MIDNIGHT STORM KILLS 3 AT OPLIN; 1 AT BAYOU

CROSS PLAINS MAINTAINS RAPID GROWTH IN BUILDING AND IN POPULATION

The end of each week continues to disclose a rapid increase in the growth of Cross Plains, both from a substantial industrial and population standpoint. This fact is viewed with a greater cheer and satisfaction to our citizens than are any other developments following the oil business in this part of the country.

The next biggest thing that will be read with both local and foreign interest, is an item of news contained in the last issue of the Pioneer Oil Herald, whose editor is on the job and displays a commendable ability in keeping up with the big news and the big things they are doing in the Cross Plains-Pioneer oil field. That paper reports that two thousand dollars cash an acre for eighty acres, or \$160,000, was paid by the Duquesne Oil Co., the biggest price paid for oil and gas property in the local field up to this time. This price is exceeded by but few deals in the great Breckenridge and Mexia fields. The property was owned and sold by the Litzinger Oil Trust of Butler, Pa.

The tract purchased is the W. R. Smith eighty acres that lies between the two largest producing oil wells of the field, The L. King tract and well is an offset on the east of the north part of the Smith tract while the B. F. Eakin tract on which was drilled the Stone & McMurry Eakin No. 1 well is on the west an offset to this costly tract.

EIGHT MONTHS TERM ENDS PUBLIC SCHOOL

With the exception of teaching the tenth grade a few weeks longer by Superintendent Settle for the benefit of the graduating class, the public school of Cross Plains closed last Friday, ending an eight months term. Other classes of the school, under Misses L. Rue Johnson and Lillian Robertson, may also be taught on a subscription or individual pay plan until the first of May, thus completing a nine months term of a part of the school that is most urgent.

M. R. HALEY DIES SUDDENLY AT HIS HOME

M. R. Haley, for many years county surveyor of Callahan county, died suddenly at his home near Belle Plaine, Tuesday night of last week at 4 o'clock. Mr. Haley was 72 years old and is survived by his wife and several children. For thirty years Mr. Haley kept a daily record of weather conditions, temperature and rainfall. His last weather report, we presume made from an average over Callahan county, showed a rainfall during last month of 3.4 inches, and the temperature at sunrise averaged 39 degrees plus.

Chas. Allen of Oplin was in Cross Plains Monday of this week and gave the Review a detailed account of the casualties and great destruction of property that was caused by the cyclone which struck that little town and community about 1 o'clock last Friday night. Oplin is located by the extreme southern part of this county.

The cyclone began its severest destruction at a point about 2 1/2 miles southeast of Oplin and raged over a strip one-half mile wide. The greatest destruction wrought in that part of the country was in a distance of about five miles of its path. He gave the number of persons who were killed outright at Oplin at three. Many others were seriously injured, nine farm homes were completely destroyed, eight farm houses badly wrecked and a total property loss that will probably exceed \$20,000.

The three persons killed at Oplin were all members of one family and include the wife of Earnest Condiff and their two daughters, aged about five and fifteen respectively. This home was among those completely destroyed, Mr. Condiff and two other members of the family were badly injured.

Among other residents of the Oplin community who were seriously injured was the wife of W. S. Pentecost. Her hip was dislocated, together with other bodily injuries, and it is not expected that she will recover. The infant child in this family and their daughter, about fifteen years old, were seriously injured. D. D. McBride, J. H. Shaw and Mrs. Preston Moore are also reported seriously injured and in a critical condition. One of Mrs. Moore's ears was cut off, and she was otherwise badly injured.

One death and great property loss is reported from the Bayou section that was in the path of the storm.

In that locality the Lofton home was completely destroyed and the Harlow home was wrecked, one child in the Lofton home being killed.

Two of the new oil derricks in that locality and the metal silo on the Hickman farm were blown down.

A distressful condition prevails in the Oplin community. Many are homeless and otherwise in a desolate condition as a result of the disaster, and Mr. Allen and other parties from the devastated communities were here in an effort to secure aid for them.

