Improvement Being Made On City Gas System

Both At The Wells And In The City Limits

Statement From **Municipal Gas** Office

Less than three years ago, Cross Plains citizens were paying 75 cents per thousand cubic feet for their gas. The citizens feeling that this price was too high, called an election and voted 20,000 dollars bonds to build a gas system. For some reason those bonds were never issued and sold. Later the city council put in a municipal gas system without placing any bonded indebtedness against the city. This system is now complete and paid for, and is the property of the city. The approximate cost of this system has been \$10,000. It is constructed with high and low pressure lines running through the city with all connection on the low pressure lines thus safeguarding customers from accidents from explosions etc. The pressure in the low pressure lines is regulated by several systems of regulators which will give an even and constant flow of gas if furnished at the city gate at proper pressure. The only difficulty so far in the system has been the pressure at the city gate.

The cost of gas has been reduced approximately one half. This saving amounts to more than the city tax. There are some earnings at the present rate. These earnings will enable the city to make other improvements for the citizens benefit. When you use gas from the municipal system you are but adding to your own property and making it possible to add further improvements.

The new owners of the gas supply system have already shown their interest in serving the community by making further improvements, which will add much to efficiency in a constant

Statement From The Holden Company

A deal has been definitely closed whereby T. S. Holden and Company, of Cross Plains, became owner of the supply which furnishes gas for the Municipal System.

Being composed of local people and fully understanding that Cross Plains demands an ample supply at all times, the Holden Company has employed Mr. W. R. (Bill) Lowe, an experienced gas man, to superintend production. They have also started an extensive improvement program which calls for the ironing out of difficulties both at the lease and along the 13 miles of pipe line into the city limits. This work is being done at great expense to give users of the municipal system an inexhaustable supply of gas at the city gate at all tim-

Offices of the Holden Company have been established on the second floor of the Farmers National Bank building, with Mr. Chas. F. Hemphill, secretary, treasurer and stockholder in the company, in charge.

Reports suggest the principal crops (not including cotton) of about 299,000,000 compared with 281, 32, and the 1928-32 average of 296-

Among the cash crops, the most striking change is in the proposed spring wheat acreage of 19% increase above last year and slightly above the 1928-32 average. Winter wheat is below normal, however, so that the crop looks now to be but to 2% above the average.

The intention to plant 8% more

peanuts would mean the largest acreage since the war period.

Farmers' plans for feed crops, if not changed by the new soil-con not changed by the new solrconservation program would indicate about normal plantings. A below average planting of corn is offset by an increase in grain sorghums. The supply will be ample in view of the 5% less-than-average number of livestock. 
