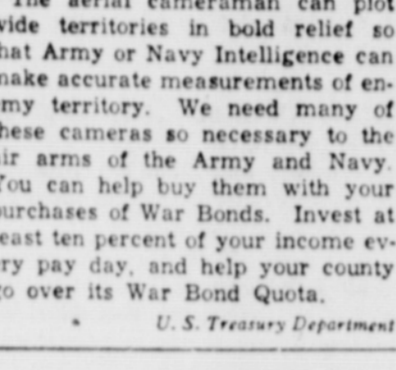

In spite of the fact that 30,000 deer are killed annually in Texas, the number of deer in the state is reported to be increasing.

Game restoration projects in Texas during 1939-40 included distribution of quail, deer, antelope, turkey, beaver, doves, muskrats, prairie chickens, rcoon, mink, ducks, geese and squirrels, which were trapped in the more plentifully stocked areas and distributed to other points.

**HUNTERS HERE LAUD EXTENSION OF SEASON**

Sportsmen of this section hall with glee Secretary Ickes' announcement that the duck hunting season starting in this zone Nov. 2, will be extended to 70 days.

The 60-day season closed last winter the day before thousands of ducks descended upon Lake Nasworthy.

Ickes estimated there are 100 million waterfowl now, including a 30 million increase concentrated in ducks.

While easing the restrictions on ducks, Ickes tightened up on geese, doves and other migratory fowl that have not increased in population.

The duck shooting starts Sept. 26 in the northern zone; Oct. 16 in the intermediate, and Nov. 2 in the southern.

The daily, unchanged bag limits on ducks are 10 of all kinds with not more than one wood duck, or more than "three singly, or in the aggregate of redheads and buff-heads." No one at any one time may possess more than 20 ducks.

The hunting hours are from sunrise to sunset, instead of sunrise to 4 p. m. as in previous years.

The new regulations reduced the bag limit on geese and adopt other special safeguard, Ickes saying investigations "have disclosed a decline in goose population other than blue geese."
