### Pioneer Farmers To Hear Defense Program Explained

The new Food for Defense Program in connection with the 1942 farm program will be discussed with Pioneer farmers at the high school auditorium on Thursday evening, November 6, at 7:30 p.m.

According to Ralph R. Bradshaw, chairman, Eastland County defense board, the new food program has two immediate objectives:

1. To supply America with food for her own needs. 2. To supply food to nations at war with the axis powers.

It is pointed out that the food needs of the nation have been broken down to state goals, the state goal divided into county goals, and these county goals will be distributed to individual farmers. It is therefore necessary that each farmer do his best to meet or exceed his goal-otherwise America cannot keep her promise to deliver food to Britian and other countries resist-

ing aggression. Two immediate steps should be taken by every farmer in the inter-\* est of national defense: First; look over the farm plan sheet now in his hands and decide how he can \* increase his food production, and second; attend the USDA defense \* board meeting nearest him.

At this same meeting important \* changes in the 1942 AAA program, \* especially as regards peanuts, will be discussed with its relation to the defense effort.
