

OPERATORS MUST PROTECT SURFACE WATER

Some of the companies in the Pioneer field have pulled the large casing from producing wells without properly protecting the surface water. It is possible, and probable, that when the outside casing is pulled that the surface water, which in most cases is good fresh water, will run down the hole to lower levels. This will drain the water wells of a valuable water which is needed to drill and produce with. Also when the salt water which is found below rises to the surface the pulling of the large casing will allow this to mix with the fresh water.

The Railroad Commission directs that whenever surface water is found in the oil wells that the large size be left in the hole until such time as it may be desired to abandon the well, at which time, if the hole is properly plugged, the casing may be removed.

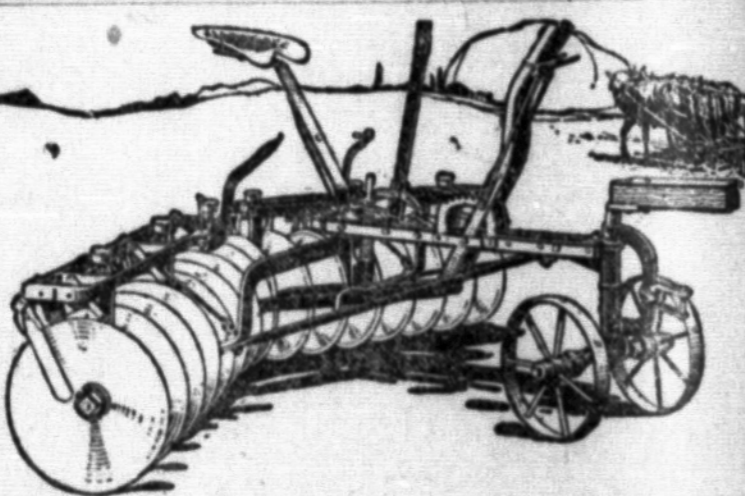

TOWN A SCENE OF NEW BUILDINGS

FIVE NEW SUPPLY HOUSES COMPLETED THREE OTHERS SECURE LOCATIONS

39 NEW WELLS DRILLING IN CROSS PLAINS-PIONEER FIELD

An accurate report from the Cross Plains-Pioneer oil field, Wednesday morning of this week, shows the addition of 39 new wells to the field, drilling at various depths and spudded in. These include the seven wells that are being drilled near the big gas well and at Cross Cut, southwest from the Pioneer field. In keeping with the fast development work over the proven area, each day reveals new locations and preparations for drilling that will mean a great extension of the field.

The completion of Teston No. 3, since our last week's report, which is claimed to exceed in production any of the other wells in the field except the Eakin No. 1, makes a total of twelve good producers in the main field. About twenty of the new wells that are being drilled immediately followed the bringing in of the big Eakin well, and these will be completed at near intervals within the next thirty days.

MAY HAVE TO REFUND POLL TAX OF WOMEN

According to a decision rendered last week by the Attorney General at Austin, practically every Texas incorporated municipality that collected a city poll tax for 1921 will be compelled to refund the taxes. The ruling was made on application from city authorities at Killen, who sought to ascertain if women could vote without possession of city poll tax receipt.

The Attorney General's office ruled that women were not subject to city poll taxes unless the charter of the city provided for same, and where the charter provided for payments by males only, same was void and discriminatory. The ruling held that unless a city's charter had been amended in accordance with the home rule act to apply to both sexes, neither was liable for the tax.

Buildings are going up so rapidly, including those for business and residence purposes, that it is difficult to keep tab on all the new business concerns that will be in operation in Cross Plains soon; and out of the question to give an accurate report on the number of new people that have located in the town.

Among the most important of the business houses completed this week, are the six new oil field supply houses. Locations for three other supply houses have been secured and material placed on the grounds for the buildings. In addition to these supply houses the two big hotels and a 20-room addition to the Kemper Hotel are about complete. New residences and innumerable new oil field shacks, including tent houses suitable for temporary living, are rapidly filling in the vacant spaces in the residence section and on the outskirts of the town. At the present rate of growth it is safe to estimate that within the next sixty days Cross Plains will have at least fifty new business concerns in operation and a population of five thousand industrious people.

