When the needs were all tab-ulated, Odum told his towns-people: "There is nothing on the list we can't do if we'll pull to-gether."

In Tuesday and Wednesday's edition of The Abilene Reporter-News Odum began the first of a series of monthly advertise-ments pointing to Clyde as "a good place to live."
