PENSION SET-UP BEING REVISED

R.E.A. Approves Electric Service Project

DRESSY COMMUNITY WILL GET SERVICE BY END OF SUMMER

The Rural Electrification Administration has approved a contract between the Coleman County Electric Cooperative, Inc., and the Walco Engineering & Construction Company, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, for building 398 miles of line to serve some 790 members.

The successful bid was \$218,924 and includes materials and labor. The total cost, with sub-station, meters and overhead added, will be \$253,805.

One section of the line will extend into the Dressy community, five miles west of town, serving a number of homes in that vicinity.

Construction of these lines will provide nearly 65,000 man hours of employment in direct labor alone, the Review was told.

Superintendent for the job will be S. R. Hale, Engineers are Wm. G. Morrison, Waco, and Clifford Thompson, Attorney: Critz and Woodward, Coleman.

The communication received by the Review from the R.E.A. yesterday said as follows:

All who wish to get service from the new lines should sign up for it at once and make arrangements for wiring and plumbing installations.

Experience has indicated that usually a number of requests for service come in after construction has started.

That advertising pass is being conducted by members of the Cross Plains chamber of commerce.

Shortly before the first of the year the local chamber began an advertising program to acquaint truckers with the fact that watermelons, fruits, berries and seasonal vegetables may be obtained in abundance here.

A recent check-up made by the C. of C. directors and the county agent revealed that orchards in this locality are in better condition than at any time in the past 10 years.

More than 1,000 acres in the Cross Plains tract territory are planted in watermelons, according to Clyde D. Sims, chamber of commerce president.

EXTRA BREAD EATING TO CONSUME WHEAT

New York.—If every person in the United States ate an extra slice of bread a day it would require the production of an additional 8,000,000 barrels of flour in this country every year, according to Dr. James A. Tobey, prominent health authority here.

As the result of this increase in the use of the staff of life, the approximately 28,000 bakers of America would bake nearly two and a half billion more loaves of bread a year, or an average addition to their business of 272 loaves per baker per day, and the problem of our wheat surplus would be solved, he said.

George D. Thomas, 52, well known local farmer, died suddenly at his home three miles north of town shortly before midnight Sunday.

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OLD PEOPLE NOW ON ROLLS WILL NOT BE REGISTERED AGAIN

The following procedure is being used by the Old Age Assistance Commission, according to the investigators assigned to Callahan county:

Inasmuch as Senate Bill No. 9 is now a law, the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission has made plans to efficiently handle all requests in an orderly and satisfactory manner to prevent criticism.

Every person requesting to file an application is being listed in a request register which will serve as a working sheet. The applicant will at that time be given two forms to fill out, and will be told that as soon as possible he will be called in to make his application.

Miss Gertrude Dowdy, old age assistance investigator for this district will not be in her office in the courthouse at Baird July 26, neither will the office be open for registration for the next two weeks.

Miss Dowdy will be in the office again the second Monday in July, and each second and fourth Monday thereafter.

No applications will be accepted until after the rush of the registration and the new policies have been written according to the new law. At a later date each applicant will be called in to make application in the order in which they registered.

All present recipients will be continued on the rolls under the new law, but no re-investigations will be made until all new applicants are investigated. It is not necessary that all applicants rush the office to be the first to register as all of them will be given an opportunity to register in an orderly manner.
