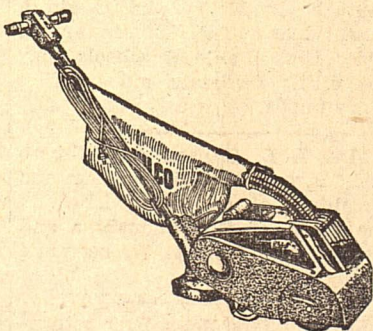

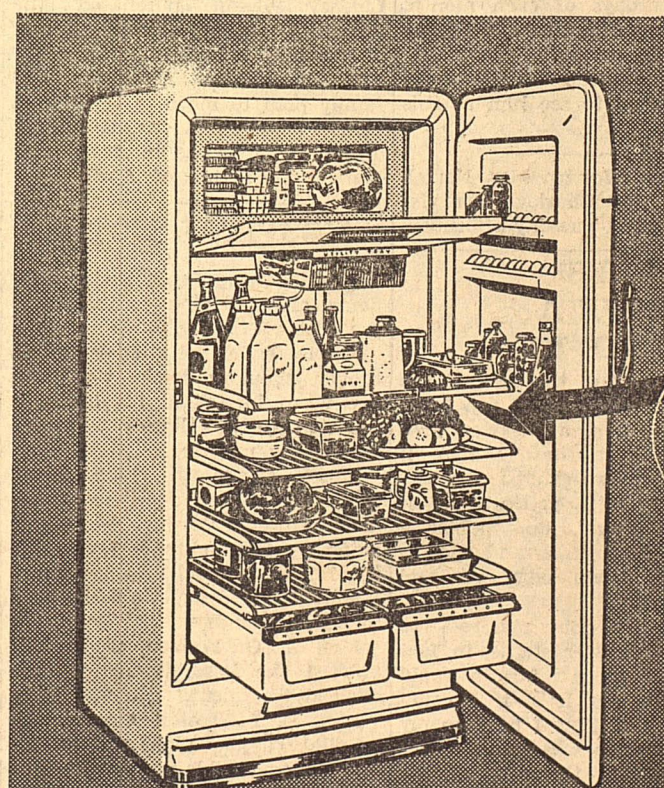

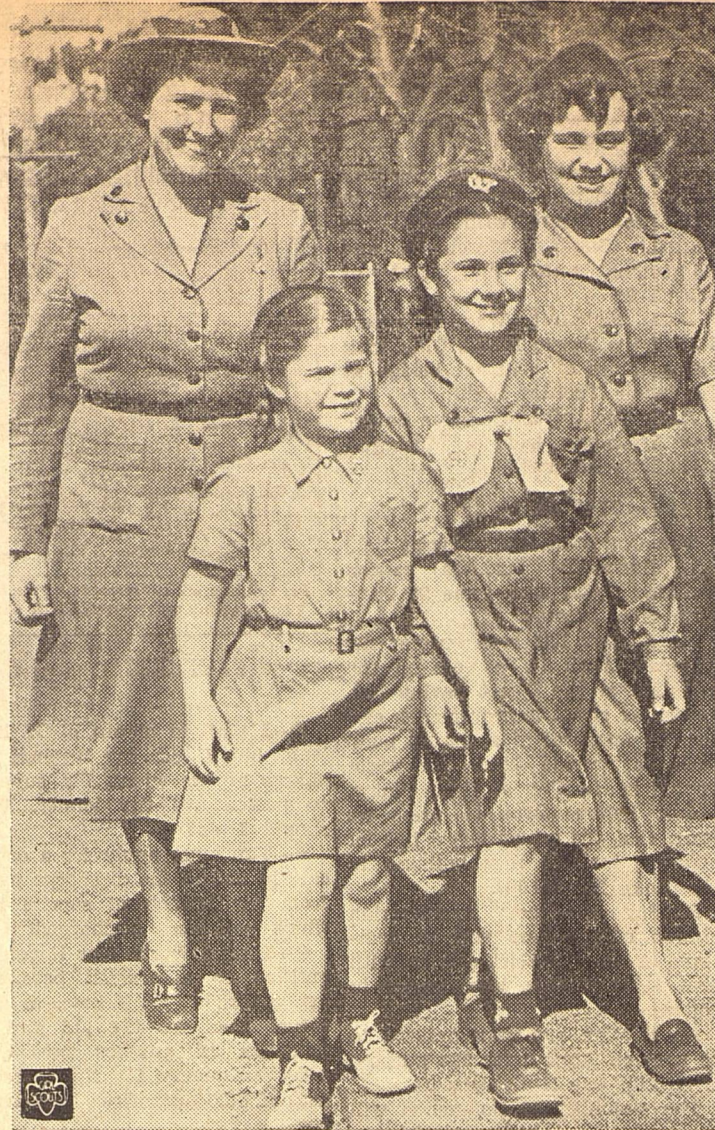

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK

By Ted Gouldy

Fort Worth.—Sheepmen are getting really riled up at the grading program which is causing old crop lambs showing yearling teeth to be sorted out at around \$5 per hundred less than their mates, which may be approximately the same age.

It is the position of the sheep salesmen at the Fort Worth livestock market that the discrimination against yearling wethers is unduly harsh and is costing sheep producers lots of money right now and will cost millions of dollars in the ensuing year unless some relaxation in this arbitrary grading program is allowed.

It seems that under the OPS ceiling price program that grading of sheep and lambs is compulsory—unless the packer wants to grade them nothing above culls.

