Cross Plains trade territory received another taste of Winter early Thursday mornng, as rain and a strong *

winter early Thursday morning, as rain and a strong North wind sent mercury scaling downward. 39 degrees was registered here early yesterday morning.

The rain, although light, was welcomed by most farmers, who report additional moisture is especially needed on land where cotton has been harvested. Stockmen too, were reported jubilant as a result of the moisture.


LUCAL MAN WINS 5 STATE CONTEST OF FILLING STATIONS

In 1933 they were sold again, and in shipping them from one point to another the plates were broken. 