MAHANEY SENTENCED TO FOUR YEARS IN PRISON

Newt Mahaney must serve four years in the State penitentiary unless the superior courts undo the doom pronounced by a jury in the district court at Eastland Wednesday of last week. The particulars of the fight, in which Sheriff N. E. Eastland county was also involved, occurring on the streets of Cisco and resulting in the trial and conviction of Mahaney, have been given in previous issues of the Review and are familiar to most of our readers. The case was given to the jury at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday evening, and after deliberating about two hours the jurors filed into the court room. In answer to Judge Hill's question as to whether they had reached a verdict, G. B. Mitchell, foreman, answered: "We have." The Judge read the verdict aloud: "We, the jury, find the defendant, Newt Mahaney, guilty as charged in the indictment and assess his punishment at four years in the State penitentiary."

MANY DEEP TESTS TO BE MADE IN CALLAHAN CO.

Anthony McCauley in the Baird Star of last week, gives a lengthy, as well as a most flattering report on oil operations in Callahan county. The developments on which this report is based are not connected with the local Cross Plains-Pioneer field, the greater part of which is just across the line in Eastland county, but is confined largely to the great shallow field, the deep tests that are in process of drilling and a number of other prospective deep tests that will be made in various parts of Callahan county. Concerning these developments the report states that the recent rains have supplied an abundance of water to enable a number of the deep tests that have been shut down to resume operations and make possible the drilling of others on the schedule. Within two to three weeks at least a dozen wells, headed for the deep sands will be under operation, and these added to the ever increasing number of shallow wells being put down, will make the oil industry of Callahan County hum.

Another deep test well is soon to be started on the Hall ranch, about ten miles west of Cross Plains. Negotiations for a large block of acreage on which this well is to be drilled, are progressing satisfactorily.

The Crisman deep test well, six miles northeast of Baird is down 3,100 feet, with no additional developments to report.

A feature of the deep wells in this county, almost without exception, is the fact that shallow oil could have been produced at a profit. But as they were financed to go to the deeper sands, it was not deemed advisable to stop at such shallow depths as 400 to 600 feet. So widely scattered are these deep wells that it argues well for the future of the shallow oil industry in this county, since men with small machines are getting in here in large numbers and taking over these semi-proven areas as fast as they can come upon them and find them open. Many such leases still remain in the hands of the men who drilled the deeper wells, and in all probability they will reenter the field and do their part to open up the shallow sands.

SILVER SHOWING NEAR RISING STAR

According to the Rising Star X-Ray of last week visitors in that city recently were inquiring about the location of the silver showing southwest of the town that was reported by a geologist a few months ago. Inquiries have also been made about the big cement bed located in the mountains just south of the town.

