#### WATCH YOUR DIET TO PREVENT COLDS

It is very important that you watch the diet of your family during this Cold Epidemic, not only planning your meals for looks and taste but for nutritional value as well. The following is a basic daily diet which includes the "Must" foods to produce and maintain good health:

MILK: 1 quart per child, 1 pint per adult.  
POTATOES: At least one a day per person.  
EGGS: Not less than one not more than two.  
MEAT or FISH: One serving a day. Cheese and eggs can be substituted.  
CEREALS: At least one serving a day.  
BREAD: Eat a variation of bread at each meal; e. i. whole wheat, rye and white.  
VEGETABLES: One leafy, one raw and one green or yellow vegetable each day.  
FRUITS: Eat at least two fruits a day, one raw.  
In addition to the above Basic Daily Diet add or include the following to your diet for the prevention of colds: Beet tops, cabbage leaves, carrots, green string beans, lettuce, mustard greens, red peppers, tomatoes and Juices, sweet potatoes, turnip tops, yellow squash, celery, okra, green peppers, butter, cheese, cream, eggs, calf liver, whole milk, beef fats, ice cream, kidney, oysters, poultry fat, red salmon, apricots, prunes, yellow peaches, avocados, bananas, oranges and juice, pineapple and juice.

News From The AAA Office

Swine In A Profitable Farm Program

Hog production, a basic item in the Food for Victory program, easily can be made successful if properly fitted into a profitable farming plan, according to E. M. Regenbrecht, swine husbandman of the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Especially suited as a small enterprise, hog production primarily is dependent for success upon the availability of an abundance of grain feed. Hogs always pay more for corn, barley, or grain sorghums than does the grain market. About four pounds of feed produces a lb. of pork, but the feed must be properly balanced. Feeds used to balance the farm grain usually are higher in price than the latter but the quantity is small.

Farmers who keep from one to three sows almost always make a success, Regenbrecht says. Hogs do not do well when run in large groups because sanitation and disease prevention become serious problems with large herds. The principal item of expense in hog production is the grain feed, but if this is grown on the farm, or obtainable locally at reasonable prices, the enterprise easily can be established on a profitable basis.

While a sandy, well-drained soil is the most suitable, hogs can successfully be raised on a heavy black soil, but in such case concrete floors are almost a necessity. Hog pastures are necessary, with small grain for winter, and sudan for summer the best. Native grasses such as bermuda are good for a short time in the spring, but soon get hard and tough, and become of little value. A good pasture will furnish 50 percent of the needed protein and otherwise reduce the cost of production, Regenbrecht says.

Suitable equipment—a movable hog house, a few troughs and a self-feeder—can be built at small cost. A concrete wallow can be classed as almost a necessity. If hogs are kept comfortable they make rapid economical gains and losses from over-eating are avoided. It is likewise true that hogs which do not have a dry, warm place in which to bed during the winter will not make as much profit as those properly sheltered.

Terraing Makes New Etrides In Texas

Conservation-conscious Texas farmers are falling in line with the AAA terraing program, according to B. F. Vance, administrative officer in charge AAA in Texas.

Under the new set-up, farmers can terrace their land now and pay for it later, the AAA official said.

Machinery of the terraing program is simply operated, Vance said in explaining that county AAA committees set a reasonable price for terraing easier farms of the county through offers made by cooperating contractors. Once the fair price for a county is determined, farmers get bids for their farms from the contractors, take the offer they like best, and get their terraing done.

"It goes without saying that prices of terraing will vary by farms," Vance said, "but establishing a reasonable price for a county will serve as a yardstick for measuring costs of easier and more difficult jobs."

When terraing has been completed and checked by county AAA officers for specified requirements under the farm program, contractors are paid by the AAA and charges later deducted from farmers' conservation payments.

Increased popularity of the program with Texas farmers is attributed to the fact that no cash outlay is required to get farms terraced, Vance said.

Marvin Ray Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Smith of this city, seaman first class in the United States Navy, who was reported "missing" following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor December seventh was declared "officially lost in the service of his country" in a telegram received by the parents here Tuesday night from Rear Admiral Randal Jacobs, Chief of the Bureau of U. S. Navigation.

A memorial service in tribute to the well known Cross Plains boy, the first to lose his life in the service of his country during the present war, will be held at the First Baptist Church here Sunday morning at 11 o'clock in connection with the regular Sabbath services.

Ray Smith was first reported missing in a telegram received by his parents here on December 21, two weeks to the day after the dastardly attack on the United States' naval stronghold in the Pacific. The wire Tuesday night was the first additional news received by the family since that time.

"After exhaustive search it has been found impossible to locate your son Marvin Ray Smith, seaman first class in the U. S. Navy, and he has therefore been officially declared to have lost his life in the service of his country as of December seventh, 1941. The department expresses its sincerest sympathy."

Ray Smith, a graduate of Cross Plains high school where he was an outstanding athlete, volunteered for service in the United States navy in November 1940. He was never home after leaving for the West Coast where his induction occurred.

Survivors include the bereaved parents, one brother, Donald, and four sisters, Earline, Patsy Ruth, Luella and Marie, all of Cross Plains, as well as grand parents, near relatives and a great host of friends.

SUPPLEMENTARY QUOTA GIVEN COUNTY BY RED CROSS; LAST FOR '42

Callahan county was given a supplementary Red Cross quota this week, according to word received Tuesday from C. V. Jones, county chairman. The recent quota will call for the raising of only \$187.05 more in Callahan county, and bearing an unforeseen disaster this will be the last Red Cross appeal for 1942. Mr. Jones was told by Norman H. Davis, national chairman.

It is pointed out that Callahan county raised \$837.05 in the annual roll call drive, whereas the quota was \$1,000.00. Then in the first war relief call Callahan county raised \$2,130.30, whereas the quota was \$2,000.00. To equalize both quotas with the supplementary call only \$187.05 is needed, the Review was told by Mr. Jones who predicted little difficulty in raising this sum.

A number of persons, it is pointed out, have not yet contributed to the Red Cross and from this group the remaining balance is expected to be largely derived.