FRAME WORK OF NEW HOTEL BLOWN DOWN

The frame work of the new hotel that is being built in Cross Plains by Earl Wynn and Dr. Vaughn of Eastland, L. D. Taylor of Eastland, contractor, was blown down by the severe wind and sand storm which struck this locality Thursday of last week. A number of carpenters were at work on the building at the time and the entire frame work, including two walls of the hundred foot two story structure, was blown down and demolished. The carpenters had a narrow escape, barely reaching a safe distance during the few seconds in which the structure was noticed to vibrate and cringe before it collapsed. Work of reconstructing the building was started immediately and in the absence of a similar mishap, this new hotel will doubtless be ready for occupancy before the end of this week.

HOMER VARNER, WIFE AND BABY HAVE NARROW ESCAPE

The home of Homer Varner, son of Prof. Varner of Cottonwood, was completely destroyed by fire at Baird Saturday morning of last week. Mr. Varner was aroused at 3:30 by burst of flames invading his bedroom. He had barely time to snatch up a few garments, throw a blanket about his wife, gather up their sleeping baby and escaped before the flames engulfed the cottage, which was totally destroyed. Low water pressure made it a difficult task for the fireman to save a residence adjoining on the north. Nothing was saved by the Varners and their household goods were protected only by an insurance of \$300. The cottage was the property of Mrs. Willie Barnhill and was fully insured.

Rev. E. M. Tate, pioneer Baptist preacher, died Monday at the family home near Eula. Deceased was nearly 80 years of age and had been a preacher more than 50 years. He had been in failing health for the past year. He leaves a widow and several children.

FOUR NEW SCHOOL TRUSTEES ELECTED

In the election last Saturday four new trustees were elected for the Cross Plains Independent School District. The new members are Hugh Davaney, W. E. Butler, John Barr and Drew Hill. The old members, who did not aspire for re-election and were displaced by electing the above new members, were Will McGowan, president, M. E. Wakefield, secretary, W. T. Wilson and Chris Parson. The board is composed of seven members, and the hold-overs are Martin Neeb, Sam Barr and T. E. Mitchell.

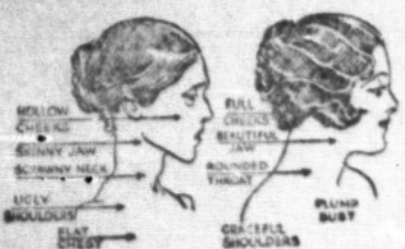

Airplane Used to Hunt Seals

Winter Aviation Proves of Great Utility Along Newfoundland Coast.

AID TO SEALING INDUSTRY

Airplanes Used to Locate the "Main Patch" as it Drifts Down With Arctic Current—Keeps Communication Open.

St. John's, N. F.—Hunting seals by airplane is the thrilling job that is being performed in Newfoundland this winter by F. Sidney Cotton, Australian aviator. The seals come down on great pans of ice with the Arctic current to the Newfoundland coast regularly every March, and nearly a dozen specially constructed ships fit out in St. John's, capital port of the island, and proceed to the great fields of ice where the seals swarm by thousands and hundreds of thousands, and the crews of the ships, called "sealers," engage for two or three weeks in a slaughter of the hunt, and are paid by a share in the total catch of the ship. Everything, then, is contingent on striking the main patch. This is sometimes missed, and sometimes located.

Where the Airplane Comes In. It is here that the airplane comes in. Major Cotton's plan is to set out from a base at Baywood, on the mainland, fly over the vast ice fields, with an experienced sealing captain as observer, and locate the main patch and wireless to the ships. There may be many miles of thick ice between the ships and the main patch. The airplane scouts around the land, reports the location in the ice, the great sealing industry of Newfoundland will be made certain and scientific.

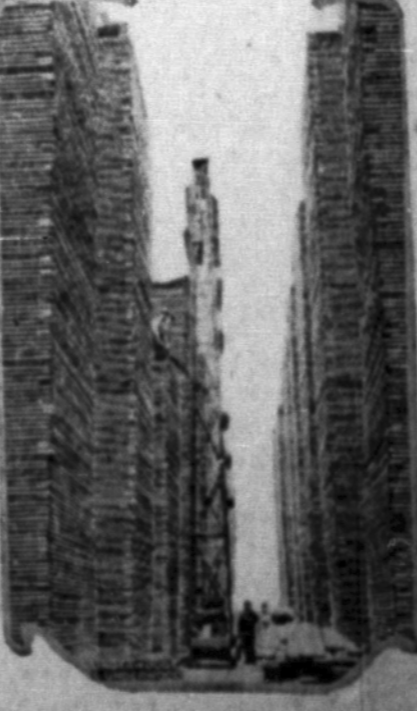
Cotton had many difficulties to overcome. In the first place, it meant winter flying. He was told by aviation experts in England that it could not be done. There was the matter of freezing of the radiator, for instance. How was he going to fly in very cold atmosphere without his radiator freezing solid?

