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



SIGNIFICANCE OF INSCRIPTION ON OUR DOLLAR BILLS

A Treasury department circular states that the design on the back of the new one dollar silver certificates presents for the first time on any money issued by the United States, a representation of both the obverse and reverse of the Great Seal of the United States, first adopted in 1782, prior to the adoption of the Constitution.

The reverse of the Great Seal shows an unfinished pyramid, surmounted by an eye in a triangular glory. The pyramid bears in Roman numerals the year of the Declaration of Independence, 1776. Above the eye is the Latin motto "Annuit Coeptis," rendered as "He (God) favored our undertakings." The motto at the bottom, "Novus Ordo Seclorum," is translated as "A new order of the ages."

The eye and triangular glory symbolizes an all-seeing Deity. The pyramid is the symbol of strength and its unfinished condition denotes the belief of the designers of the Great Seal that there was still work to be done. Both the mottoes on the reverse of the seal are condensations of excepts from Virgil's Aeneid.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.