At some plants the sheep are "mouthed" and graded according to their teeth. At other plants the grading is done on the basis of conformation, appearance of the meat and the color of the bone, etc.

This strict grading does not assure the consumer any better eating, since it is agreed by one and all that a yearling lamb—for instance—13 months old, will "eat" just as good as a yearling lamb 12 months old or one 15 months old for that matter.

Since this grading, strict as it is, cannot help the consumer get better eating and it often times makes a packer lose money and in turn makes the producer lose a lot of money—the industry wants to know "why"?

For decades, the yearling lambs have not been sorted out vigorously until three months or so later in the season. This year is the exception because of this strict grading program and in a year when sheepmen are already suffering severe losses because of dry ranges, high feed bills and a market that is \$8 to \$10 per hundred or more lower than a year ago—well, this is just too much!

Salesmen at Fort Worth in recent weeks have been issuing press releases to papers, magazines and talking personally with sheep producers about this matter.

At the quarterly meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association at San Saba the matter will be given an airing and plans are being laid to take the matter up with congressmen and senators from the shee producing states.

The losses that Southwestern sheepmen will suffer in the coming season will be very great unless the grading program is brought into some degree of alignment with the way yearling lambs have been handled and graded in the years past, because feeders will simply not want to take a chance on buying any yearling lambs as feeders—unless they are bought very, very cheaply. Several Fort Worth men will be on hand at San Saba to explain this matter.

While it is a little early to be thinking about hot weather, it is not too early to be doing some-

thing about it—so the Fort Worth Stockyards is looking forward to greater use of the "pig shower-baths" already.

These nifty arrangements of waterpipes and sprinklers in the hog pens will keep the porkers cool on the hottest days and is another example of the "modern hotel service" provided for livestock.

Well finished cattle and calves still bring lots of dollars, for instance this week the Double L Ranch of Cresson had a load of \$34.50 steers that weighed 1,090 pounds. These cattle appear to have sold roughly \$2.50 below the peak market of about six or eight weeks ago.

Several long distance loads of steers are appearing at Fort Worth. Three loads here from Roswell, New Mexico, this week came from Joe Mitchell. Well finished, they brought \$33. C. E. Penner of Mill Creek, Oklahoma, had a load of 1,158 pound Angus steers here this week also.

Creepfed fat calves still sell at top prices of around \$33 to \$34 per hundred here. Looks like 1952 will be another big year for creepfeeding calves, but we'll have more about this for you later.

County Agent's Column

Each year cutworms cause some damage to home gardens and in certain years they may cause extensive damage to field crops. The worms feed almost exclusively at night, cutting young plants off near the base. Winter plowing and keeping weeds down in adjacent fields helps reduce the annual infestation.

When infestation is light, good control can be obtained with poison baits. When damage becomes severe the poison baits are less satisfactory. Several of the new insecticides have given excellent control and are listed below:

1. A 5% DDT dust applied around the base of the plants or along the surface of the rows gives good control in gardens. In fields crops 15 pounds of 10% dust per acre or 20 to 25 pounds of 5% dust per acre is recommended.

2. Chlordane dust applied at the same rate as DDT dust also gives good control.

3. A toxaphene spray applied at the rate of 1/2 pounds of actual toxaphene per acre gives excellent control.

Dusts may be applied with ground dusters or by airplane. Better control may be had with a ground duster when the nozzles are adjusted just above the surface of the soil and the dust is concentrated on the rows for seedling plants.

When a spray is used, the low volume, low pressure sprayer is recommended with the nozzles ad-

justed so that the spray is applied in a 4-6 inch swath along the surface of the row.

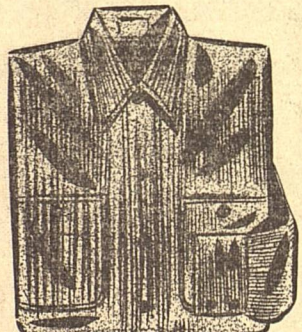

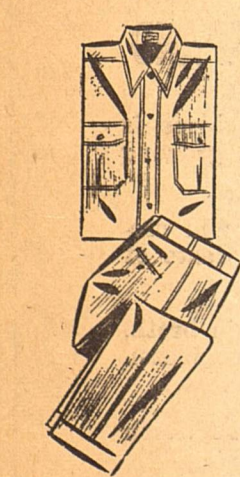

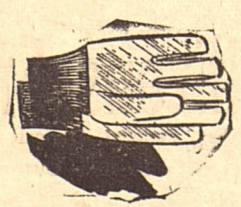

Q—I plan to obtain a GI home loan, but I lost my original discharge papers which I'm supposed to present to the lender. What should I do?

A—You must apply for a certificate in lieu of the discharge papers from the branch of service from which you were discharged.

Q—I am a World War II veteran, entitled to a pension because I lost my sight. Do I have to show actual need for the aid and attendance of another person, in order to qualify for the increased rate of \$120 authorized by a recent law?

A—No. Blinded veterans are not required to show need for aid in getting about, in connection with the recent pension increase.

Q—I am attending school under the GI Bill, and I have about two years of entitlement remaining. Will I be allowed to take the summer vacation off, and resume next fall, or must I stay in training all year 'round, so as not to lose out under VA's post-cut-off-date regulations?

A—If your school's practice is to have a summer vacation for all students that want it, you may take that vacation and resume your studies in the fall. The regulations require you to remain in continuous training except for interruptions, such as the summer vacation, that would apply to all students, veterans and non-veterans alike.