Then, how was the plane to take off from the snow? How was he to conquer the gales and snow blizzards of the interior of Newfoundland, not to speak of the ice fields, where many ships had gone down in storm and hundreds of sealers had perished. Flying in Newfoundland in the winter means, often, flying in a temperature 20 degrees below zero F. It means being up in storms and blizzards and gales. It means taking off from and landing on deep and uneven snow, often snow banks ten feet deep.

First Achievement. The first achievement was the discovery of a liquid that resisted freezing, without damaging the engine, and he can now fly in the cold weather without fear of his radiator freezing. Then he devised a serviceable skid to replace wheels, which are useless in deep snow, and pontoons are useless except in open water.

With his skids Cotton can rise from any kind of snow and alight on the roughest and most uneven snow banks. The skids can take the machine safely over ditches, or even logs. A small skid for the tail keeps the airplane completely out of the snow, both fore and aft skids sink only a few inches into even the softest snow. Cotton has two hangars and a couple of canvas sheds, stationed at various points. One canvas tent has been placed at St. Anthony, away down by the Straits of Belle Isle, by the Labrador coast. There is a hangar at Botwood, midway between the north and south of the country, and one at St. John's. At that, there are not half enough hangars, as all of the interior of the country is uninhabited and exposed to the rigors of winter. A crash here means to be narrowed perhaps for weeks, unless he can see the coast. The right kind of airplane mechanics have to be brought out from England. In some instances, after paying all expenses, Cotton has found the man unfit for work. The hardy, dare devil type of pioneer mechanic is the type needed for winter flying in Newfoundland, and he is hard to get. Neither the insurance companies nor the government will insure Cotton's machines, so that if a machine crashes the loss falls entirely on himself.

Watch, Lost Ten Years in Mountains, None Worse

Vancouver, B. C.—After ten years' exposure to the weather, a gold watch recently found by a member of a mountain climbing club has been restored to its owner, who says it is keeping perfect time.

F. W. Johnson of this city found the watch. It was on a jutting rock, at a height of 7,500 feet. From an inscription on the back he found the owner, Rev. Benjamin F. Bacon, of Yale university, who identified it as his property. The watch was given to him by an Oawego (N. Y.) church congregation in 1892. He lost it ten years ago while on a trip into the mountains near Glacier, B. C.

Some steamers were frozen in the ice off the coast some miles from St. John's, it being an unusually hard winter in Newfoundland. They, also had been without newspapers or mail. Cotton repeated his stunt and dropped newspapers onto the decks of the steamers, and the passengers were able to read the afternoon papers almost as quickly as citizens of St. John's did. Delivery of newspapers has been made in many places around the shore.

The Norwegian manager of a paper company at Alexander Bay wanted to get down to the plant from St. John's. The cross-country train was snowed in somewhere near the line. Cotton took Blakstad, the manager, to his place in 24 hours and three-quarters, at the same time dropping newspapers on the passengers in the marooned train. Among the train passengers was W. E. Cook, minister of marine fisheries, who had refused to be taken by plane to Port Union, headquarters of the Fishermen's Union of Newfoundland. He was on the "hogged" train for three days.

The machines being used by Major Cotton are a Martinsysde, with a 275 Fulton Rolls-Royce engine, and a DH-9. The former is the same type used by the first men to come to Newfoundland in connection with the transatlantic flight. Both machines have a very quick take-off and land very slowly. Then there is a Westland limousine, with a 50 Napier engine, particularly useful in case of crash, as the aviators can live in the cabin in comparative comfort. Concentrated food for a month for two, snowshoes, blankets, etc. are always carried in each machine. Neither of these machines is suitable for the conditions of the country, however, and on his return to England Cotton will have some specially designed for the work, putting into them everything that he has learned while here.

