The Judge read the yerdict aloud: 'We, the jury, find the defendant, Newt Mananey, guilty as charged in the indictment and assess his punishment at four years in the State penitentiary.

MANY DEEP TESTS TO BE MADE IN CALLAHAN CO. Bros. & Co.

Anthony McCauley in the Baird Star of last week, gives a lengthy, as well as a most flattering report on oil operations in Callahan county. The developmen's on which this report is based are not connected with the local Cross Plains-Pioneer tield, the greater part of which is just across the line in Eastland county, but is contined largely to the great snallow field, the deep tests that are in process of drilling and a number of other prospective deep tests that will be made in various parts of Callahan county. Concern ing these developments the report states that the recent rains have supplied an abundance of water to enable a number of the deep tests that have been shut down to resume operations and make possible the drilling of others on the schedule. Within two to three weeks at least a dozen wells, headed for the deep sands will be under operation, and these added to the ever increasing number of shallow wells being put down, will make the oil industry of

Callahan County hum. Another deep test well is soon to be started on the Hall ranch. about ten miles west of Cross Pains Ne gotiations for a large block of acre age on which this well is to be drilled, are progressing satisfactoril.

The Crissman deep test well, six miles northrast of Baird is down 3 .-100 feet, with non dditional develop ments to report.

A feature of the deep wells in this county, almost without exception, is the fact that shallow oil could have been produced at a profit. But as they were financed to go to the deeper sands, it was not deemed advisable to stop at such shallow depths as 400 to 600 feet. So widely scattered are these deep wells that it argue well for the tuture of the shallow oil incustry in this courty, since men with small machines are getting in here in large numbers and taking over these semiproven areas as fast as they can come upon them and find them open. Many such leases still remain in the hands of the men who drilled the deeper wells, and in all probability they will reenter the field and do their part to open up the shallow



HOLY PLACES IN JERUSALEM

Stations of the Cross Are Objects of the Most Solemn Reverence at Easter Time.

The stations of the cross, the eighth of which is shown in the illustration, are the objects of solemn reverence in Jerusalem on Easter. The 14 stations are supposed to fix the site of the chief events on the path of Christ from Pilate's hall to Calvary. The first station is in the barracks on the site of the castle of Antonio. Here Christ was condemned to death. The second station marks the spot where the cross was laid upon Christ. At the third station Christ is said to have sunk under the weight of the cross. At the fourth station Christ is believed to have met His mother. The fifth station on the sorrowful way is where Simon of Cyrene relieved Christ of the cross. At the sixth station is the house of Saint Veronica who is said to have wiped the Savior's brow with her veil. The seventh station is at the Porta Judiciaria where Christ fell a second time under the cross. It is at the eighth station that Jesus comforted the women of Jerusalem. The ninth station is in front of the Coptie monastery. Stations ten, eleven twelve and thirteen are in the Goigotha chapels of the church of the Holy Sepulchre, marking the spots where Jesus was disrobed and fastened to

the cross, where the cross was raised and the spot where the Virgin Mary received the body of Christ as it was taken down from the cross. The last station is at the tomb in the church of the Holy Sepulchre. It is now marked by a chapel, a building erected inside the church, Many priceless lamps hang before the marble-topped tomb, now one of the most venerated alters in Christendom, The traditional Gethsemane is on the side of the Mount of Olives across the Kedron. The garden is at present a walled enclosure cared for by Franciscan monks who bestow great attention on eight ancient olive trees supposed to be remnants of a grove standing at the time of Christ's agony.

WOULD AUTHORIZE THE SCRAPPING OF SHIPS

Enactment Of Specific Legislation By Congress is Urged In The House.

Washington,-While the Navy Department believes the President has full power to order the scrapping of warships under the naval treaty, Assistant Secretary Roosevelt told the House Naval Committee it might be best to authorize the step by specific

He asked that provision for the scrapping be embraced in a separate bill and opposed an omnibus bill, which would include the committee proposal for limiting the navy to 80,-000 Unlisted men and 6,000 apprentices.

An opposite view regarding the President's authority was expressed to the committee by Representative Tucker (Dem.) of Virginia, who said debt." the treaty could not be executed without approval of the House. Mr. Tucker held that the House should give its assent to ratification by enactment of legislation providing for the disposal of ships ordered scrap-

Army Officer Shot. Oklahoma, City.-Jean P. Day, former State Supreme Court Justice, is being held under \$5,000 appearance bond pending an investigation by a coroner's jury into the death of Lieutenant Colonel Paul W. Public Works and Road Building in the Times of Industrial Depression

By ARTHUR WOODS, President's Conference on Unemployment.

Public works and road building in the times of industrial depression has long been an expedient to relieve the hardships of such periods. There is, of course, no cure for unemployment except employment; everything else is a makeshift, a palliative. If, therefore, public works can be increased as private industry decreases, a part of the trough of depression can perhaps be filled up. It would clearly bring about no real improvement

in the situation if public projects were started simply for the sake of providing jobs, and if the work accomplished were not of service and value to the community. Non-productive work, which does not result in an increase of things people need, would prove simply a boomerang as a means of relieving unemployment. Work that does not add to the store of needed things, that cannot be paid for by what it creates, is in the end destructive rather than creative.

