GETTING FOOD INTO BALKANS

Almost Insurmountable Difficulties  
Overcome by the American Relief  
Administration.

One of the most unusual features  
of the work of the American relief  
administration in distributing food  
throughout Europe is the manner in  
which supplies are carried into  
mountainous Montenegro. This is  
described in a report issued at the  
office of the administration.

In order to get food into Mon-  
tenegro it is necessary to scale a  
mountain 5,000 feet high by cable  
ways. Wagons, burros and pack  
horses are then utilized in moving  
it into the interior along roads which  
are almost impassable and again by  
cable over bridges destroyed during  
the war. Overcoming what seemed  
to be almost impossible transport  
conditions, the American relief ad-  
ministration has kept up a steady  
flow of food to four centers, where  
the government is in control of dis-  
tribution.

The monthly program for Monte-  
negro, Dalmatia, Bosnia and Herze-  
govina is 12,000 tons of flour, 508  
tons of fats and 29 tons of milk.  
Proper railroad transportation from  
Iugusa, the chief supply point, is  
made impossible by lack of rolling  
stock, the steady returning march  
of prisoners of war and military  
needs.

KEEPERS NO LONGER NEEDED

Foghorns and Sirens, as Well as Light in  
Lighthouse, Are Controlled  
From Shore.

The first unattended rock light-  
house with a powerful fog signal is  
the recently completed Platte Fou-  
gere lighthouse, marking the en-  
trance to Russell channel leading to  
St. Peter's port, Guernsey, a spot  
which figures in Victor Hugo's ro-  
mance, "The Toilers of the Sea."

The lighthouse contains many in-  
genious electrical devices, controlled  
from the shore by a submarine cable  
nearly a mile and a half long. By  
its aid the foghorn and siren are  
regularly blown—they have been  
heard 30 miles away on the French  
coast—while the current it carries  
also controls the light in the lan-  
tern.

It is proposed to use this type of  
automatic lighthouse for illuminat-  
ing Hudson bay and Hudson straits  
in connection with the opening of  
these waters and the carriage of  
wheat by the new railway to Fort  
Churchill. A proposal to establish  
similar lights on the more exposed  
and barren coasts of South America  
has also been considered.

MYSTERIOUS MURDER OF  
YOUNG MAN AT SIPLE SPRINGS

Brownwood Bulletin.

Mystery surrounds the recent  
murder of a young white man in a  
Siple Springs gambling house, and  
those who have investigated the  
case have no opinion as to the pro-  
bable motive for the crime. There  
is considerable excitement in the  
oil town, according to those  
who have visited the place recently.  
A number of stories are current  
regarding the incident immediately  
preceding the tragedy of Friday night.  
The victim of the shooting was a  
young man about 25 years old, nice-  
ly dressed and intelligent and pros-  
perous appearance. His identifi-  
cation is made impossible by the  
removal of all labels from his cloth-  
ing, and there were no papers or  
other articles in his pockets which  
could give a clue as to his name. It  
has been rumored that he is a for-  
mer Brownwood restaurant worker,  
but this story is not confirmed.

One arrest has been made, a man  
named Irwin being held pending  
further investigation. State Ranger  
E. D. Shumate of Brownwood, to-  
gether with other officers, hurried  
to Siple Springs Saturday morning  
and began an investigation of the  
case, but they were able to learn  
little as to the incidents leading up  
to the shooting. The story which  
appears to have greater credence  
than any other is that the young  
man entered the gambling house  
with the intention of robbing its in-  
cubator, and with the flourish of a  
gun yelled "hands up!" and is said  
to have fired a shot above the heads  
of the men in the room.

At this juncture, the story goes,  
some one in the room shot, the in-  
cubator, his body falling across a  
poker table in the room.  
Another story that has gained cir-  
culation is that the young man had  
been playing in one of the gambling  
houses and had "broke the bank."  
He is said to have been seen on the  
streets with a large sum of currency  
in his hand, and he was going from  
one gambling house to the other.  
It is also reported that he broke the  
bank, whereupon some one

Attorney McCampbell were called  
to the scene early Saturday  
morning and took charge of the man, J.  
A. Irwin, who did the shooting.  
He was carried to Comanche, where  
he made cash bond, which was  
fixed at \$2000.

CROSS PLAINS SCENE OF  
MANY NEW BUILDINGS

Cross Plains is on a building pro-  
gram that promises to relieve the  
house shortage that has so long  
handicapped the growth of the  
town. Property in the past has  
been very dull, but never has there  
been a year when we had enough  
houses to take care of the demand.  
Many houses are now being built, or  
planning to be built. The following  
is a brief mention of building opera-  
tions since the first of January.

J. P. Cross, who owned a large  
dwelling on south Eighth street just  
east of the railroad, has used the  
lumber in this building for con-  
structing two modern residences on  
two lots one block northwest of the  
Baptist church. He has finished  
the building on east part of lots and  
is using the same for a home, the  
house being a seven room bungalow  
and the other is a five room bun-  
galow.