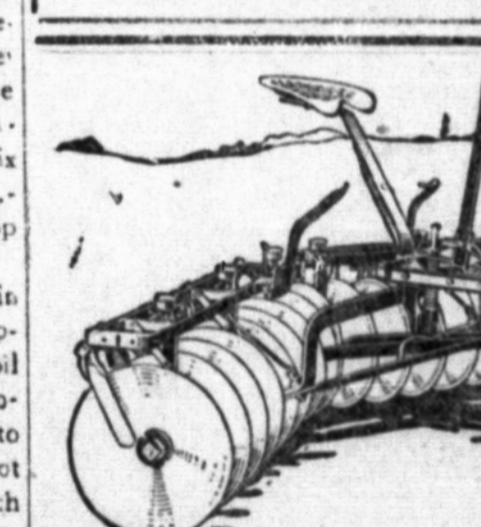

HOLY PLACES IN JERUSALEM
Stations of the Cross Are Objects of the Most Solemn Reverence at Easter Time.
The stations of the cross, the eighth of which is shown in the illustration, are the objects of solemn reverence in Jerusalem on Easter. The 14 stations are supposed to fix the site of the chief events on the path of Christ from Pilate's hall to Calvary. The first station is in the barracks on the site of the castle of Antonia. Here Christ was condemned to death. The second station marks the spot where the cross was laid upon Christ. At the third station Christ is said to have sunk under the weight of the cross. At the fourth station Christ is believed to have met His mother. The fifth station on the sorrowful way is where Simon of Cyrene relieved Christ of the cross. At the sixth station is the house of Saint Veronica who is said to have wiped the Savior's brow with her veil. The seventh station is at the Porta Judiciaria where Christ fell a second time under the cross. It is at the eighth station that Jesus comforted the women of Jerusalem. The ninth station is in front of the Coptic monastery. Stations ten, eleven, twelve and thirteen are in the Goigotha chapels of the church of the Holy Sepulchre, marking the spots where Jesus was disrobed and fastened to

Upon each of the great stations of our calendar year we instinctively pause and give thought to certain phases of life, to close our accounts with the past and to open a new and a clean page. At January 1 our thoughts are apt to be material, to relate to our physical deeds of the past and our promises of betterment in the future. On other days, like July 4 or November 11, our ideas turn to patriotic facts and to noble deeds. At Christmas, in spite of our understanding of the tremendous part of the birth in Bethlehem, we think of children and of the narrow spirituality that of necessity accompanies those who have not yet known sorrow, sin and repentance. But at Easter spiritual thoughts are mature thoughts. Army Officer Shot.

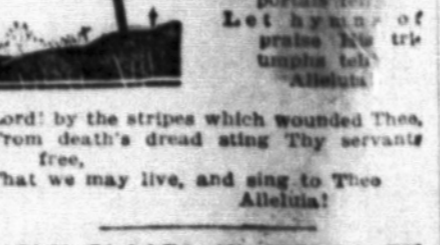
Ford To Employ 200 Ex-Service Men.
Detroit, Mich.—Edsel Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company, notified headquarters of the Veterans of Foreign Wars here that he will employ 200 men daily from the "Veterans" Bureau for an indefinite period. THE MARKETS

WASHINGTON, D. C. week ending April 18, 1922.
GRAIN—Prices unsettled during week and averaged lower. Chicago May wheat down to closing at \$1.31-1/2; Chicago May corn down 1-1/2c to \$1-1/2. Argentina reported Germany arranging for additional credit of \$25,000,000 with that country, to buy grain and other commodities. HAY—Market generally firm because of light receipts. Prices advanced at Pittsburgh and Chicago. Alfalfa wanted at Chicago. Demand for better quality hays is likely to weaken with larger receipts. No. 1 alfalfa Kansas City \$22, Memphis \$20, No. 1 prairie Kansas City \$13 3/4, Chicago \$14.
FEED—Mill feed markets unchanged. Underlying conditions slightly firmer. Wheat and corn feed production rather heavy, offering liberal outlet. Jobbing demand held prices steady. Interior demand unimproved. Alfalfa meal steady. Domestic and export demand for meal negligible.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES—Potato markets weaker. Florida spaulding rose No. 1 down \$1-2 per bin. In leading markets firm demand moderate. Texas Bermuda No. 1 and 2 \$4-6 per standard crate in consuming centers, partly graded stock \$3.25 to \$3.40 f. o. b. cash. California cauliflower steady in New York City at \$1.75 per crate. Imperial Valley lettuce \$-4 per crate in New York. Domestic stock strong for Texas stock. Domestic flat stock \$40-55 per ton in leading cities.
LIVE STOCK AND MEATS—Chicago hog prices advanced 15-40c. Beef steers practically steady, butcher cows and heifers firm to 15c higher. Veal calves generally 25c higher. Chicago prices: Hogs, top, \$10.80; bulk of sales \$10.15-10.30; medium and good beef steers \$12.25-12.50; butcher cows and heifers \$11.80-12.25; calves \$9-10.75; light and medium weight veal calves \$25-27.50. The trend of eastern wholesale fresh meat prices was upward.

EASTER LESSON
LESSON TEXT—John 20:19-31.
GOLDEN TEXT—"The Lord is risen indeed.—Luke 24:7.
PRIMARY AND JUNIOR TOPIC—The Resurrection.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Why We Serve Easter Day.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Effect of Belief in the Resurrection.

