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BIG TURNOVER EXPECTED THIS YEAR BY USED CAR DEALERS

The used car dealers may not expect big money this year but they do expect a big turnover. This is evident at most used car lots. The dealers have dusted off the sign that urge you to "get our bid first." Some even say our bid first." Some even "please stop here for the highest dollar."

But the dollars aren't nearly as high as they were last year and the year before. Generally you will be offered considerably less than you paid

for your car.

for your car. Of course the bottom isn't go-ing to drop out of the used car business-unless it drops out of other businesses, too. As the car manufacturers reduce prices the used car dealer has to adjust his prices downward. But he adjusts both his buying and selling prices. Most motorists who got new cars a year ago escaped at least one price increase. And they were substantial hikes in most instan-ces. For example, in July from \$80 to \$115. He's a small gray worm also known as the pe-can worm or the pecan borer worm. And whereever pecans grow, you'll find him. - After they hatch out, these little worms move down the twig to the

After a four or five day meal on the buds, the casebearer bores a hole in the pecan and goes in-side to destroy the kernel. Allen C. 


