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Fire Chief Walker Gives Latest Tips In Fighting Bombs

New instructions in fighting fire bombs have been announced as a result of extensive research by technicians in the United States and England, it is reported by Marvin Hall, State Fire Defense Coordinator.

In a communication to Fire Chief V. C. Walker, Mr. Hall stated, "All civilians should become familiar with the new and safer method of fighting incendiary bombs, described in the latest instructions released by OGD. These are the result of extensive experiments by OGD technicians and the Chemical Warfare Service of the U. S. Army. The new method has already been adopted in England and New Zealand."

Chief Walker said that the most important change in technique is that which calls for the use of a jet of water instead of a spray. A speedy attack on the bomb with a jet of water will knock the bomb out in less than one minute, thus saving valuable time which can be used in attacking other bombs nearby before they can start serious fires. Sand is not to be used except where water is not available or where the glare of the bomb can be seen by enemy flyers, he said.

Briefly, the latest instructions are:

1. Bring your fire fighting equipment to the scene at once.
2. Shoot a jet of water directly at the bomb without delay, to put it out of action quickly.
3. Then use the jet, quickly, to quench the fragments and the fires that might have been started.
4. Be absolutely sure all the fire is out before you leave the scene.
5. Use a course spray only where scattering of metal must be avoided.
6. Use sand only if a bomb falls where it is not likely to start a fire, or if water is not available.

Chief Walker pointed out that the desirable jet of water can be obtained from a garden hose, any type of water fire extinguisher, a pump-tank extinguisher, or a stirrup pump.

