

He points out that taxes are getting worse and I am getting older, and that if I set up annuities and insurance trusts and establish a residence in Florida, where there is no state inheritance tax, and do a lot of other things, my children may perhaps be better off.

As far as insurance is concerned, I rave been a booster for it all my life. My father, who was a preacher with a large family, and a small salarr, used to remark that he had "kept himself poor paying itsurance premtums." But the insurance premiums enabled him to sleep peacefully at night and, having seen us all through college, he proceeded to cash in his insurance, and he and Mother had a good time on it during their last years.

Suppose they had known, in 1900, that this country was going to do a nose dive in 1920 which would be followed by the worst depression in histry.

Well, they couldn't have done anything about it. And, as things have turned out, we are still eating regularly; we have a dry place to sleep, and so far have neither applied for a dole or sought admission to a nudist camp.

The changes that are going to come in these United States are beyond the imigination of any one to forecast. Our children and grand-children will have to meet them, as we have had to meet the problems in our own lives. What we can do for them beyond health and education is not much. Having tried to take care of these two requisites and being now an old man, I propose to save up the hours hitherto devoted to conferences with insurance men and devote those hours to golf.

Employment always hags when business begins to pick up. But the time comes eventually when there are more jobs—and that time is almost here. So I ask the Brass Hats of business to take as much time as

So I ask the Brass Hats of business to take as much time as possible from their balance sheets and invest in helpful conversation with and generous efforts for young people. By so doing they will lay up for themselves treasures in Heaven. If Heaven seems too far away as a depository of treasurer, I might point out that they also will be buying some highly trained talent at bargain prices.

Now is the day when the cut worms are going to be busy. With the fine rains adding new life to ILL plants the worms are going to be USBY really active. Cut worms may be controlled and destroyed by spreading poison bran

thinly along the row. This may be done with a planter or by hand. The recipe is: Wheat bran-25 pounds. arsenic or Paris green-1 pound, lemons or oranges-6 fruits, low grade cane or sorghum molasses : quarts, and water one gallon. Mix the bran and poison thorou-
