





Counterfeit Money

AUSTIN, Texas .- The United States Secret Service has, as a result of its "Know Your Money" campaign inaugurated two years ago decreased the amount of counterfeit money in circulation by 94

This report was made recently by Edward Tyrell, U. S. Secret Service Agent in charge, in a Texas State Network broadcast of the "U. S. Government Reports" week-

Four or five years ago, he said, counterfeit money seized by the Secret Service averaged over \$100,-000 a month, while this May the amount fell to approximately \$6,000.

Interviewed by B. Frank White, acting state director for the office of Government Reports, Tyrell said. "The Secret Service has never seen so little counterfeit money in all its history, The 'Know Your Money' campaign has been of inestimable value in preventing this type of crime. Today the counterfeiter is beginning to realize that the general public is far more alert to the genuiness of its money than ever before, and is finding pursuit of his crime a highly dangerous one."

Tyrell urged continued co-operation of the public in the "Know Your Money" campaign, and invited those interested to contact their nearest Secret Service office for further information.





EARTH 40 TIMES AS BRIGHT ON MOON AS MOON IS ON EARTH

Albedo! This earth of ours would be hotter if its "albedo" (reflecting power) were less. It could then absorb more heat. Earthlight, as viewed from the moon, is about 40 times as bright as moonlight on the earth. This is because the earth is half the light received from the sun, whereas the moon reflects only 7 per cent. The clouds and snowfields of the earth are responsible for its high reflecting power. Snow reflects 75 per cent; water 2 per cent when the sun strikes it at a high angle, and 75 per cent when at a very low angle.
