WIND RAIN AND HAIL LAST SUNDAY EVENING

A severe wind storm accompanied by a downpour of rain, and hail extended over this community last Sunday evening. Considerable property damage is reported from various parts of the surrounding country and a number of windows were broken out in Cross Plains, the interiors of the buildings being damaged by the rain and hail. The new oil derrick which was completed last week by the Penant Oil & Gas Co. on the Newton location about 2 1-2 miles west of Cross Cut, was blown down and completely wrecked. The contractors at this well state that it will require about ten days to rebuild the derrick. At Pink Barr's home near Cross Plains all the brick flues were blown down considerably damaging the roof. A dwelling house on the Newton farm near the destroyed derrick was blown from its block.

Mr. A. G. Crabb who was unfortunate enough to have a car stolen in Breckenridge a few weeks ago was notified by a deputy sheriff of Eastland County one day last week that the car had been found near LeeRay. Mr. Crabb went to Eastland, paid the reward and was given possession of the car.

BIG STILL DESTROYED BY DEPUTY SHERIFF LEM IRVIN

A wild cat still of unusual capacity but believed to have not been in operation very long was located the first of last week by Deputy Sheriff Lem in the mountains about six miles north of Hilburn just over the Callahan county line. He kept a close watch on the still until Thursday in an effort to arrest the parties who were operating it but during the time no one appeared on the scene. Thursday with the help of J. W. Hale he seized and destroyed the entire equipment. The still was equipped with copper coils and was a first class arrangement in ever respect, having a capacity of making about fifty gallons per day. None of the finished product was found around the premises but about two hundred gallons of mash was destroyed.

SHALLOW WELL NEAR BAIRD SHOWS OIL

Baird, April 30—The Hughes well seven and one half miles north-east of Baird from which oil began to flow about noon Monday of last week, registering a gradual increase in its output. The sand was reached at about 400 feet, and was penetrated only about two feet. Baird is receiving increasing numbers of oil men, arriving from all parts to visit the scene. The well to day is running from 15 to 20 barrels with the sand barely broken. The shallow depth, easy drilling and richness of the sand give assurance of a profitable oil field.

Sheriff G. H. Corn who left Baird Monday morning for Poteau Oklahoma returned home Tuesday evening bringing with him Charley Mann whom he installed in one of his burglar proof boudoirs on the charge of bigamy for which alle-

About three months ago Mann wooed and won a very estimable young lady of this county. The honeymoon was hardly over before rumors spread that there was another Mrs. Mann in Arkansas, of whose two children the bridegroom was the father.

Mann fled but Sheriff Corn traced him to Poteau and his arrest followed.—Baird Star.

KANSAS NEEDS 40,000 MEN IN WHEAT FIELDS

Topeka, Kan., April 25.—Forty thousand harvest hands will be needed in Kansas to harvest the wheat crop, state employment bureau managers who met here today announced. No harvest wage has as yet been fixed but in some localities the farmers are trying to arrange an agreement to pay a daily wage equal to the price of three bushels of wheat at the time of harvest.

MRS. DORA DUNN GIVEN 60 YEARS AT EASTLAND

Mrs. Dora Dunn, a woman living near Mangum, was given a term of 60 years in the penitentiary in the 88th District Court in session at Eastland last week for the murder of her husband several months ago. The judge in reading the sentence misread it as "sixteen years" and the foreman of the jury corrected him, making the sentence sixty years. The murder is described as a particularly bloody one, the woman striking her husband over the head four blows with a pole ax, then to make the job complete pulled his head back and cut his throat with a barlow knife. After the murder was completed she washed the blood from the body and attired it in clean clothes and went about her housework until the afternoon, when she went into Mangum and told relatives of her deed. As her reason for the murder, she said she feared her husband would kill her, but from the verdict rendered one may surmise the jury failed to view the matter in that light. Mrs. Dunn was granted a new trial a short time after her conviction.—DeLeon Free Press.

