## WATERMELONS ARE HELPED BUT GRAIN SUFFERING BADLY

A little more than a half inch of rain was received in Cross Plains this week. Light showers Monday netted three one hundredths of an inch. Then Wednesday 49 one hundredths of an inch of moisture was caught.

Grain crops near Cross Plains have suffered so much for moisture the past several weeks that there is little hope of the grain making- ing, opine farmers. Many have turned stock into the fields. Others however, believe there is a chance of the crop making something if quite a bit of moisture is received soon. Wednesday's precipitation was thought to be too light to be of any permanent benefit.

Several miles south of Cross Plains crops are somewhat better. Showers have been more frequent and heavier and grain looks comparatively good.

Possibly the greatest benefit from Wednesday's precipitation was to watermelons and truck crops, to which about 1,000 acres are planted in this vicinity.

Although there is no immediate shortage of stock water, ranchmen are needing rain badly. Pastures, which only a few weeks ago were solid green, are becoming parched and cattle are beginning to show effects to the drought.

What Makes A Good Driver? Highway Commissioner Gives Requirements For Safe And Courteous Auto Usage

What makes a real thoroughbred? Highway Commissioner Harry Hines says the real test of a person's character is his conduct behind the steering wheel of an automobile.

At a chamber of commerce banquet in Snyder recently, Hines had this to say about what he considers good driving etiquette and the prerequisites of a thoroughbred behind the steering wheel.

"Perfect motor manners are prerequisite to safety insurance; and, incidentally, the public admires good manners any place, any time.

"Behind the wheel a great deal more than 'intention' is necessary. To say after an accident, 'I intended to do this or that,' but something 'just happened,' won't get the job done.

"The truth is, it takes a really great gentleman to be no more self-inflated in the driver's seat of a new super-de luxe car than when he is walking down the street and meets a friend.

"The drunken driver killed around 9,000 men, women and children last year. Whiskey and beer will not mix with the automobile, which in itself is the most dangerous piece of machinery on wheels that does not run on a given track.

"Who takes chances; who neglects the mechanics of his car, not knowing the condition of his brakes, tires, lights and steering wheel equipment.

"Who repairs tires or motor on pavement in front of dangerous approaching traffic.

"Who depends on the other fellow to stop or get out of the way or take the consequences.

The erection of signs bearing the legend, Drink, Drive and Die, inscribed under a leering skull and crossbones, is one of many activities keeping Texas State Highway Department employees busy on ways and means for saving motorists from themselves.

Life Expectancy Is Now 62 Years

AUSTIN, Texas.—One often hears about the good old days when grandfather was a boy but according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, now are the good days for babies.

While still somewhat below the biblical promise of "three score and ten" Texans can look forward to reaching that goal within a few years.

The fact that a child born in 1938 who weathered the infantile storms of the first year could expect to live 62 years in contrast to the boy born in 1850, who could live only 35 years is a tribute to the American Medical profession and the preventive technique of public health, Dr. Cox believes.

Vaccination is a preventive measure that saves thousands of lives annually. Prophylactic measures against typhoid, diphtheria and smallpox have greatly reduced the incidence of these diseases in Texas.

Science has provided us with effective drugs to combat the spread of syphilis and gonorrhea, diseases which take an annual toll of blindness, insanity, locomotor ataxia, bone infections, enlargement of the arteries and deformity of infants.

Uniform Traffic Laws Are Sought

AUSTIN, Texas.—The Texas Safety Association Friday decided to recommend revamping of Texas' traffic and driver's license laws to conform with a uniform vehicle code effective in about 25 States.

Representatives of the organization, composed of traffic safety technicians and lay enthusiasts, met with Public Safety Department officials and announced the state agency approved the recommendation.

In the main, the uniform code would draw into one or two bills scores of regulations now scattered among civil and criminal state statutes.

A maximum speed limit of 55 or 60 miles per hour (as against the present 45), with lower maximum in zones where less speed is conducive to safety in the judgment of highway engineers. The Safety Department would set the various maximums.

Uniform highway and safety signs, conforming with those in use in other States which have standardized insignia.

Authority for the Public Safety Department to revoke or suspend driver's licenses before a hearing which would be held within five days after the suspension or revocation. Under present law the department may suspend license after a hearing on certain charges, including habitual recklessness.

The standardization of laws would include many minor features yet to be perfected.

Carl J. Rutland of Dallas, president of the Safety Association, said a draft would be prepared in a few days.

He expressed the opinion that Texas, despite a 20 per cent reduction in traffic fatalities this year, needs correction of "many defects in statutes regulating safety on our streets and highways."

WASHINGTON NEWS



FROM CONGRESSMAN CLYDE L. GARRETT

THE WEEK'S LEGISLATION:

President Roosevelt signed on April 20 the measure increasing appropriations for State administration of unemployment compensation April 21. House passed two years extension of President's power to devalue the dollar. Federal bankruptcy act amendment to enable railroads to make voluntary reorganizations when agreeable to 5% of claim creditors, was passed by the House April 17. The bill establishing 15 naval air bases was passed by the Senate April 19.

BILLS ENACTED:

The House approved several bills of importance including bill providing training for civilian air pilots, and the Jones bill providing for a reduction in the limit on maximum soil conservation payments to any one person from the present limit of \$10,000 to \$5,000. The Senate passed the three important fiscal bills. The measure authorizing \$89,900,000 naval air base program. The measure providing more than \$150,000,000 for various purposes, about \$120,000,000 of this is for national defense program items; and the third measure was the \$175,000,000 Department of Interior Appropriation bill.