Aviators in all parts of the world are watching with a great deal of interest Cotton's activities in winter flying in Newfoundland.

REFUSE GERMAN STATES OATH

Several Public Officials of Federated States Scorn Allegiance to Republican Constitution.

Berlin—Public officials in some of the federated German states have refused to take the oath of allegiance to the republican constitution on the ground they owed allegiance only to their own state. The point of law evolved lively discussion, particularly in Bavaria, where respect for the present German regime is not deeply grounded. Legal suits were brought in two cases for reinstatement of the officials whose offices had been declared vacant on account of their non-constitutional attitude.

One court ruled the oath was unnecessary, but a higher court reversed the decision.

SIAMESE SISTERS DIE INSEPARABLE

A story that will be read with pathetic interest by the people of every land is told in the news reports of last week, relating the death scenes of Josefa and Rosa Blazek, the "Siamese Twins," who died in a hospital in Chicago at 2:37 o'clock last (Thursday) morning. Josefa's death occurred first and was followed in a few seconds by the death of her sister. Physicians had declared early in the night that in the event of the death of one of the sisters the other would die inasmuch as their brother, Frank Blazek, had refused to permit an operation which would sever their bodies.

The twins have been confined in the hospital for the last ten days. Josefa was ill with yellow jaundice and this was followed by pneumonia. Shortly before her death Rosa was afflicted with bronchitis. Following the refusal of the brother to authorize the operation Dr. B. H. Breakstone, chief of the surgical staff of the hospital, declared that it would be impossible to save one of the twins in the event of the other's death.

"I tried to get the consent of the brother to operate to save the life of Rosa but he refused to give his permission," added the physician.

Dr. Breakstone explained that a delicate operation would have been necessary. Before their death he had expressed the opinion that the psychological affinity of the twins was so vital that if one should die the other would also succumb.

Breakstone explained that they had only one set of secondary digestive and pre-creative organs. The operations, he said, would have necessitated the building up of a part of the digestive organs to save the life of one twin.

Rosa was once married, her name being Blazek Dvorak. She is survived by a normal 11-year-old boy. Her husband was a captain in the German army and was killed in action in 1917. She was married fifteen years ago. Josefa never married.

The little son Franz, at the bedside of his mother, who until within the last few hours was less critically ill than Josefa. The twins were born in Czechoslovakia 42 years ago. During a tour of the world the twins acquired considerable wealth. They died without making a will.

As the women grew weaker physicians pleaded with the brother to permit an operation. He was the only adult relative capable under the Illinois laws of giving this consent.

But the pleas of the doctors were in vain.

"No," said the brother, "no, not even if Rosa lives for hours after Josefa dies. There shall be no operation."

Two hours past midnight Dr. Breakstone said there was no need of prolonging the argument with the brother.

"It is useless," he said. "The condition of each is now the same—the condition that forecasts certain death. An operation now would do no good." Franz, the 11 year old son, knelt at the bedside weeping while the surgeons endeavored to persuade the brother to permit the operation that they believed might save the lad's mother.

The physicians said the women reacted differently to the same medicine, although their illness recently has been of the same nature. Medical records recalled by physicians who have been interested in the case disclose a number of so called Siamese Twins. The original Siamese Twins, Chang and Eng, lived to the age of 64. They married sisters in China, had six children and Eng five, all of them normal. Eng died first and a surgeon separated them, Chang died soon after.

Twins that have attracted world wide fame include the Hindu sisters who were joined face to face, the connection being at the chest; the Newport twins, somewhat similar to the Hindu twins, the Orissa sisters, Radica and Doddica, joined side to side; the Biddenen maids, connected shoulder to shoulder with only two arms; The Hungarian sisters Helen and Judith, joined back to back at the lower segment of the spine, and the North Carolina sisters, Milie and Christine, joined as were the Hungarian sisters; and the Bohemian twins, Roselia and Josepha, connected in the same manner as the twins who just died. The connection was through the pelvis, the right hip of one and the left of the other being fused together.

