



CISCO, January 24,—Hundreds of visitors thronged the beautiful Victor Hotel here when open house was held upon completion of a program of modernizing at a cost understood to have been around \$75.000 and everyone agreed that no hotel in West Texas is any finer.

But more remarkable than the hotel itself is the story of the new owner. Victor Cornelius, who was struck one day by an idea—and, as a result, he built a nation-wide business and made the fortune which enabled him to acquire a hotel that cost close to half a million dollars to build.

Cornelius was born in a cross-roads community in Limestone County, lived in Coleman County (at Rockwood and Santa Anna), then in 1913 went with his parents to Eastland. He observed a man painting a sign, asked where he could buy some brushes, taught himself the art and made his way through high school by sign-painting.

Confederate Army Now Has 31 Left; Nine Live In Texas

When the gray lines finally broke and Lee gave up his sword, the young men of the Confederacy swore they'd retreat to Texas and keep up the fight against the

keep up the fight against the Yankees.

Now, nearly 84 years later, the largest band-of surviving Confederate soldiers is in Texas. But their number is only nine.

A United Press survey showed only 31 survivors of the gray still alive in the states that made up the Confederacy. All of those who fought for the South from Tennessee, Maryland, Kentucky, South Carolina and Delaware have died. Most of the old men who remain are pensioners of the states for which they fought. They average more than 100 years in age. Oldest of them is John Graves of Missouri, who celebrated his 107th birthday on January 1.

The survivors were boys when warfare raged through the South, but most of them saw actual combat duty in 1860-65.

Thousands of widows of Confederate veterans, including many who married Confederate veterans after the turn of this century, still are receiving pensions from the

There are more than 800 Confederate widows in Virginia alone, and Tennessee, with no surviving veterans, lists 432 widows. Ninety-six venerial disease clinics are also in operation throughout the state, and these clinics as well as the rapid treatment centers are primarily for the treatment of indirect and semi-

clinics as well as the rapid treat-ment centers are primarily for the treatment of indignent and semi-indignent persons referred by phy-sicians or local health units. In the past two years a blood testing survey of more than 80,000 Texans has disclosed that between seven and ten per cent of that number had positive tests for



\$200-\$750 VETERANS BONUS SOUGHT BY REP. J. A. BENTON

Sought by reference would draw \$200 to \$750 each as a state bonus under a resolution proposed Monday by Rep. J. A. Benton, retired army officer from Wylle.

Benton estimates his plan, if adopted by the Legislature and the voters, would cost about 300 million dollars. Rep. Jimmy P. Horuny of Archer City has a rival proposition which would allow the state to go into debt 400 million dollars for soldier benefits.

Neither proposal provides a means of financing, but Benton said he would not object to submitting to the voters a tax plan along with the bonus amendment. While Benton is not offering a tax measure, other members have suggested that ex-service benefits be paid by higher taxes upon natural resources or by a general sales tax, or both.

The Benton resolution would provide \$10 for each month of domestic service and \$15 a month for overseas duty during World War II. Prisoners of war would get \$30 a month for time in enemy camps. Ex-prisoners and familles of disabled or deceased veterans could get up to \$750 state payment, but

abled or deceased veterans could get up to \$750 state payment, but a \$500 maximum would be provided

If adopted as drawn, the consti-If adopted as drawn, the consti-tutional amendment would require the Legislature to establish a "vet-erans supplemental fund" to be ad-ministered by the State Comptrol-ler. As soon as one third of the money is on hand to pay eligible claims, the state fund distribution would begin. If one third of the full amount has not been raised within five years after adoption of the amendment, state bonds would be issued. would be issued.


