First act of Dr. White, after accepting the presidency, was to go to the memorial triangle on the H-SU campus, where he laid a wreath on Dr. Sandefur's grave. "Prexy, we are gathered here to dedicate ourselves, by the grace of God, to carry on the work you have so well begun, and to build, in His name, a superstructure worthy of the foundation you have laid," he said there. Dr. Sandefur, at his death last March 22, was the dean of senior college and uni-

House Joint Resolution proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows: "Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of Statute or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service law or charter provisions applicable thereto." Section 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS." Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published, as required by the Constitution for amendment thereto. Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. Hollis, Clyde; Ralph South, Clyde; H. G. Broadfoot, Clyde; R. P. Stephenson, Eula; Roy Armore, Oplin; R. M. Morrisett, Lanham; Jack Scott, Cross Plains; Ed Henderson, Cross Plains.

"The convention passed the following resolution: Be it resolved by the Callahan county Democratic Convention that this convention be put on record as endorsing W. EXPLAIN METHOD OF FARM BUYING UNDER F. S. A. AUGUST 17TH

James S. McKnight, County Farm Security Administration supervisor, has invited landowners who have farms for sale in Callahan county to list them with him for consideration in the FSA's tenant purchase program.

"We make this request in order to get landowners with farms for sale together with farmers who want to buy their farms," Mr. McKnight said. "The FSA makes a loan for the entire purchase price of the land, which the new owners pay to the former owner."

He explained that where additional improvements are needed on the land the FSA will in some instances include this amount in the loan. In general, loans are made only for good farms of sufficient size and fertility to support a farm family in moderate comfort. Farms are valued first by a committee of local farmers and secondly, by a technical appraiser. The

FSA office, where farms for sale are to be listed, is located on the 3rd floor of the Courthouse, Baird, Texas. The supervisor does not purport to act as agent for the owner in securing sale of his farm.

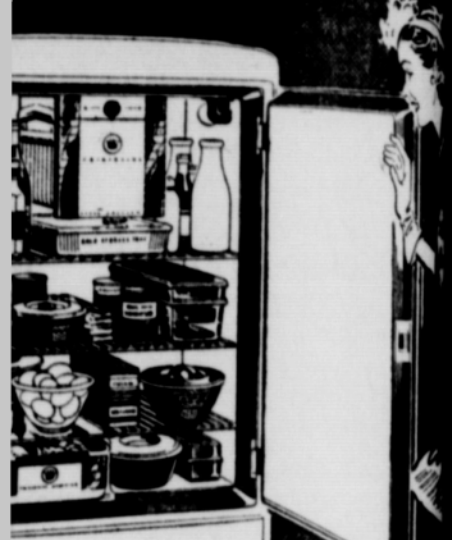