1. Jesus Manifests Himself to the Disciples, Thomas Being Absent (vv. 19-25).
He appeared to several of His disciples at several different times during that day. This is the first appearance to the disciples as a body. The rumors of His several appearances on that day caused the matter to be discussed.

"I have seen the Lord," said the disciples to the one who had been absent. "The Lord is risen indeed." "Peace be unto you," said the Lord. "He did not come with censure for their failure and desertion. At His birth the angels announced 'Peace.' Just before he took His departure, He said: 'Peace be unto you; my peace I leave unto you' (John 14:27); 'Let not your heart be troubled' (John 14:1); and now the first word after His resurrection is 'Peace.' Having culminated their fears, He gave them an unmistakable evidence of His resurrection. 'And when He had so said, He showed unto them His hands and His side. Then were the disciples glad when they saw the Lord.' Their doubts needed to be scattered, and His peace needed to be upon them. Consider:

1. The disciples' commission (v. 21). "As My Father hath sent Me, even so send I you." This commission was not simply to a class, as the eleven, but to all Christians. In Luke 24:33 we find that there were others there in that meeting besides the eleven when Jesus showed himself to them and commissioned them, showing that the commission is not confined to a class or order, but is wide as the Christian body itself. All Christians, therefore, are envoys and representatives of Christ. The exercise of this great function is not merely optional with the individual, but is obligatory upon him. The Lord placed it upon a plane with His own commission from the Father—"As My Father hath sent me, so send I you."

2. The disciples' equipment (v. 22). "He breathed on them, and said unto them, Receive ye the Holy Ghost." The mission of the disciple is a very great one, but every one who goes forth in its execution. He clothes with the power of a new life by the bestowment of His spirit. No one who has this equipment shall ever fail. The Lord's representatives have His life in them. The barrenness of our efforts is due to our failure to take by faith our equipment.

3. The disciples' authority (v. 23). "Whosoever sins ye remit, they are remitted unto them; and whosoever sins ye retain, they are retained." This authority was not by virtue of office, but by virtue of having the Holy Ghost. This would give the spiritual equipment to know who had or who had not repented, and consequently, to pronounce pardon or not.

4. Jesus Manifests Himself to the Disciples, Thomas Being Present (vv. 26-29).
Thomas was absent at the first appearance of Jesus. His absence deprived him of a vision of the Lord. Absence from the assembly of believers through occasions loss. The other disciples go to Thomas, having once with the glad news of the resurrection, but he will not believe. His stubborn disbelief is such that he doggedly declares that unless he sees the prints of the nails, etc., he will not believe. It is right to demand evidence, but to prescribe terms is rank unbelief. Note:

1. The Lord's kindness to those who have difficulties. Thomas deserved rebuke, but the Lord kindly supplied the evidence which he demanded.
2. The revelation of the Lord transforms a doubter into a possessor.
3. The Conclusion of the Gospel (vv. 30-31).

In these verses John's arguments are summarized, and an explanation is given as to why he wrote this Gospel. Many other things could have been written, but these that he wrote he judged adequate to prove his point: To prove that (1) Jesus of Nazareth was the expected Messiah; (2) that man the divine—the very Son of God; (3) that those who believe on Him as God's only Son—the Messiah—would receive eternal life. Eternal life is in Him and only He is appropriated by faith can men be saved.

