FOOD FOR VICTORY

Food in Callahan County helps the Axis. Homemakers to fight waste, can use of stale bread.

Brown, County Home Demonstration Agent with A. and Extension Service, suggests ever bread be made into toast—an oven-dried toast, browned, thin, crisp and bread which comes ready-made. It's cut into sticks and is cut in half horizontally, an extremely sharp bread.

have the oven very hot. Miss Brown warns, in a tin with a tight lid, keep crisp for some time, crackers. For later use it should be kept in a tin. A toast can be used in ordinary toast under erickson, fish, clipped beef, or asparagus.

pieces of bread, oven-dried, dark, can be rolled out in crumbs. Store them in a covered with cheese. They will be ready to use on scalloped or "au gratin" dishes.

Clean and disinfect laying houses before pullets are moved in.

Repair roofs, walls, windows, ventilators and floors before cold weather.

Check all lighting equipment.

Lay in a supply of good litter.

Provide at least one foot of feeding space for each five hens.

If pullets haven't been vaccinated for fox pox, do it now.

Provide plenty of ventilation in the house until cold weather.

Cull old hens and pullets closely. September is a good time to start fall chicks.

It takes plenty of good, clean feed to make eggs. A hen laying 110 to 120 eggs requires 99.3 pounds of feed and uses 7.06 pounds to make a dozen of eggs. A hen laying 290 to 270 eggs needs 84 pounds of feed and uses 3.73 pounds to make a dozen.
