





ACCURACY OF FIRE

Accuracy of rifle fire has always been a specialty of the U.S. Marines, who have won their full share of prizes for skill on the rifle range

But it is a far cry from the modern high-powered infantry rifle to the old-fashioned muskets, which also were used to good effect by the sea soldiers in the days of Old Ironsides and other sailing frigates.

A wide variety of small arms were used in the early days of the last century, including the musket, pistol, boarding-pike, cutlass, bayonet, knife, dirk, or tomahawk. Each weapon had its use in the days The musket however, was the

weapon of the marines. It was usually of the flint-lock, muzzle-loadwas fairly accurate at 100 yards, could inflict a fatal wound at 200 yards and had diminishing degrees of effectiveness up to a quarter-mile. While loading a musket the sea

soldier had much more to do than pulate the bolt, as is the case with most of the infantry weapons today. In those days he had to bite off
