# Chamber of Commerce and Fire Dept. Join In Movement to Secure Fire Truck

The local Chamber of Commerce Luncheon Club and the Volunteer Dr. Gambill Named Fire Department have joined forces Chairman of Committee here to launch a drive to finance truck to be used in rural and urban fire-fighting.

In a regular meeting of the Luncheon Club held at noon on Tuesday of last week, members voted unanimously to present be launch a drive to secure the needed fire equipment, and Chamber mocracy in Action." President L. F. Foster named a committee composed of Fire Chief V. C. Walker, Mayor S. N. Foster and Fred Tunnell to investigate the cost of this type of equipment in other towns in this section. The committee went to Clyde on Monday of this week and looked at the new rural truck there and reported that it was the type of equipment needed here

Fire Chief Walker stated that the Clyde truck was a mobile unit carrying 500 gallons of water and capable of pumping a stream of water while moving. He pointed out that this would prove invaluable in fighting pasture fires where the flames spread rapidly, making it almost impossible to use conventional fire-fighting equipment. It was the committee's opinion that the proposed equipment would cost approximately \$2,500.00.

The local Fire Department, in regular meeting Monday night of this week, voted to join forces with the Chamber of Commerce and also voted to start the fund with a contribution of \$200.00.

V. C. Walker of this city, has been named a member of the emergency draft board for Callahan County, according to an announcement made by Major Boyd Sinclair, director of public information for the State Selective Service, this week.

According to the announcement, 11 men have been named to fill four Taylor and Callahan County draft boards in the event of a national emergency.

Draft Board No. 115 now serves Taylor and Callahan Counties. Under the emergency setup, Taylor County will be given three boards and Callahan County one, Selective Service said.