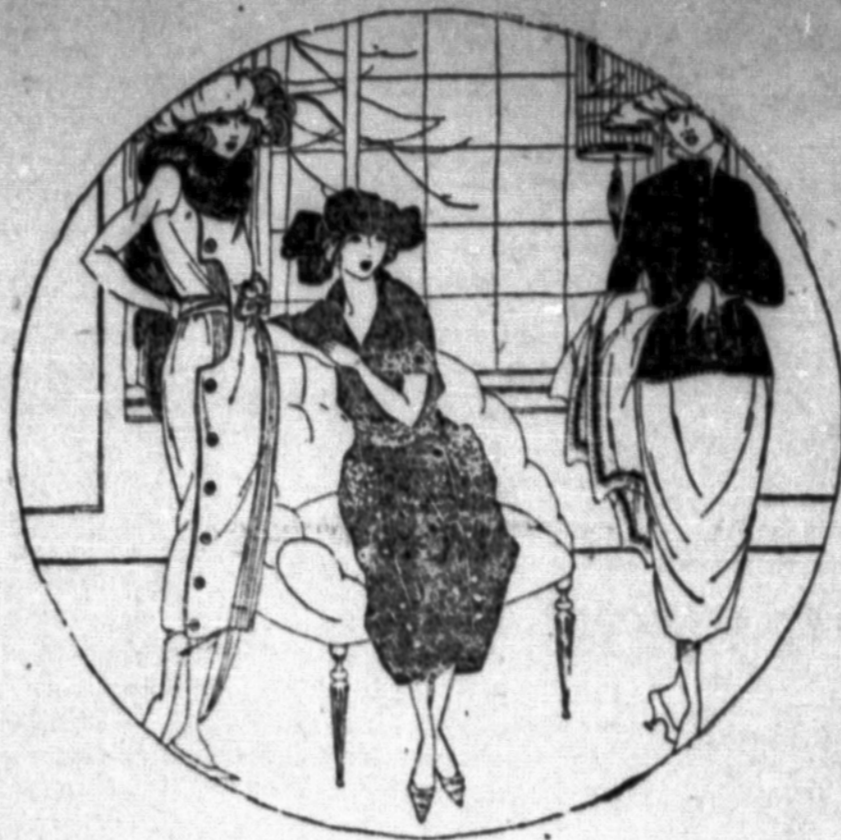

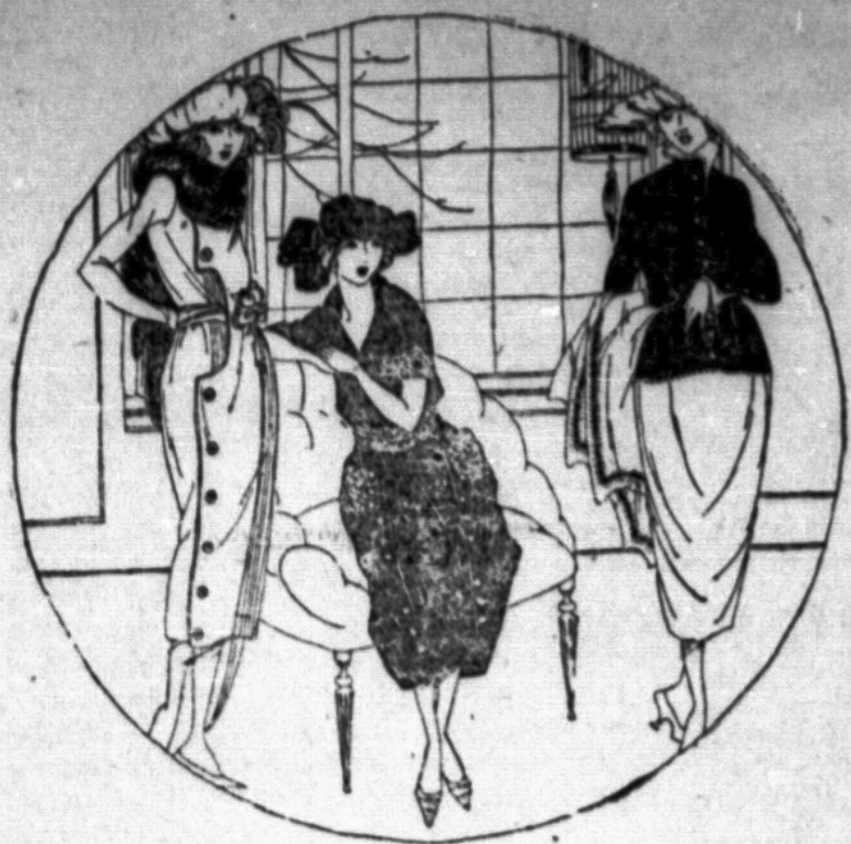

BOY'S STORY MAY SAVE HORNSBY FROM GALLOWS

A confession sworn to by an accomplice may save George F. Hornsby of Brownwood from the gallows April 14 at Belton. Hornsby is under death sentence for the murder of J. N. Weatherby, wealthy Brownwood auto dealer, in October, 1920. On charge of venue he was tried and convicted in Bell County in March, 1921.

