Outlook For Forage Crops Never Brighter; Pastures Resemble Carpet Of Green

Fine, general rains over the Cross Plains trade territory last week were a boon to every phase of the agricultural and lifestock industry. On the whole, "prospects were never

brighter," opine veteran observers. A government weather gauge in Cross Plains measured the precipitation at 2.18 inches, however, several sections of the trade area report the fall heavier. Cross Cut for instance, received in excess of three inches. Pioneer, too, had more rain than did Cross Plains.

Coming as it did, slow and gently, extended over a period of nearly a full week, most of the moisture soaked into the parched earth and will provide a fine season for all vegetation. Already corn is waist high. Sudan and kaffi-corn are doing as well as at any time in the memory of many planters. Pastures are literally carpets of green and stockmen face one of the brightest periods of their career.

Peanuts, for which the acreage is greater in the Cross Plains trade territory than ever before in history, are just beginnin to "pop" moisture for good stands.
