He stated that the lake will be poisoned and all fish killed in order to kill off the large number of undesirable species of fish and turtles and that the Game Commission would restock the lake with game fish, so that club members would have good fishing there by this

The poison to be used is very deadly to marine life, causing the fish to suffocate rapidly after application is made. However, the fish are edible and the club invites everyone in this area to be on hand sometime during the day and get all the fish they want.

Officials of the game commission stated that the poison would last approximately 15 hours and then the lake can be restocked with desirable species of fish.

Soil Picture Changing In Areas Of Southwest All Texas Counties

Fort Worth, March 7.- Improving moisture conditions over limited areas of the wind erosion belt of Oklahoma and Texas have reduced by 200,000 acres the total acreage exposed to wind damage, the Soil Conservation Service reported today.

SCS Regional Director Louis P. Merrill said the total in acreage not adequately protected by cover or plant residue declined in the last half of February from a blowseason high of 4,728,000 acres to 4,526,000 acres by month-end.

Sharpest drops in acreage exposed were at Guymon, Oklahoma, and Childress, Texas. Other Western Oklahoma areas. with the exception of Altus, reported winter cover making gains with improved soil moisture. Conditions in the

Altus area had declined. Although land undergoing wind erosion damage in the Oklahoma panhandle section remained at 160,000 acres, District Conservationist J. F. Bailey at Guymon reported early planted wheat making sufficient gains to reduce unprotected acreages from 500,000 acres two weeks ago to 450,000 acres as the month ended.

In the Childress area, SCS District Conservationist George Taylor said conditions are improving with little soil blowing expected during the rest of the season. Exposed acreages dropped there from 200,-000 to 120,000 acres in the two week period. Taylor said he had observed that sorghum stubble in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District had proved especially effective in preventing soil movement. Wheat, rye, clover and new alfalfa, benefitted by several light rains, have been growing well.

Largest increases in unprotected acreage were at Big Spring, Texas, (where failing moisture sent the total from 398,000 acres to 429,000) and at Altus, Oklahoma. where the new total is 76,500 acres as compared with 55,000 acres two weeks

Other field office reports to Regional Director Merrill show that where rains have fallen conditions Lubbock SCS District Conservationist Homer Taff said wheat and other winter cover crops are making growth and conditions are generally improved. Moisture conditions remain good in his reporting area with the exception of the southern portion of Lynn County.

Under Designation As Disaster Areas

All Texas counties are now under designation as disaster areas by proclamation of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The action qualifies farmers who have suffered crop losses and who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere for loans from the Farmers Home Administration to put in 1952 crops. Announcement of the designation was made at Dallas, headquarters of the Farmers Home Administration by L. J. Cappleman, State Director.

Bad weather conditions in 1951 reduced crop yields materially and tightened up credit conditions, to the extent that many farmers were unable to finance crop plantings. Disaster loans are now available in each county. Farmers who have sustained production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer Fredericksburg, for having the and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock,s essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs and other expenses incident to the production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds needed to plant a crop this year. 


