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I GIVE YOU TEXAS by BOYCE HOUSE

A good while back, the question was asked, Has any reader ever seen a boxball alley? The only responses came in the form of another question, what is a boxball alley?

It is—or was, as apparently there aren't any, any more—a game similar to bowling except that instead of 10 pins, there were five; and the pins were flat like paddles and had a rod running through the middle so it was flipped them out of position instead of knocking them gungo west; and they could be reset merely by pulling a lever; and the ball used was a jet lighter and smaller and—therefore—easier to handle, and you could roll flat-footed instead of making a running start. And you could hit not more than two pins at a time.

You got three rolls and, if you swept the board, you got an extra roll and could score as much as 30 in a frame—there were seven frames, or innings. Ninety was a good score and anything over 100 was very good.

When I was a small boy, my father's health was frail and he bought a boxball alley and installed it in a long tent. I ran the place, keeping score, collecting the money and frequently taking part in the game. I should have been a good player because there were periods in the morning and along in the middle of the afternoon when there was no patronage and so there was plenty of time to practice. I guess I was just about the champion boxball player of those parts. Modesty is all right but there is no use carrying it to ridiculous extremes.

The boxball alley saw service in several towns, among them Uvalde. It was located just across the street from where the big garage owned by Ross Brunfield (shunting and fishing associate of former Vice President John Garner) now stands. That spot was then occupied by an ice cream stand.

The cones in those days were cooked while you waited. The at-

tant poured out a little batter and, when it was done, he ciled it around a wooden cone-shaped pattern to give it the right shape, and then put in the ice cream. Cones in those days had flavor and freshness and people actually ate 'em. Personally, I'd as soon consume a piece of beaverboard as one of the present-day cones.

I was one of the best customers the Uvalde ice-cream cone stand had. Incidentally, two Mexicans bought cones one day, carefully ate the ice cream and then handed the empty cones back, thinking they were some kind of new-fangled, gungo dish.

But what I started out to say, boxball would be a good game to revive.

Well, the Legislature did it—met in special session, accomplished the job and went home, all in 11 days—an example of democracy functioning at its best. It proves what can be done by harmony and co-operation. Governor Coke Stevenson demonstrated that there is a steady hand on the helm of the ship of state. 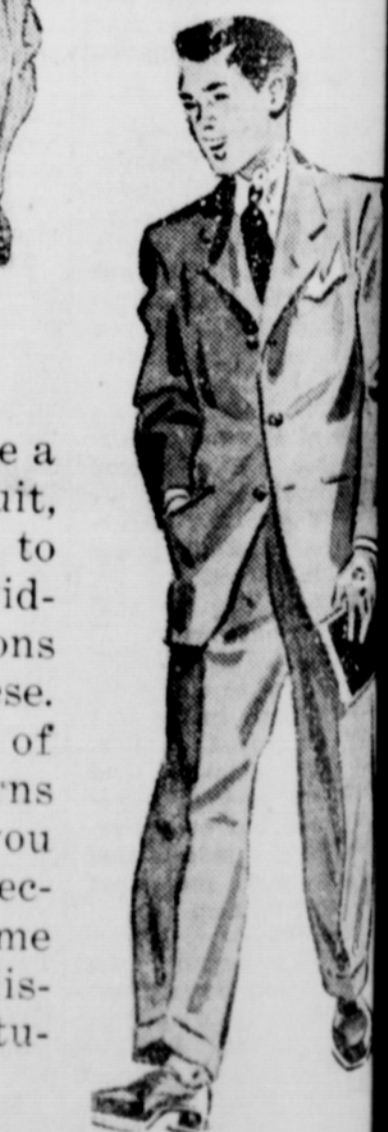

NEWS BRIEFS OF BYGONE DAYS
 Little Squibs Gleaned From Files Of Review

November 29, 1929; J. C. Garrett, of the Garrett Motor Company in Cross Plains was seriously injured in a crash which occurred on the highway between Pioneer and Rising Star about 10 o'clock Wednesday night. C. A. Lotief, of the local Lotief's Dry Goods Company, was returning from a trip to Fort Worth his car heavily loaded with merchandise, when the vehicle struck a large rock and went into the ditch. The Garrett Motor Co., wrecking car was summoned and carried to the scene by Mr. Garrett. While attempting to pull the Lotief car from the ditch he was struck by a small passenger bus coming West and rendered unconscious. He was returned to Cross Plains and immediately carried on to the Santa Anna hospital for treatment. Reports from the hospital early Thursday morning state that Mr. Garrett's skull is fractured and he is in an unconscious condition.