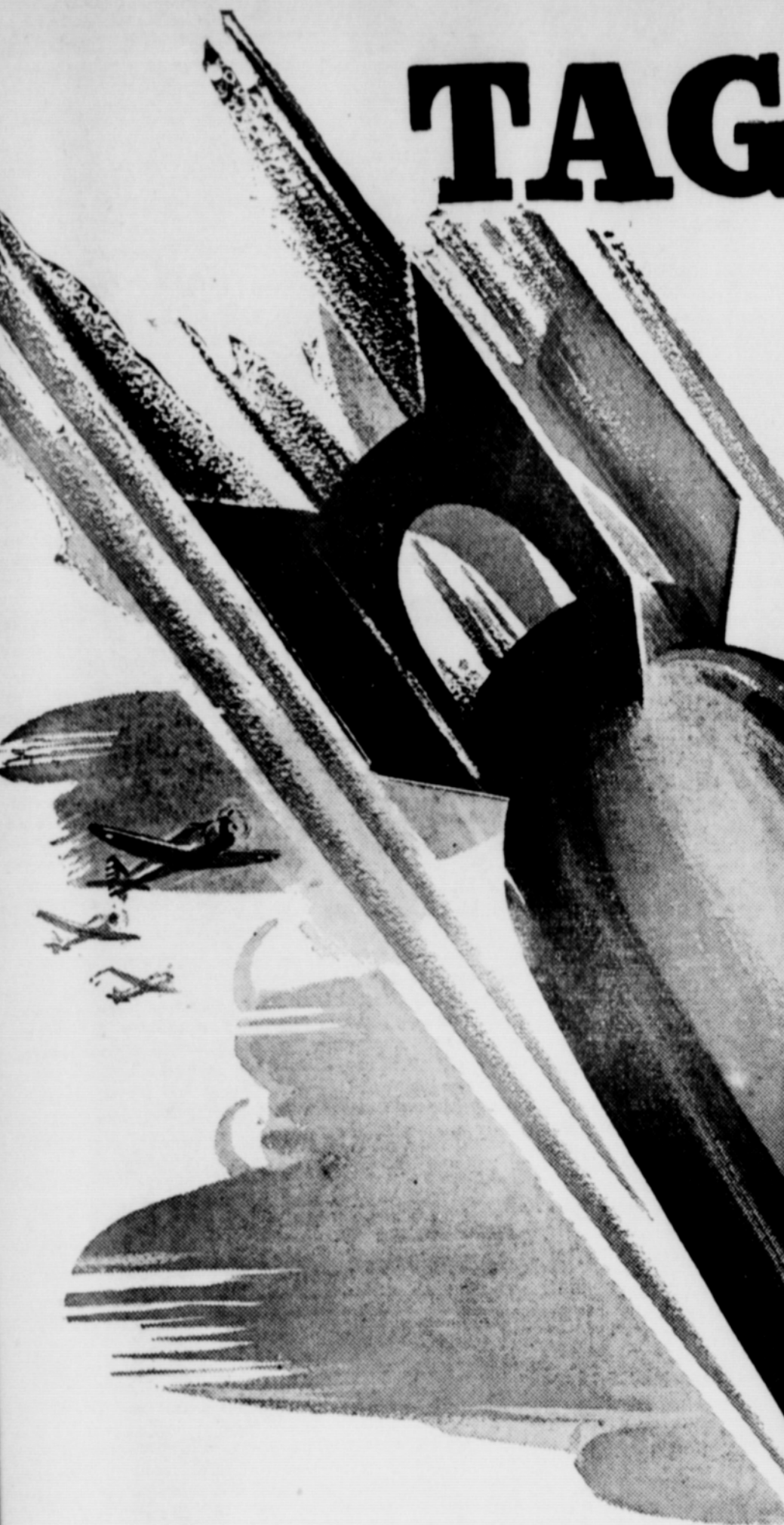

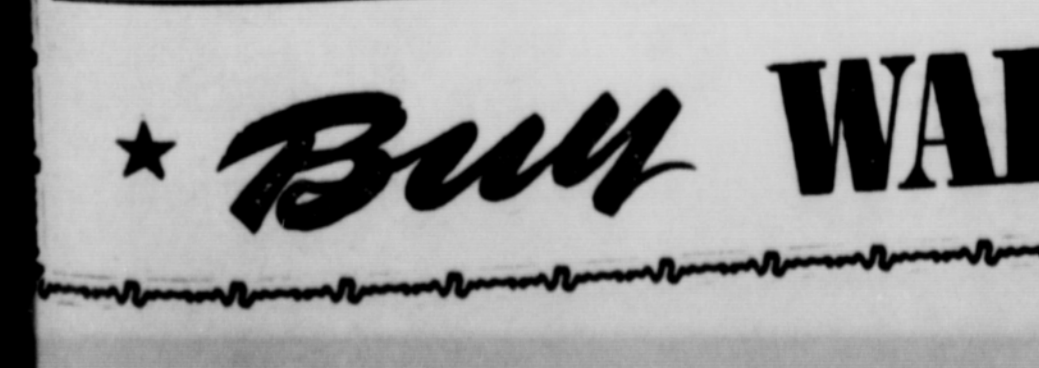

Little Squibs Gleaned From Files Of Review

September 23, 1942: Leonard Davidson, high school athlete here, gained a decision in a three round boxing match with D. Bowman, of Rising Star, at the annual fair and farm exhibition there Friday night.

The first two rounds were about even with Davidson getting the better of the first and Bowman that of the second, but at the sound of the bell for the last round, the Cross Plains boy began to place heavy and effective blows to the head and body of his opponent.

Referee Bill Pancake lifted Davidson's hand as winner at the close of the third.

September 23, 1932: Coleman county's first community fair of the fall season was held at Comal school, seven miles Southwest of here Saturday. The displays and exhibitions were sponsored by the Comal Home Demonstration Club, which was organized less than six months ago. Mrs. E. E. Rich is chairman of the club and Mrs. O. J. Knight is secretary.

More than 100 people attended the fair and viewed the exhibits, according to an announcement from Miss Gertrude Brown, Home Demonstration Agent of Coleman County. Judge of the exhibits were Miss Myrtle Younglove and Mrs. Carter Dilwell.

Outside exhibits by the Cross Plains Hardware, J. E. Henkel and Rae-Echo Club were given honorable mention in the classing.

October 14, 1932: Funeral services for Mrs. Martha Vestal, 82, a pioneer citizen into this section, was held at the Cross Plains cemetery Monday afternoon. Rev. S. P. Collins conducted the rites. Mrs. Vestal succumbed Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Effie Lacy.

She was laid to rest in the Cross Plains cemetery beside her husband, T. B. Vestal, who died in 1917.

Mrs. Vestal was born in South county, Texas, August first, 1850. She had been a resident of this locality more than 50 years and was perhaps one of the best known pioneer women settling in this section.

Surviving are seven children, they are Mrs. E. E. Lacy, Eastland; Mrs. W. P. Armstrong, Cross Plains; Mrs. J. T. Harris, Cross Plains; Mrs. Will Roberts, Hico; Mrs. R. B. Forbes, Ayr; E. I. Vestal and T. L. Vestal, Cross Plains.

October 14, 1932: Stanel Greenwood, high school football player, who sustained a broken vertebra in the Albany game, there, Friday, was reported recovering normally from the Sealy hospital, Santa Anna, Thursday morning. He will probably be moved to Cross Plains Saturday, doctors stated.

Greenwood was injured late in the third quarter of the game, when blocked by an Albany back-field man. Team-mates thinking that he was only stunned supported him on their shoulders and walked him about the field. He was unable to command his legs however, and was rushed to an Albany physician, who diagnosed the case.

Ex-ray pictures made at the Sealy hospital Sunday revealed that a back vertebra was broken and the boy was placed in a steel cast. Physicians told the Review that he would probably have to wear the cast six weeks at least.

