Oil activity in this area seems to be the most heartening news of the day here and with the weather being what it is today, this activity could not have come at a better time. Local oil operators report that quite a drilling program is about to be launched in the area a few miles west of town and optimism is running high. One test being drilled by R. W. Brown of Abilene on the Fred Heyser place, about seven and one-half miles west of town is reported to be drilling below 3,000 feet at this time and has already encountered a good show in the Cross Plains Sand at about 1.800 feet. Gas. gauged at 10 million feet was encountered in the top of this sand and Tom Bryant, local operator who assembled approximately 18 square miles of acreage in the vicinity, reported the past week that a group of interested parties from out-of-state were here last week looking into the feasibility of constructing a pipeline into the area to collect this much needed natural gas for a ready market. According to reports this week, three more semi-wildcat tests will be made in the area offsetting the Brown test on the Heyser.

Another local operator, Neal Dillard and associates are drilling in the Cross Cut area and have recently completed one producer and have several other tests staked.

A large drilling program is planned for this area surrounding this test, it has been reported. Tom Bryant, local oil operator, has an 18 square mile block under lease in the area, with Joseph L. Brown, of Abilene, serving as geologist in the undertaking.

According to Bryant, Pat Doheny and Bing Crosby, et al, of Beverly Hills. California, have a tract of 2,000 acres offsetting the Brown block to the north and northeast. Tentative location has been made three-quarters of a mile east of the R. W. Brown well and a drilling program is now being worked out with them.

H. H. Hamilton of San Angelo has a 782 acre tract under lease, north and northwest of the Brown test and a location has been staked one-half mile northwest of

the Brown test on this tract, known as the John W. Harris tract in the John Picken Survey No. 221. Drilling operation will start within 30 days, it was said. Tentative plans also call for a test to be drilled on a block of acreage one-half mile southwest of the Brown tract with drilling operations to begin within 120 days, it was said. The test will be drilled on a tract belonging to Mrs. G. B. Scott, located in the Mial Scurlock Survey No. 207.

Also of interest to citizens of this area is an announcement made by Tom Bryant this week that interested parties from out-ofstate were here the past week in the interest of building a pipeline in this district to market the available natural gas hereabouts, and it is thought that a large commercial gas field can be developed in the area.

Importance of Social Security Number Cited

June graduates of high schools; vocational schools, and colleges are urged to apply for their social security account number cards before they graduate. Also, students who are not graduating this June but who expect to work during their summer vacations should obtain their cards before classes end. Seasonal workers, who expect to be employed for the first time on jobs covered by social security, should likewise apply early. Many prospective employers will not hire a person unless he has his social security account number card with him, and many a good job has been lost this way.

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, says that the importance of the account number lies in the fact that wages can be credited only through the use of the account number. Since the money recorded in a person's social security account is used to figure benefits, the more money credited in the account the higher the benefits. Thus, if for any reason wages are reported without an account number or with an incorrect number, than these wages may not be credited to the account. Not only may future benefits be smaller because of this, but in some cases no benefits may be payable at all.

The advice of the Social Security office is: "Remember that your social security account number card is the key to all future benefits for you and your family. Protect it, keep it with you at all times, show it to your employer when necessary, and above all, get in touch with the social security office if you need help."