WORK AHEAD:

Congress has cleared up minor legislation and is now ready to start on the major part of the most important legislation. Amendments to the Social Security Act, Neutrality Act, and the Labor Relations Act will be submitted to Congress by the committees, along with other important proposals.

MONETARY POWERS:

The House passed the bill extending for two years the dollar devaluation powers of the President and his authority to continue operations of the two-million-dollar stabilization fund. The measure will now go to the Senate for debate.

NATIONAL DEFENSE:

More national defense legislation is slated to be brought up in Congress. Sentiment is growing among some of the Congressmen that we should have another navy. One may be hardly enough to defend two oceans. In the meantime, the bills including national defense items are being stepped ahead in both Houses of Congress.

REORGANIZATION:

Just what steps will be taken by President Roosevelt toward reorganizing the Government departments, will be known soon. He is expected to send the first of his suggested changes to Congress in a few days. It is believed the President intends to consolidate a number of departments in an effort to center responsibility.

FIRST FOOD STAMP: Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace announced that Rochester, New York will be the first of a half dozen cities in which the new food stamp plan for distributing surpluses through the normal channels of trade will be started. Actual operation of the plan is expected to begin in that city within the coming thirty days. The plan has been unanimously endorsed by the National Food and Grocery Conference Committee, and contemplates wider consumption of surplus farm products by increasing the purchasing power of low-income families. Distribution of surpluses will take place through wholesale and retail grocery outlets in Rochester during the experiment, a period of from two to four months.

J. S. Hart, County's Oldest Resident, Reminisces Of Ranching In Early Days

(This is another installment in the recollections of J. S. Hart, who has resided in Callahan county longer than any other citizen. These accounts of life in this section when it was a frontier, and Mr. Hart's reminiscences of his early life were written by his grandson, Buddy Hart, from conversations with his grandfather.)

By J. S. HART As Told To BUDDY HART

My mother built the home north of the double log house. That was well known as the "red top house." She, Doug, and myself lived there for some time. Later she bought the Henderson home and land, which is now the Newman land. There was a picket house on this land located on Live Oak Creek. After she bought this, we hauled lumber from Fort Worth, and built a plank house here. We stayed here for some time, when mother decided she would marry again.

This decision of hers gave me the urge to start ranching. My brother Early, and Tom Hartzelwood were moving their cattle to Kent county in 1880, so I sent mine along with them.

I stayed here until 1881, then went to Kent county to start ranching there. Early, Tom Hartzelwood, and myself worked out cattle together there until the Spur Cattle outfit began to fence the land. Hartzelwood moved his cattle to Arizom and I moved on the Gyp Creek with the G. S. outfit and worked with them awhile.

Then the Sharp Music outfit came along and fenced some and I rented pasture land from them and kept my cattle here for some time. Ed Hayden of Moran was working for the Sharp Music crew at this time. Later I sold most of my cattle to Pete Scroggins and Bokey Brown.

A. W. (Doc) McBride was here working for Galbreath and decided he would go back to Tennessee, where his sister, Mrs. Kittrell lived. I had never been out of the state so he persuaded me to go along with him. So in the spring of 1885, we started to Tennessee. The Kittrells lived near Mount Pleasant. Mr. Kittrell was a well-to-do stock farmer. I shall never forget what a warm welcome this family extended to us. Mr. Kittrell took us to his big barn and showed us his pretty horses and buggies and told us they were ours to use whenever we wanted them. All we had to do was tell a negro to hitch a horse to the buggy and go and come when it suited us. I can tell you we kept those negroes busy.

The news soon spread around that there was a cowboy here from West Texas, I guess the girls must have thought I was some kind of wild varmint, for they sent word for Doc to bring me around to see them. There must have been seven girls to one boy.

I never saw so many girls. This must have been a law break how-ever for the boys. They would insist on me singing cowboy songs for them, which I did. I knew a lot of them and I could sing half the night and not repeat a song.

One time Doc and I took two of the girls to Palnsko and stayed a week. The girls and Doc all had relatives there, but we stayed so long the girls' father got uneasy about them and came down to see what was the matter. He found that we were all right, and just having a good time, so he went back home and left us there.

We danced every night while we were there and had a mighty good time. I went back to Mount Pleasant and we stayed there and enjoyed ourselves for several months. Doc decided he would stay in Tennessee. I thought I had stayed long enough, so I thought I'd better start back home.

I went from Mount Pleasant to Nashville. I stayed there a week, from there I went to Henderson, Kentucky, on the Ohio river. I went across the river on a boat to Evansville, Indiana. I stayed there a week and ran out of money. I didn't know what I was to do. I was staying at a hotel and didn't have enough to pay my board. I told the proprietor of the hotel my troubles and asked him if he would keep me until I could wire to Baird for money. He kept me and I wired the Baird bank, collect, to send me some money.

When I came I paid my board and left for home. I had a nice visit but it cost me nine hundred dollars, for that was the amount I had spent since leaving home. When I came home I went to Kent county again and began working with my cattle. I had been gone almost a year. I had spent a lot of money, so I had to work that much harder and make more.

I had always been a believer in the Bible, but there was one part that I began thinking about rather seriously. You know, in the beginning when God made man, he thought it was not best for him to live alone, so he made woman to be his companion.

I felt the same way. I thought it wasn't best for me to be alone, so in 1886, I came back to Callahan

county and married Mary Dodd Smith. We went back to Kent county, and I ranched again on the G. S. Ranch.