Luke Westerman has built a five  
room modern dwelling in the Mathis  
Addition, just north of Mr. Mathis'  
home. His is a nice home.

J. C. Browning has finished a  
four-room dwelling on east side of  
Avenue E, in northeast part of  
town, and is occupying the same as  
a home.

Mrs. L. E. Davanay has built a  
three-room dwelling across the street  
from and west of the Baptist par-  
sonage.

J. F. Tate has constructed a five-  
room across the street south of the  
Baptist parsonage.

E. E. Mason has bought a lot  
near M. L. Jones' and is preparing  
to build a residence.

Messrs. L. W. Shaw and S. W.  
Bagley of Hollister, Calif., who  
bought the old Crystal Cafe build-  
ing across the street east of B. L.  
Boydston store, have remodeled the  
building and converted it into of-  
fices in front and bed rooms in the  
rear, making a nice building out of  
it.

Ray Carroll of California, who  
immediately after the Vestal well  
came in, leased the Beier mill build-  
ing on South Main street, has con-  
verted it into an office and rooming  
house.

Joe H. Shackelford, lumberman,  
has added a new room to the west  
end of his office building, giving  
him much added and needed space  
to take care of his trade.

Albert Robbins has bought the  
old camp house at the McD. rough  
wagon yard, and has moved it to  
some lots in the southeast part of  
town, where he will use the building  
as a nucleus for a better structure  
for a home.

T. W. Anderson has just about  
completed a seven-room modern  
residence on the north east part of  
the block immediately north of the  
Higginbotham buildings, the same  
being the largest and best appointed  
residence in town. The house has  
an air plane sleeping porch, the only  
one in town, and all modern con-  
veniences, such as fixtures for elec-  
tric lights, gas, sewage, etc. Mr.  
Anderson started the building with  
the expectation of spending six  
thousand dollars on it but has far  
exceeded that amount already.

As evidence of the building that  
may be expected in Cross Plains  
and the drilling for oil in the ad-  
jacent territory, you are cited to the  
fact that the town now has six  
lumber yards and two oil well sup-  
ply firms; namely, Joe H. Shackel-  
ford, the first to establish here be-  
fore the advent of the railroad; W.  
W. Pryor, who opened immedi-  
ately after the railroad came here;  
Higginbotham, Clay & Butler, R.

GREENLEE WELL ON HARRIS  
PLAGE READY TO SPUD IN

C. M. Williams, contractor for  
the Greenlee well on the Harris land,  
has derrick up, slush pit finished,  
tools and boiler on ground, engine  
on block, and are now making ar-  
rangements to use crude oil from the  
Vestal well and as soon as connec-  
tions are made will be ready to spud  
in, which will likely be the first of  
next week. The location is on the  
southwest corner of the T. J. Har-  
ris farm, three hundred feet from  
the Vestal land and the same dis-  
tance from L. D. Montgomery's  
east line. A Henders is lease  
foreman.

The Semans, who own the lease  
on John Lee's farm, adjoining the  
Vestal tract on the south, have  
made a contract with the W. L.  
Templeton Oil Co. to make a deep  
test on the northwest corner of this  
tract, three hundred feet from prop-  
erty lines. The derrick has been  
erected, and tools, boiler and engine  
on the ground. J. E. W. Porter  
has charge of the local work. The  
well will be spudded in at once.

J. L. Thompson has made a con-  
tract with H. D. Marshall for a  
deep test on forty acres off the east  
side of Mr. Marshall's 100-acre farm  
in the east side of the George Click  
survey, Eastland county, one-half  
mile south of Liberty.

The Vestal well two miles north-  
west of town, is reported to be hav-  
ing some trouble with cave-ins.  
C. E. Barr well mile and one-half  
north of town, drilling below 400

feet.

### FERTILE SPOTS IN ARABIA

Country Largely Desert, but in the Valleys Figs, Spices and Dates Are Produced.

In physical character, flora and fauna, Arabia is more like Africa than Asia, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society. Josephus called Arabia "a country that joins on Judea," and Roman geographers drew a map of the land that included Mesopotamia and the Syrian desert back of Palestine.

Yemen, the most southerly and most populous of the Arabian provinces, has many arable valleys producing coffee, figs, spices, hides and dates.

For convenience, the ancients divided Arabia into three parts, the Stony, the Desert and the Happy. The high interior plateau is occupied by four great deserts, the Syrian, the Nejad, the Akraf, and the Dehna. Koweit, the busy port of the Hassa province, from which many cargoes of dates, sponges and a wealth of pearls are shipped, was selected by the Germans as the salt-water terminus of their Bagdad railway. The kaiser's plans, however, were blocked by a clever coup of the British who made a treaty with the sheik of Koweit.