The movement during the winter toward the construction of highways, the building of bridges, and the erection of public works has been unprecedented in volume. The sales of municipal bonds for public works in 1921 were about double those of any previous year, and nearly three times the amount of those for any year before the war. In September the total sales of municipal bonds throughout the country amounted to \$86,477,162. In October the figure rose to \$113,787,230; and in November it was \$117,950,261; while in December it reached the unprecedented amount of \$210,819,584.

It is well to do, in times when ordinary business has slowed up, public works which are necessary, which must be done anyway within a few months or a year.

But no matter how successful such efforts are to alleviate them, these recurring depressions are intolerable. Before he had reached the age of 16, she says, Custer married a widow at Baird, but this marriage was soon annulled when it was learned that he was a bit too youg to assume the responsibilities of a benedict.

Wite Nd. 2, it is alleged, was acquired four years ago, also at Baird. In April of the year 1918, wife No. 3 states, Custer married Cora Richardson at Baird, and it is this wife with whom he has been living of late in ElPaso. Deputy Sheriff Looney says that Custer married this wos man under the name of Troxel.

On Sept. 19, 1921, at the home of the Rev. Layton Maddex, a Baptist minister of Waco, the young weman who is now in Cisco says that she married Custer, thinking that his name was Robert L. Burns, and she backs up her assertions with a McLennan county marriage license, issued by the county clerk at Waco, on September 18.

Custer won her over after a brief but impetuous courtship, she says. Four babies, each weighing less He wasn't doing anything in Waco, one pound, were born to Mrs. she states, more than "he "dandy-looking" fellow, with quite winning ways.

But, only two weeks after their marriage, Mrs. Alderman-Burns was left with only her baby, she says. In fact, she states that her husband got away with some of her belongings and left her "on her uppers." She says she even got him a job, but that he wouldn't stay with it any longer thin he staved with her.

Wife No. 3 says she has traited him all over the state since October last, going to Mexia and other oil field towns, and that she finally came to Cisco, a month ago, to get acquainted with her mother-in-law and see if she could not get a trail on

Custer, she says, is a son of Mrs Bisbee, who lives five miles southwest of Cisco on a farm.

'I don't know whether I want to see him when he is brought through Cisco or not," she stated this morn-"I am afraid I might be tempted to do something desperate. I am going out to talk the matter over with his mother this afternoon.

"I have heard that the woman with whom he is now living-his second wife-is a fine girl, and I do not want to cause her any more trouble than is neces sary. Fo vever I feel that he hasn't cone me right, and I want him 'called to time' and that is the reason I made the complaint before the county attorney at Waco."



FEAR RIOTING ON **EASTER SUNDAY**

FREE STATE TROOPS ORGANIZE TO SUPPRESS SNIPING BY VALERISTS.

RUMORS ARE VERY OMINOUS

Efforts Are Made to Interfere With Troop Movements by Destroying Tracks.

Dublin .- Ominous rumors that Irish Republican extremists are preparing an Easter coup were circulating here as Free State troops organized to uppress sniping and sporadic outbreaks which are harassing sentries and have resulted in the slaying of on officer of the Royal Irish Constabulary. Officials have been unable to trace

these rumors of the threatened organized outbreak, but, recalling the strong sentiment attached to the Easter season since the rebellion of 1916, Free State forces are being put on their guard throughout Ireland. Sniping of sentries has become so

erious that Free State forces organized an armored patrol and scoured the city and suburbs during the week-end. Warning was issued that drastic

Free State detachments on duty

in the entire district have been equipped with high powered rifles in addition to the regulation revolvers. Guard details have been reinforced. Barbed wire barricades have been thrown around the entrances to Dubin Castle and officers of the Provisional Government are being more strongly guarded than ever.

Every effort was made by the extremists to block trains running into Waxford and railroad track is torn up in many places. Interference with train movements centered on the lines running in from Cork and

British troops evacuating military barracks at Youghal were caught in a burst of firing from the barracks occupied by Republican troops. The imperial forces then reoccupied the barracks. Details as to casualties, if any, were not obtainable. Troop movements in other sections were clouded with similar upcertainty.







DEATH SIAMESE TWINS

The bodies of Rosa and Josefa Blazek, the jointed twins who died in Chicago last week, have been ordered to a University in Prague. their native city and may be exhibited in a museum there. After their death the public was permitted to view their bodies in Chicago and the undertaking establishment was thronged all of one day, chiefly by

According to news reports the parentage of Franz. the 12-year old boy, is now the subject of a het dispute, upon the outcome of which depends the disposition of the \$200. 000 estate left by the twins Xvay experts, who have photographed the bodies, say it would have been impossible for either or the sisters to have given birth to a child except by a Caesarian operation, and there is no trace of such an operation.

Drs. Otradovoc and Lecount. who made a post-morrem examination Sunday, announce that Joseta was the true mother of the boy instead of Rosa. The manager of the twins insists Rosa was the mother and the records in Europe will prove this.

Other physicians who examined the twins at 'he time of a clinic to decide whether or not they could be cut apart, said that Rosa was fully developed sexually, but that Josefa's organs were infantile. The X ray photographs show the sisters had a joint lower stomach. a joint bladder and a joint womb. They had, also, a community spine, which was in the form of the letter "U." with no endings at the bottom. This discovery proves they could not have hee cut apart without caus ing the death of both.

The manager of the twins has filed a claim for \$400 against their estate. The brother, Frank, the son, Franz, and the personal maid who attended the twins, insist that the estate shall also pay their fare back to Czecho-Slovakia. I hese claims complicate the question as to whether he estate of the sisters shall be probated here or in Czecho-Slovakia. 


