We desire the hearty co-operation of all the young people of Cross Plains. We meet at four o'clock, every Sunday afternoon at the Baptist church.

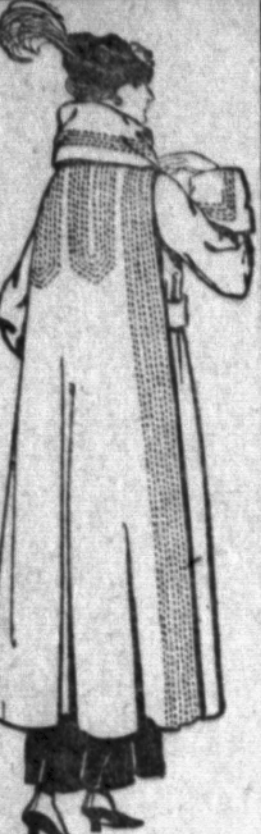
LOOKS GOOD FOR OIL
