## UNITED WAR CHEST RALLY SET

### Registration Started For War Ration Book 4

#### TO BE HELD HERE ON OCTOBER 30TH; STORES WILL CLOSE

Callahan County Is Called Upon To Raise \$4,900.00 By Middle Of November

A rally to raise Cross Plains' share of the county quota of \$4,900.00 will be held on the streets here Saturday afternoon of next week, October 30. All local business concerns will close promptly at four o'clock to permit their clerks and customers to attend the observance.

Co-chairman of the drive in the Cross Plains precinct are F. V. Tunnell and Rev. C. D. Wooten, who are making plans for the rally in the hope of achieving Callahan county's quota in this drive as in all other war undertakings.

Funds raised in the United War Chest drive will be allocated among the following 17 organizations: United Service Organizations (USO), United Seaman's Service, War Prisoners Aid, Belgian War Relief Society, French Relief Fund, British War Relief Society, Friends of Luxembourg, Greek War Relief Association, Norwegian Relief, Polish War Relief, Queen Wilhelmina Fund, Russian War Relief, United China Relief, United Czechoslovak Relief, United Yugoslav Relief Fund, Refugee Relief Trustee and U. S. Committee Care of European Children.

"We can't all fight, we want all suffer, but we can all give," Lee said in discussing the campaign and the need for funds.

### SCHOOL DISMISSED TO PERMIT FACULTY TO HANDLE THE JOB

#### Sign-Up Thursday, Friday Or Saturday At School Building; 8 A. M. To 6

Family heads began signing for war ration book four in Cross Plains Thursday morning at the high school building. Registration is to continue through Saturday, according to A. J. McCuin, superintendent of school, who is in charge of the sign-up here.

Members of the school faculty are handling the registration and will be on the job from eight a.m. until six p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons.

Either of the family heads may make application for the entire family, the Review is informed, however, it is pointed out that war ration book three for each member of the family should be brought at the time of making application for ration book four.

To permit members of the school faculty to help in the registration, classes will be dismissed Thursday and Friday, it was decided by the board of trustees in regular meeting Monday night.

All persons residing in the Cross Plains school district will be accommodated in the registration here.

### Horse Theft Case Again In Courts After Many Years

Horse theft, which supposedly bit the dust with the advent of the automotive age, cropped up in 42nd district court before Judge Milburn S. Long Monday and found the law just as firm as in the days when horse flesh wasn't used for steaks.

West Texas jurists scratched their heads and began reminiscing as R. C. Van Whalde drew a three year prison term on his plea of guilty before Judge Long to a charge of horse theft.

Van Whalde waived his right to trial by jury to the charge that he took a horse belonging to F. T. Duty here on or about August 18, later allegedly selling the animal for \$25. He was arrested in Fort Worth several weeks later.

The missing mount, which Van Whalde claimed was in his pasture, was later located on a ranch in Jones county.