December 6, 1929: According to an announcement made by Captain M. J. Mulcahy, P.M.S.T. in John Tarleton College, the Review learns that Joe K. McAdams of Cross Plains has been promoted to the rank of corporal in the Tarleton Cadet Corps. The announcements also states that Joe is an excellent military man and a good all round student.

December 13, 1929; E. Brumbelow, trapper employed by the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, was in town Monday and reported that he had captured and destroyed a total of sixty-seven wolves and two bobcats since he has been trapping in this locality. The greatest number of the wolves were caught in the neighborhood of the Harrell ranch.

January 22, 1932: A eleven pound baby girl was born to Mr. and Mrs. Jody Huntington, here, Sunday morning. She has been named Patsy Sue. Both mother and child were reported doing nicely, Thursday morning.

August 16, 1929; A. L. Irvin, of this city, is in a Gorman hospital in a serious condition the result of severe burns sustained in a gas explosion at the Lusk well a few miles north of Sipe Springs last Sunday. Mr. Irvin, who is an oil contractor, was working the old rig over for a receiver and with some of his employees was at the well Sunday. Those present say that Mr. Irvin went back into the engine room by himself and soon a loud explosion was heard and flames quickly spread in all directions. He was badly burned about the back, arms and head and was immediately rushed to Gorman for surgical treatment. At least one-third of the surface of his body was burned, his condition is regarded as very serious.

August 16, 1929; The Ten Commandments: (1) Drive to the right side of the road, it's as good as the left. (2) Slow down when approaching a cross-road, it is nearly as dangerous as a railroad crossing. (3) Look out for children. You can never tell what the wrong if you hit one. (4) Try to help instead of hinder the traffic officer, he is there for your good and he has a tough job. (5) Be sure your dimmers really dim; its no joke driving into a blinding glare as you probably know. (Head and obey the warning signs; they were not put up as ornaments. (7) If you just have to speed, do it where you will not kill anybody but yourself. (8) When making minor repairs, stop where your car may be seen from both directions; otherwise, you may stop longer than you anticipate. (9) Speeding around corners is a straight route to the hospital. Don't race past a stopped street car, someday the jury will call it manslaughter. (10) Use discretion. The fact that you had the right of way won't bring anybody back to life, least of all yourself.

September 6, 1929: The city has installed an emergency fire alarm system on the front of the First State Bank building. This alarm is to be turned in by any one in case of fire only, and when immediate connection cannot be obtained through the system at the local telephone office. The emergency alarm is equipped with a froil glass front and when its use is necessary the night watchman or any other citizen is instructed to break the glass and turn the switch, which makes direct connections with the fire alarm.

Phases of Baptist work in Texas, which were discussed at the meeting were "Sowing Seed in Our Army Camps in Texas," "Harvest Time Among the Foreigners in Texas," "Our Baptist Schools," and "Our Baptist Hospitals." Rev. C. E. Poe of Cross Plains delivered the inspirational address at 11:00 a. m. A covered dish luncheon was served in the basement of the church at noon.

GOLD HUNTERS BROUGHT FIRST COWS TO TEXAS

Coronado, the Spanish explorer, noted because of his tremendous "wild goose chase" 400 years ago, left on the plains of Texas something for posterity more substantial than the Seven Golden Cities of the Cibola, which, incidentally, he failed to find.

According to the new Texas Almanac, published by the Dallas News, it was he who brought the first cattle to Texas. In the number of these, Texas is the first ranking state of the Union, according to the census of 1940.
