SUGAR RATIONING PLANS INSTITUTED

First instructions regarding sugar rationing have been received in Cross Plains by Superintendent Leo Varner of the local school system.

A survey must be completed here by Friday of this week as to the number of sugar ration books which will be needed in the Cross Plains area.

Persons who have no children in school are reminded that it will be necessary for them to notify the school head as to the name and ages of all members in the family.

This should be done by Friday of this week, the Review is told. If impossible by Friday, this action should be taken as soon thereafter as possible.

To expedite matters I suggest citizens who have no children in school, simply mail us a card giving this information, Mr. Varner stated.

Rationing of sugar will likely get underway the last week in March, and after that time it will be impossible to buy sugar without the necessary credentials which are issued through the schools through the nation.

Every man, woman and child is to receive a sugar rationing book which will be good for 28 weeks. Heads of each household will be required to register with the administrators, which in this case are the school executives.

Retail dealers will be required to register a week ahead of individuals to get the credentials necessary to securing their stocks of sugar.

Varner points out, however, that these are only preliminary requirements and may be changed from time to time.

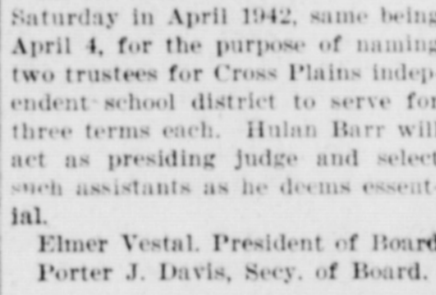

BLACKOUT AND AIR RAID PROTECTION ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO AIR RAID PROTECTION: AUTHORIZED BLACKOUT AND AIR RAID PROTECTION ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS; PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS.

Section 1. AUTHORITY TO PROMULGATE NECESSARY ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR BLACKOUTS AND AIR RAIDS. In order to protect life and property in the City of Cross Plains, Texas, from enemy action the Mayor (or other authorized official) is authorized and directed to carry out blackouts and air raid protection measures in said City at such times and for such periods as are authorized or ordered by the Army or Navy and to promulgate such orders, rules, and regulations as may be necessary to insure the success of the blackouts and air raid protection measures and to protect life and property during such periods. Said orders, rules and regulations shall include traffic movements of emergency or other vehicles, evacuation of residents, congregation of persons on public streets, sidewalks, and in public places or buildings, but this enumeration or any enumeration contained in this ordinance shall not be taken as a limitation on the power to promulgate orders, rules, regulations governing any other subjects, persons or property which may be regulated in order to insure the proper carrying out of any duly authorized blackouts or air raid protection measure. Practice blackouts and air raid drills may be carried out at such times and for such periods as the Mayor (or other authorized official) shall in his discretion deem appropriate or necessary but subject always to the orders and directions of the Army or Navy, and the orders, rules and regulations authorized herein.

Section 1. A "blackout" is hereby defined as any period of time designated by United States Military or Naval Authorities for extinguishing or effectively screening lights of all kinds. During such period it shall be unlawful:

(1). For any person in the occupancy or in the possession or control of any building or structure to fail to turn out or cause to be turned out all exterior lights thereon or connected therewith.

(2). For any person to allow any light in any house, room or apartment to be visible from the outside. Managements of hotels, apartments, lodging houses and office buildings shall be responsible for all exterior lights, lights in passageways, stairways, halls, corridors and other places not occupied by tenants or other persons and in all unoccupied rooms, apartments or offices.

(3). For any person excepting as may be herein otherwise provided to display or allow to shine, any light in any open space, or for any person owning or controlling any sign to allow the same to be illuminated or any light to be displayed therefrom.

(4). For any person to drive an emergency vehicle with the lights on unless screened and shielded according to regulations promulgated by the Mayor or by United States Military or Naval Authority.

Ordinance be declared to be invalid and all other provisions thereof shall remain valid and enforceable.

Section 8. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.

Section 4. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, ORDERS, RULES AND REGULATIONS SUSPENDED. At all times when the orders, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinances, orders, rules and regulations insofar as the latter may be inconsistent therewith.

Section 5. NO CONFLICT WITH STATE OR FEDERAL STATUTE. This ordinance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any Military or Naval order, rule or regulation.

Section 6. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or any order, rule or regulation issued pursuant thereto shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

Section 7. SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS. It is the intention of the City Council that such separate provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is further the intention of the City Council that if any provision of this

Twenty years from now today's children will remember a book and a bond as their first aid to their country.

The young people of the United States are taking an active part in the Victory Book Campaign, which is being sponsored by the American Library Association, the American Red Cross, and the United Service Organizations, to collect ten million books for men in the armed forces of the United States. In Cross Plains the work is under the direction of Mrs. Tom Cox.

In communities all over the country Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, Junior Red Cross, Girl Reserves, Boys Clubs, High School children, and college students are helping the cause in a variety of ways. In many places they have been the first donors of books in the Campaign, as in Allegany County, Pa. A seven-year old boy presented "The Life of China Kai-shuk" with the request that it be sent to a marine in the Philippines. His friend gave Hilare Bellos' "Cromwell" with instructions that it be sent to one of his uncles now in Camp.

Terms of Mayor Martin and 4 Councilmen Expiring; No Candidates Announced

Two elections have been ordered for Cross Plains voters early in April. On the first Saturday in the month voters of the local school district must go to the polls to name two trustees. Then on the seventh a municipal election is docketed at which time a mayor and four aldermen are to be named.

Trustees whose terms are expiring are S. O. (Olan) Montgomery and N. L. (Norrel) Long. Neither has yet announced whether or not he will be a candidate for reelection.

In the city administration the terms of Mayor C. S. Martin and Aldermen J. A. Caton, H. C. Freeman and B. A. Pierce are expiring. The other vacancy to be filled is that created by the recent resignation of T. E. Baum. Mayor Martin points out that Mr. Baum had yet another year to serve, so after four aldermen have been named by the voters they will draw with one of the quartet taking a one year term and the other three receiving two year tenures.

Hulan Barr has been named judge for the school election, however, the place of balloting has not yet been designated. Place of the city election will be in the local water and gas office. As yet, however, the presiding judge has not been chosen.

To nominate a candidate either for Mayor, Councilman or School Trustee a petition bearing the signature of 10 qualified voters must be filed 10 days before the time of election. In case of city officers petition should be filed with J. W. Tyson, city secretary. For the school board, nominations should be filed with the county judge.