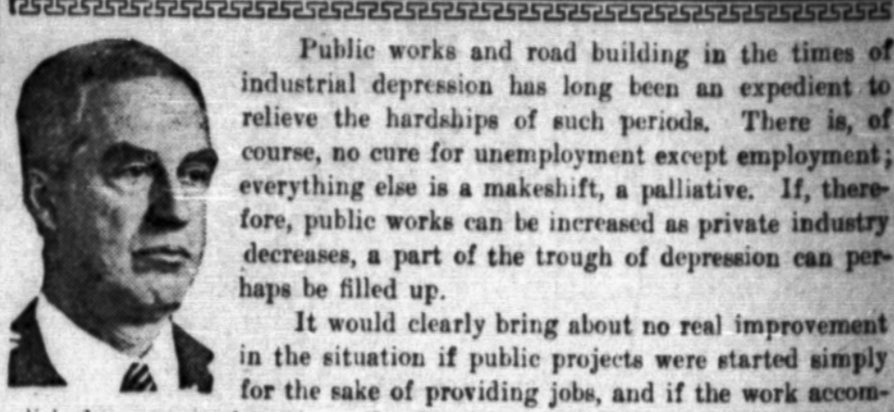

55 MEN ARRESTED IN NIGHT RAID AT PIONEER

From a recent issue of the Oil Belt News, published at Eastland, it seems that the law officers of that county are making stern efforts to keep Pioneer clear of a great part of the crime and disorder that is usually found in a boom oil town.

Single-handed, Assistant County Attorney Green Hazel staged a raid on a gambling establishment in that town Friday night and placed fifty-five men, found in that place, under arrest. Fines were levied to the amount of approximately \$900.

Accompanying Mr. Hazel were Deputy Sheriff Hearn and two men who went as private citizens. H. E. Lawrence and John Hennessee. Mr. Lawrence is the former sheriff and Mr. Hennessee is one of the night policemen of Eastland.

On arriving at Pioneer, the four went to the building which formerly housed an establishment where gambling is said to have flourished but all was still and deserted. While the four were there, however, two men came in who the Eastland men knew. Conversation started and when Hazel's companions looked around, he had disappeared.

He went to a building about a block away and entered. Proceeding to block exit by the only door to the room, he wrote down the names of all present. As he was engaged in doing this, his companions came in.

After the raid, two poker tables, a dice table and a black jack table were taken out of the hall by Mr. Hazel and his comrades and the equipment was then burned.

MARRIES TWO LADIES AT BAIRD, IN TOILS OF LAW

Deputy Sheriff C. S. Looney left Cisco Thursday last for El Paso, where he was to take into custody Lee Custer, age 22, who is wanted at Waco on a charge of bigamy, as reported by the Cisco Daily News. Custer was under arrest at the border city, awaiting the arrival of the Cisco officer. The young woman who filed the charge of bigamy against Custer is a resident of Cisco, and is at present employed as a waitress in a cafe. She states that she is his third wife, and that from only one of the three women he has married has he secured a decree of separation.

According to the story told by this young woman, who, by the way, married Custer under the name of Robert L. Burns, her husband obtained an early start in the marriage game.

Before he had reached the age of 16, she says, Custer married a widow at Baird, but this marriage was soon annulled when it was learned that he was a bit too young to assume the responsibilities of a benedict.

Wife No. 2, it is alleged, was acquired four years ago, also at Baird. In April of the year 1918, wife No. 3 states, Custer married Cora Richardson at Baird, and it is this wife with whom he has been living of late in El Paso. Deputy Sheriff Looney says that Custer married this woman under the name of Troxel.

On Sept. 19, 1921, at the home of the Rev. Layton Maddex, a Baptist minister of Waco, the young woman who is now in Cisco says that she married Custer, thinking that his name was Robert L. Burns, and she backs up her assertions with a McLennan county marriage license, issued by the county clerk at Waco, on September 18.

Custer won her over after a brief but impetuous courtship, she says. He wasn't doing anything in Waco, she states, more than "hanging around," and she met him through her brother, who she says is a service car driver in Waco knew him as "Bobby" Burns, and that he is a "dandy-looking" fellow, with quite winning ways.

But, only two weeks after their marriage, Mrs. Alderman-Burns was left with only her baby, she says. In fact, she states that her husband got away with some of her belongings and left her "on her uppers." She says she even got him a job, but that he wouldn't stay with it any longer than he stayed with her.

Wife No. 3 says she has trailed him all over the state since October last, going to Mexia and other oil field towns, and that she finally came to Cisco, a month ago, to get acquainted with her mother-in-law and see if she could not get a trail on him.

