JERRY ANGELEY LEADS HERD TO 13 - 6 WIN OVER BAIRD BEARS HERE ON FRIDAY NIGHT

Sparked by Jerry Angeley, Cross Plains high school Buffaloes stamped their traditional rivals the Baird Bears here Friday night 13 to six in the first game of the current season for home fans. Cross Plains had the advantage in every department of the game, despite the fact that the local team was somewhat handicapped because of injuries sustained in the Coleman game a week earlier.

The visitors scored first. The Buffaloes were put back on their own 20 yard stripe when a Bear punt soared over the end stripe. A penalty for pushing shoved the locals further back to the five yard line, from which Tommy Hinkle attempted to punt. His kick was blocked and recovered in pay dirt by Don Parker, charging Baird line-man. Baird's attempt to convert from placement was futile.

Cross Plains struck back hurriedly. The Buffaloes received the kick-off and opened an aerial game featuring chunks from Angeley to Brooks Hill, seasoned with runs by Donny Ray Kelley, Hinkle and Angeley that advanced the ball to Baird's 11 yard line with first down to go. From this point the herd adopted a straight line thrust campaign. The fourth try struck the pay sand with Angeley carrying and the score was tied. Cross Plains failed to convert from placement.

A few minutes later the Bears were held for downs on their own 40. A punt was attempted but the entire Buffalo line was in to block the effort. The ball bounded backward and was finally covered inside the 10 yard line. Again Cross Plains elected to power it over and the strategy was correct for Angeley

**Here's What A Soldier Must Do To Rate 'Superior'**

CAMP BARKELEY. — A soldier classed as one of "superior physical effectiveness," is able to do the following, according to army standards of the 359th Infantry, designed to harden them for field conditions: Run 100 yards in 10.6 seconds, run a mile in six minutes, heave a 12-pound shot 40 feet, broad jump 8 feet, 10 inches from a standing position, chin himself 14 times, do 33 push-ups, do 50 sit-ups and complete an obstacle course in 1 minute, 22 seconds.

A "physically fit" soldier can do the following, the army says: Run 100 yards in 13.4 seconds, run a mile in 8 minutes, 15 seconds, heave a shot 21 feet, 6 inches, broad jump six feet, chin himself four times, do 12 push-ups, do 15 sit-ups and complete an obstacle course in 2 minutes, 30 seconds.

Officers do not escape these rigors, for they, too, are required to share them with enlisted men.