Scores of high school friends and Buffalo football fans visited Stanel at the hospital the past week. He was suffering quite a bit the first of the week, but doctors explained that the first few days in the cast were always most severe.

Before being removed from the game because of injuries, Stanel fought a gallant fight for the purple and gold and although defeat was eminent, team-mates declared that his spirit was unbroken. "He's one of the noblest men ever to don a uniform for the herd, I think," said Captain Tommie Webb.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State institutions of higher education.

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State institutions of higher education."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout this State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State institutions of higher education."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

Section 4. Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballots, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 5. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

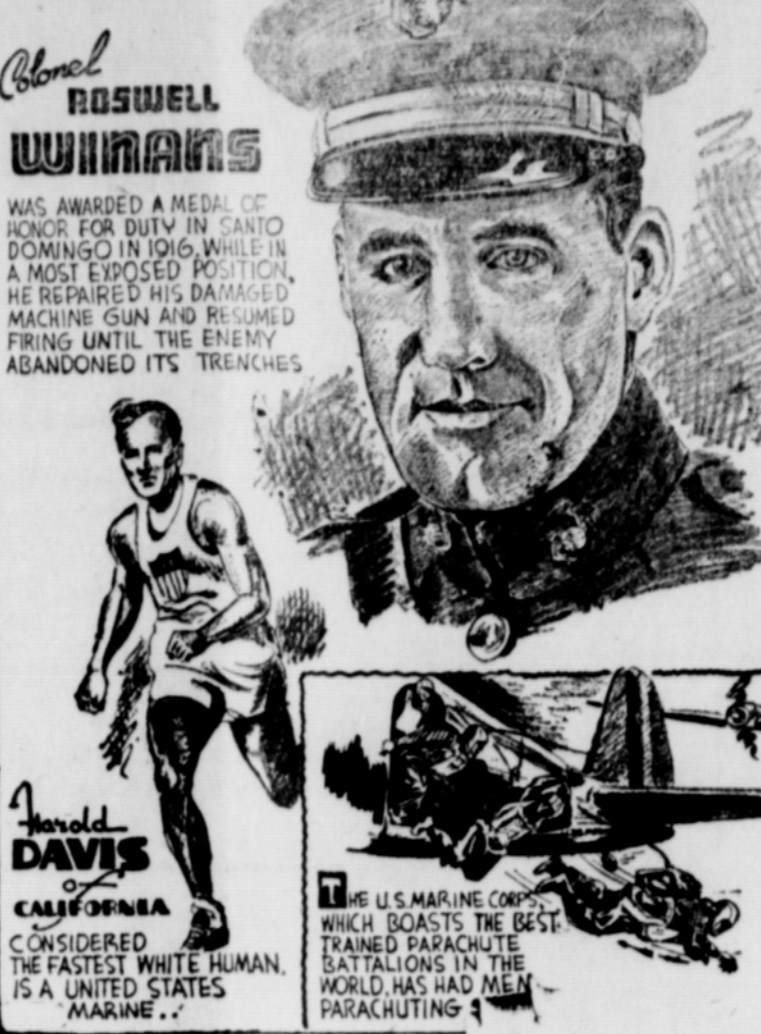

Transfers From Cross Cut And Bayou Expected To Bolster Walker's Team

Between lectures at the 10th annual Texas coaching school in Abilene Tuesday, Soc Walker, Cross Plains coach, took time out to discuss with a reserved amount of enthusiasm football prospects for the fall.

Starting his fourth year as mentor at Cross Plains, Walker, former Daniel Baker player, will have a nucleus of five regulars from the 1941 team and a number of promising transfers from Bayou and Cross Cut.

A 1940 letterman who was ineligible last year, Tommy Hinkle, 145-pound backfielder, promises to be the star of the team. He is an outstanding punter, kicking the ball around 45 yards consistently.

There are two other letter backfielders to go with him. They are Donnie Ray Kelly, a stand-by for two years, and Jerry Angeley, 160-pound regular. Kelly weighs 145 pounds.

Leading linemen are D. C. Foster, a guard and A. D. Fincher, two-year veteran at tackle and the biggest man on the squad. He weighs 240 pounds.

A 195-pound transfer from Cross Cut should lend weight to the line, Walker said. The transfer lettered at Vernon in 1940 and is experienced in the game. Some of the other transfers have had little experience.

Leonard Swafford, who won the state rural pentathlon last spring for Bayou, will be among the football candidates this fall. King, Sawyer and McLean are among the other transfers from Bayou.

Walker said he suffered a heavy loss when his star tackle, an all-district man in 1940, joined the navy this summer.

Cross Plains' opening game will be September 12 at Coleman.