Custer, she says, is a son of Mrs. Bisbee, who lives five miles southwest of Cisco on a farm.

"I don't know whether I want to see him when he is brought through Cisco or not," she stated this morning. "I am afraid I might be tempted to do something desperate. I am going out to talk the matter over with his mother this afternoon.

"I have heard that the woman with whom he is now living—his second wife—is a fine girl, and I do not want to cause her any more trouble than is necessary. I never feel that he hasn't come me right, and I want him 'called to time' and that is the reason I made the complaint before the county attorney at Waco."

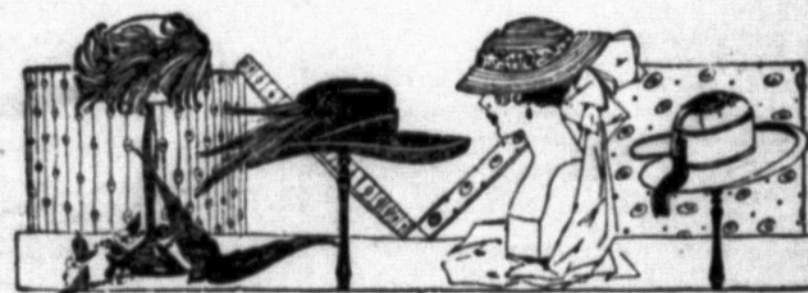

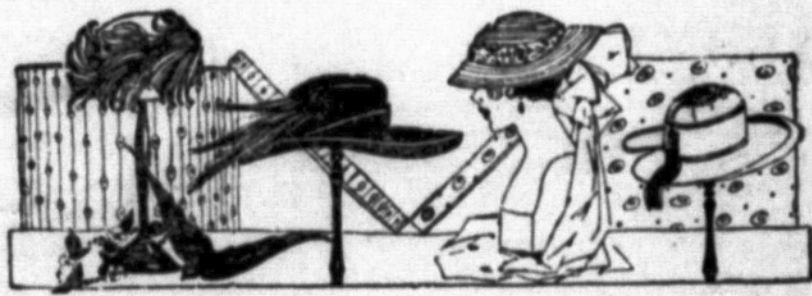

AMERICA FRIENDLY TOWARD GERMANY

THIS COUNTRY HAS NOT FORGOTTEN ATROCITIES OF WAR, HOWEVER. Washington.—The German press, according to cable reports, hails the parting words of United States Ambassador Houghton on the eve of his sailing for Berlin, as "very friendly."

The fact is noteworthy in view of the widespread interest, both on this and the other side of the Atlantic, in what would be the official attitude displayed by the United States toward her late enemy upon the resumption of direct ambassadorial relations after five years' severance.

Equally naturally, it further stirred the anxiety in French quarters, with their sustained bitterness toward the Germans and their concern lest the United States too rapidly re-establish an intimately friendly basis with the German Government.

The fact of the matter is that the United States Government is going to re-establish relations with Germany on a friendly basis and with a desire to cooperate fully to the end that the best interests of both nations will be served.

In recent weeks there has been a deluge of propaganda originating in the so-called "cultural societies" of Munich and other centers of radical activity in Germany.

Washington.—Uncle Sam and not Henry Ford will operate and develop Muscle Shoals and Ford's offer will be quietly sidetracked, according to plans laid by Republican leaders when the Senate Agriculture Committee began consideration of the matter.

It was agreed that appropriation sufficient to complete Wilson Dam should be rushed through Congress at the earliest opportunity and Ford thereby eliminated from the situation, which has proven a vexatious political problem for the Republicans.

Washington, La.—The Louisiana Federation of Labor, in convention here adopted a resolution opposing the national prohibition law.

ANOTHER CHAPTER IN DEATH SIAMESE TWINS

The bodies of Rosa and Josefa Blazek, the jointed twins who died in Chicago last week, have been ordered to a University in Prague, their native city and may be exhibited in a museum there. After their death the public was permitted to view their bodies in Chicago and the undertaking establishment was thronged all of one day, chiefly by women.

