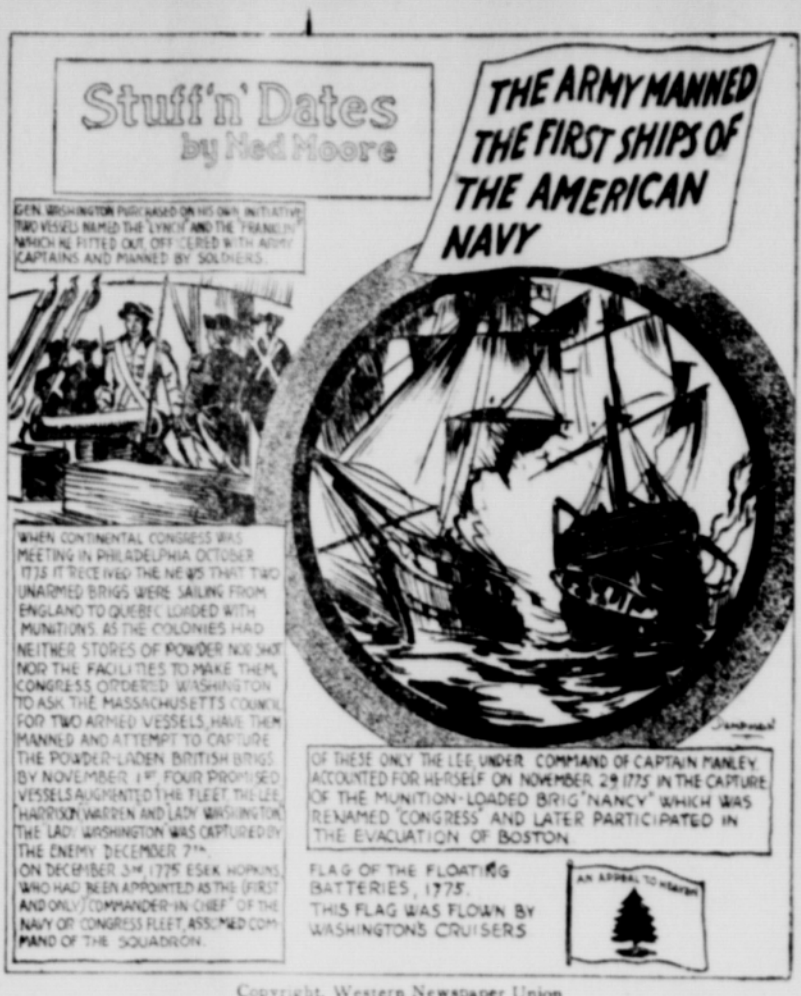

Announce Rules For Annual F. F. A. Stock Show To Be Held In Spring

F. F. A. Underwood, F.F.A. advisor... announce rules for annual stock show to be held here in the Spring.

1. A contestant is entitled to enter not more than two heifers in the Dairy Calf Show. He or she may show either heifer calves or Junior heifer calves.

2. Contestants in the Baby Beef Show may exhibit the same animal as an individual in the group of three.

3. Grand champion will be selected from champions of single classes.

1. A contestant is entitled to enter only two lambs in the Lamb Show. Wethers only may be shown. Note: Base date January 1, 1937, and lambs must still be carrying milk teeth at time of show.

2. Each contestant shall keep complete record of the feed and weights and gain during period. These records shall be available on date of the contest.
