GET POULTRY HOUSES READY FOR WINTER

A large part of the chickens hatched last spring will come into production during September. The eggs of these young layers produce during the fall and winter will count heavily in maintaining Texas' quota of the 1942 food goal. Accordingly, says H. H. Weatherly, assistant poultryman of the Texas A.&M. College Extension Service, the hens should be provided with the most favorable surroundings in order to assure as nearly maximum output as is possible. To provide comfortable housing and safeguard the health of the poultry, Weatherly suggests that poultrymen do the following things during September: Clean and disinfect laying houses before pullets are moved in. Repair roofs, walls, windows, ventilators and floors before cold weather. Check all lighting equipment. Lay in a supply of good litter. Provide at least one foot of feeding space for each five hens. If pullets haven't been fascinated for peck, do it now. Provide plenty of ventilation in the house until cold weather. Cull old hens and pullets closely. September is a good time to start fall chicks. It takes plenty of good, clean feed to make eggs. Weatherly points out. A hen laying 110 to 120 eggs requires 69.3 pounds of feed and uses 7.06 pounds to make a dozen of eggs. A hen laying 200 to 270 eggs needs 84 pounds of feed and uses 3.73 pounds to make a dozen.

PAPER MILLS' WASTE YIELDS RARE SUGAR

A rare sugar, which until recently cost \$18,000 a pound and is needed to make Vitamin B-2, can now be had in almost unlimited quantities from the liquor waste of American paper mills. The sugar is d-ribose. The waste is sulfite liquor. Just a small fraction of the liquor now poured into streams will supply the entire world with all of this sugar it needs for all now known purposes. The report was made to the American Chemical Society by Dr. Jonas Kamlet of the Miles laboratories, New York. B-2, also named riboflavin, is one of the three substances now added to white flour under a government sponsored national program. The others are B-1 and iron. Human beings need about two grams of B-2 daily. Eye and mouth troubles are a penalty of too little. For addition to bread, the B-2 has to be synthesized. But it has been one of the most difficult of all vitamins to make artificially, chiefly because of scarcity of the d-ribose sugar. A Swedish process produces a low cost ordinary baker's yeast from the paper mill sulfite liquors. This yeast is the source of the rare sugar. Dr. Kamlet credited the U.S. Bureau of Standards with the discovery that the sugar could be isolated from the yeast. Machine tool output in July exceeded a year ago by 96 percent. A total of 28,300 new machine tool units were shipped out.

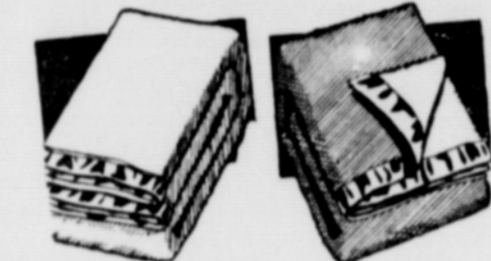
WANDA JEAN HALL IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF GIRLS' AUXILIARY

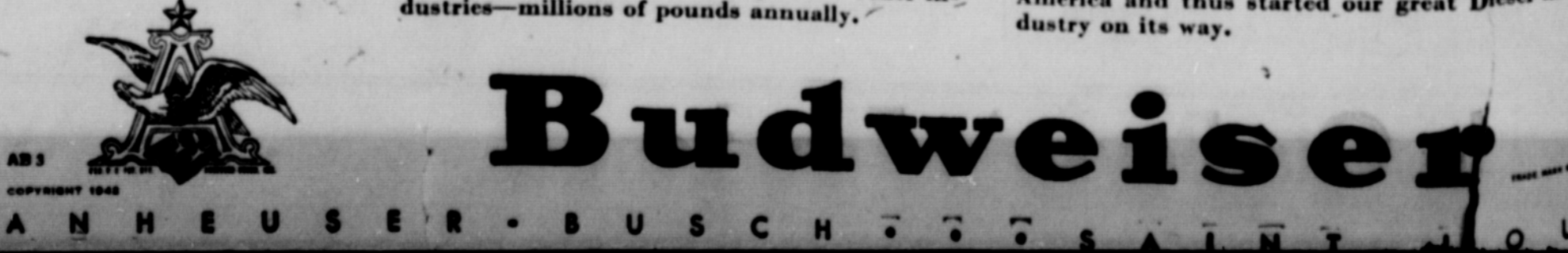

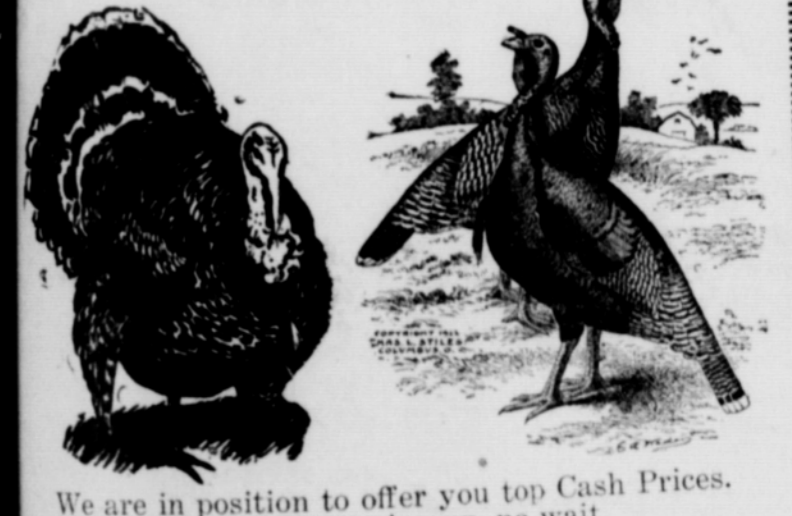

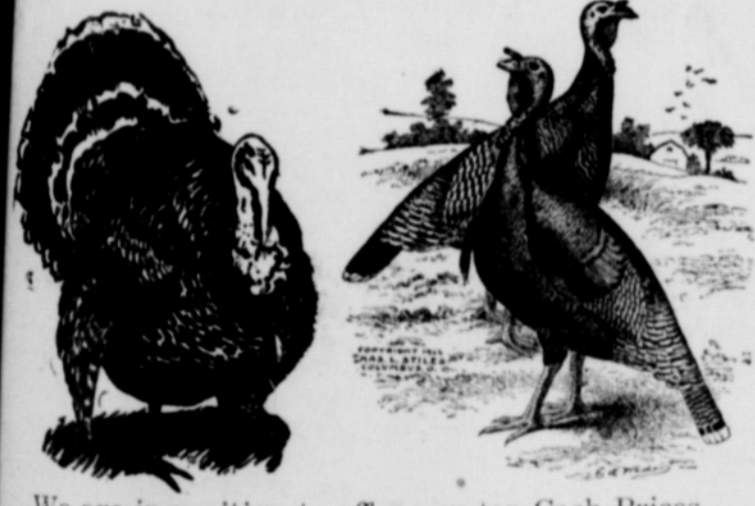