MRS. MARY HUDSON DIES AT LUBBOCK

Mrs. Mary Hudson, mother of Andy Hudson of Cross Plains, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. A. Posey, at Lubbock on Monday of this week. Mrs. Hudson was one of the Pioneer ladies of Callahan county, having resided here for the last forty two years, until she recently moved to Lubbock and made her home with her daughter. Mrs. Hudson was an excellent lady and her many friends in Callahan county will be saddened to hear of her death. She was 88 years of age. Her surviving son in Cross Plains and other relatives have the sympathy of this community.

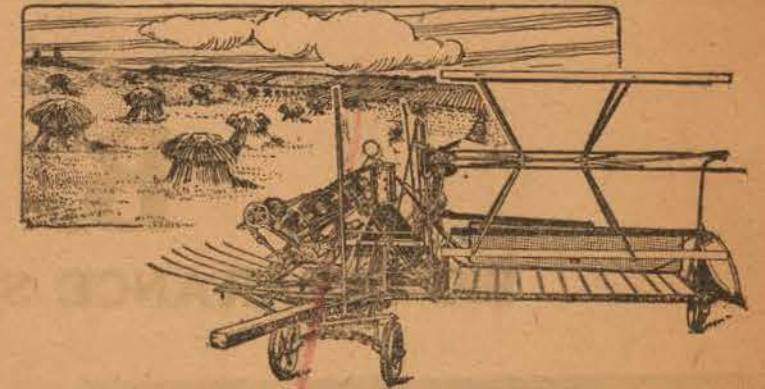

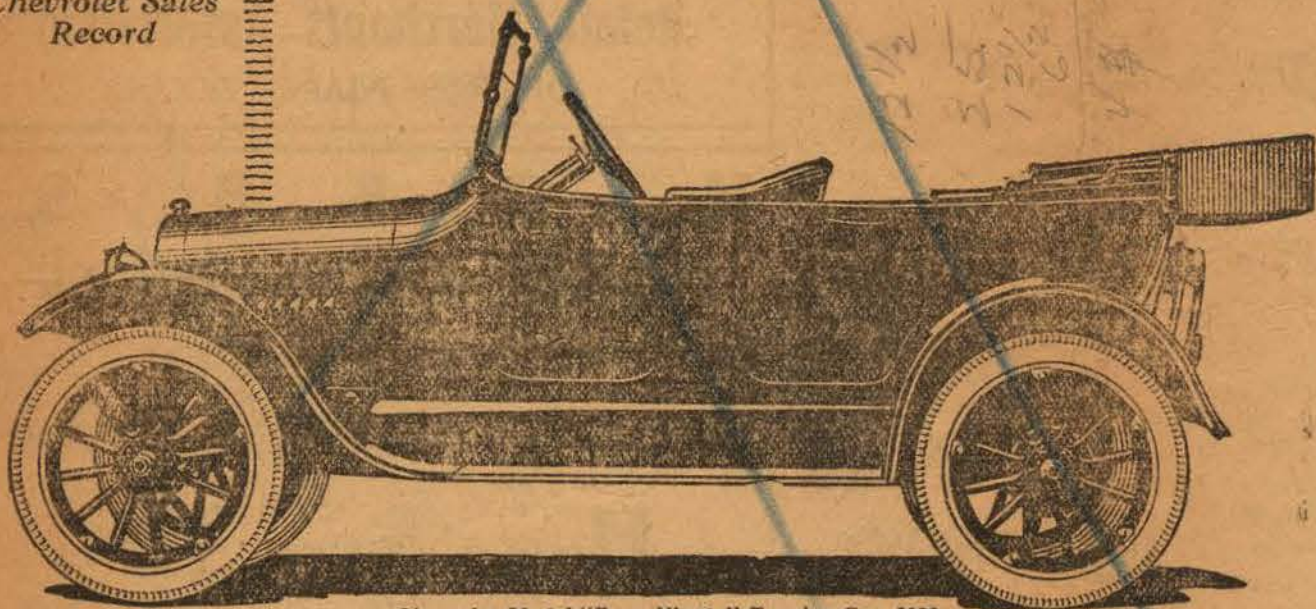