### SKELETONS ARE IN DEMAND

Shortage of Osseous Structures of Humanity Is Reported—Profiteers Seemingly Got Busy.

This is not really as gruesome as it sounds, remarks a writer in London Answers. The most essential impedimenta of the medical student is a skeleton, and at the moment there is a considerable dearth in the latter commodity.

Before the war, medical men and students used to purchase the material required for carrying out anatomical examinations from Paris. Now, for some unaccountable reason, the supply has been greatly decreased, and, unhappily, the profiteer has also stepped in. Four or five guineas was the utmost asked for a complete skeleton in prewar times; now the price is at least ten guineas.

A certain humor is lent to the situation by the appearance in medical journals of advertisements asking the loan of a skeleton for a short period! It recalls the savory conversation between Bob Sawyer and his fellow student, Benjamin Allen, at the breakfast table, when Dingley Dellites were regaled with details concerning the competition for the possession of a skull at "Bart's."

### AIRSHIP POSSIBILITIES.

Several American commissions have recently made an investigation into the aircraft conditions in different parts of the world, and they agree that the country has the opportunity to lead the world in civil aviation activities and as a market for aircraft in 1920. It was the joint opinion of these commissions that the United States is ahead of all other countries in number of planes actually ordered and bought for civilian purposes, number of aerial transportation lines being organized, actual daily performance of the aerial mail service, and volume of mail carried, and possibilities for the use of aircraft for commercial purposes, and that the fact that the post office has proved that military planes can be converted into mail carriers makes possible the utilization of service planes to meet the immediate demand which manufacturers are unable to meet.

### BRAZIL WANTS IMMIGRANTS.

The Brazilian government is endeavoring to facilitate the coming of emigration from Europe to Brazil. It has directed that government-owned vessels in European service shall bring on their return voyage such immigrants as have been vouchered for by Brazilian consuls. Immigration has recently been checked because of high rates for third-class passage from Europe.

### FERTILE SPOTS IN ARABIA

Country Largely Desert, but in the Valleys Figs, Spices and Dates Are Produced.

In physical character, flora and fauna, Arabia is more like Africa than Asia, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society. Josephus called Arabia "a country that joins on Judea," and Roman geographers drew a map of the land that included Mesopotamia and the Syrian desert back of Palestine.

Yemen, the most southerly and most populous of the Arabian provinces, has many arable valleys producing coffee, figs, spices, hides and dates.

For convenience, the ancients divided Arabia into three parts, the Stony, the Desert and the Happy. The high interior plateau is occupied by four great deserts, the Syrian, the Nefud, the Akkaf, and the Dehna. Koweit, the busy port of the Hasa province, from which many cargoes of dates, sponges and a wealth of pearls are shipped, was selected by the Germans as the salt-water terminus of their Bagdad railway. The kaiser's plans, however, were blocked by a clever coup of the British who made a treaty with the sheik of Koweit.

### SKELETONS ARE IN DEMAND

Shortage of Osseous Structures of Humanity Is Reported—Professors Seemingly Get Busy.

This is not really as gruesome as it sounds, remarks a writer in London Answers. The most essential impediments of the medical student is a skeleton, and at the moment there is a considerable dearth in the latter commodity.

Before the war, medical men and students used to purchase the material required for carrying out anatomical examinations from Paris. Now, for some unaccountable reason, the supply has been greatly decreased, and, unhappily, the profiteer has also stepped in. Four or five guineas was the utmost asked for a complete skeleton in prewar times; now the price is at least ten guineas.

A certain humor is lent to the situation by the appearance in medical journals of advertisements asking the loan of a skeleton for a short period! It recalls the savory conversation between Bob Sawyer and his fellow student, Benjamin Allen, at the breakfast table, when Dingley Dellites were regaled with details concerning the competition for the possession of a skull at "Bart's."

### AIRSHIP POSSIBILITIES.

Several American commissions have recently made an investigation into the aircraft conditions in different parts of the world, and they agree that the country has the opportunity to lead the world in civil aviation activities and as a market for aircraft in 1920. It was the joint opinion of these commissions that the United States is ahead of all other countries in number of planes actually ordered and bought for civilian purposes, number of aerial transportation lines being organized, actual daily performance of the aerial mail service, and volume of mail carried, and possibilities for the use of aircraft for commercial purposes, and that the fact that the post office has proved that military planes can be converted into mail carriers makes possible the utilization of service planes to meet the immediate demand which manufacturers are unable to meet.

### BRAZIL WANTS IMMIGRANTS.

The Brazilian government is endeavoring to facilitate the coming of emigration from Europe to Brazil. It has directed that government-owned vessels in European service shall bring on their return voyage such immigrants as have been vouched for by Brazilian consuls. Immigration has recently been checked because of high rates for third-class passage from Europe.