According to news reports the parentage of Franz, the 12-year old boy, is now the subject of a hot dispute, upon the outcome of which depends the disposition of the \$200,000 estate left by the twins. X-ray experts, who have photographed the bodies, say it would have been impossible for either of the sisters to have given birth to a child except by a Caesarian operation, and there is no trace of such an operation.

Drs. Oradovoc and Lecount, who made a post-mortem examination Sunday, announce that Josefa was the true mother of the boy instead of Rosa. The manager of the twins insists Rosa was the mother and the records in Europe will prove this.

Other physicians who examined the twins at the time of a clinic to decide whether or not they could be cut apart, said that Rosa was fully developed sexually, but that Josefa's organs were infantile. The X-ray photographs show the sisters had a joint lower stomach, a joint bladder and a joint womb. They had, also, a community spine, which was in the form of the letter "U," with no endings at the bottom. This discovery proves they could not have been cut apart without causing the death of both.

The manager of the twins has filed a claim for \$400 against their estate. The brother, Frank, the son, Franz, and the personal maid who attended the twins, insist that the estate shall also pay their fare back to Czechoslovakia. These claims complicate the question as to whether the estate of the sisters shall be probated here or in Czechoslovakia. Although frequently urged to do so, the twins never made a will. They had sent most of their money back to Czechoslovakia and owned a fine farm in that country.

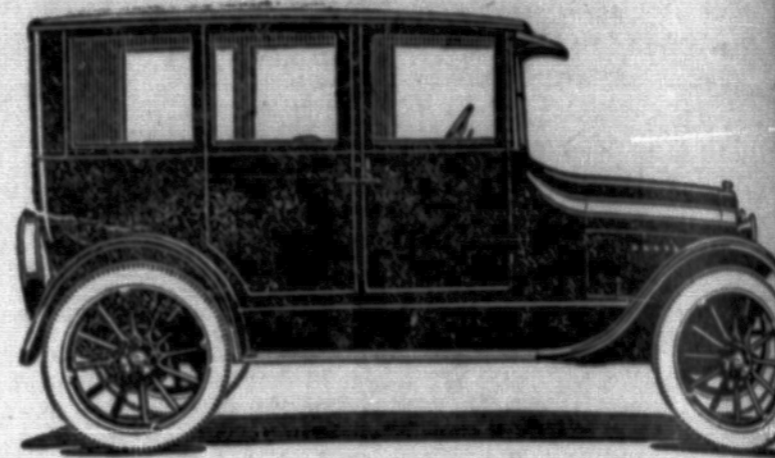

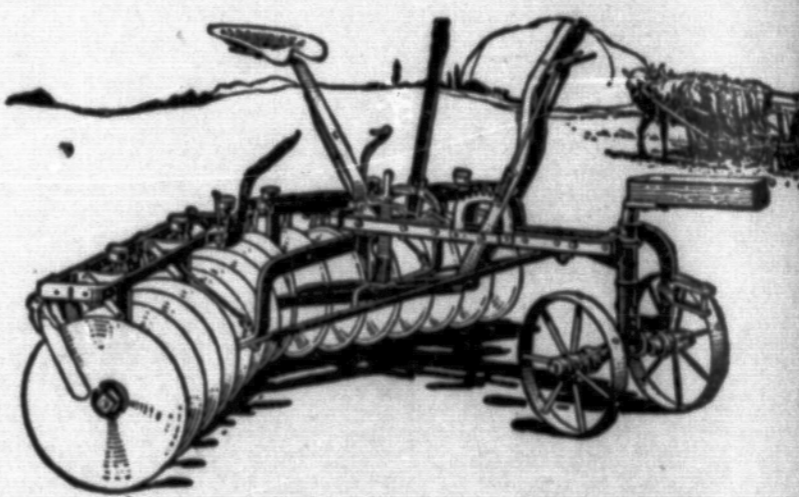