The case was affirmed recently by the Court of Criminal Appeals and the death sentence pronounced. Since then many citizens have actively engaged themselves in seeking commutation to life imprisonment. A petition containing 7,000 names was presented to Governor Neff.

At Hornsby's trial Willie Carter, a 17-year-old youth confessed to complicity and named Hornsby as the perpetrator of the crime. On this evidence he was convicted, although protesting innocence and offering an alibi.

After Hornsby's sentence was affirmed the indictment against Carter in Brown County was dismissed.

Wednesday Carter came to Temple from Mexia and in the presence of three citizens, none of whom had been favorable to Hornsby's sentence being commuted, made an affidavit reversing his first testimony and declaring Hornsby an innocent man. He named one Arthur Brown, whom he claimed to have met in Lawton, Okla., in Oct., 1918, as the murderer and stated his testimony against Hornsby was false and given through fear of mob violence.

In his affidavit Carter says he made same with full knowledge that he could be reindicted and tried for murder but makes the statement to prevent punishment of an innocent man. The affidavit was filed Thursday with Governor Neff. Carter is being detained by the officers.

Carter has again repudiated his confession, and says that the above statement was made through a threat of being killed by Hornsby's brother at Mexia.

MAHANLY SENTENCED TO FOUR YEARS IN PRISON

Newt Mahaney must serve four years in the State penitentiary unless the superior courts undo the doom pronounced by a jury in the district court at Eastland Wednesday of last week. The particulars of the fight, in which Sheriff N. H. Eustand county was also involved, occurring on the streets of Cisco and resulting in the trial and conviction of Mahaney, have been given in previous issues of the Review and are familiar to most of our readers. The case was given to the jury at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday evening, and after deliberating about two hours the jurors filed into the court room. In answer to Judge Hill's question as to whether they had reached a verdict, G. B. Mitchell, foreman, answered: "We have." The Judge read the verdict aloud: "We, the jury, find the defendant, Newt Mahaney, guilty as charged in the indictment and assess his punishment at four years in the State penitentiary."

MANY DEEP TESTS TO BE MADE IN CALLAHAN CO.

Anthony McCauley in the Baird Star of last week, gives a lengthy, as well as a most flattering report on oil operations in Callahan county. The developments on which this report is based are not connected with the local Cross Plains-Pioneer field, the greater part of which is just across the line in Eastland county, but is confined largely to the great shallow field, the deep tests that are in process of drilling and a number of other prospective deep tests that will be made in various parts of Callahan county. Concerning these developments the report states that the recent rains have supplied an abundance of water to enable a number of the deep tests that have been shut down to resume operations and make possible the drilling of others on the schedule. Within two to three weeks at least a dozen wells, headed for the deep sands will be under operation, and these added to the ever increasing number of shallow wells being put down, will make the oil industry of Callahan County hum.

Another deep test well is soon to be started on the Hall ranch, about ten miles west of Cross Plains. Negotiations for a large block of acreage on which this well is to be drilled, are progressing satisfactorily. The Crissman deep test well, six miles northeast of Baird is down 3,100 feet, with no additional developments to report.

A feature of the deep wells in this county, almost without exception, is the fact that shallow oil could have been produced at a profit. But as they were financed to go to the deeper sands, it was not deemed advisable to stop at such shallow depths as 400 to 600 feet. So widely scattered are these deep wells that it argues well for the future of the shallow oil industry in this county, since men with small machines are getting in here in large numbers and taking over these semi-proven areas as fast as they can come upon them and find them open. Many such leases still remain in the hands of the men who drilled the deeper wells, and in all probability they will reenter the field and do their part to open up the shallow sands.

SILVER SHOWING NEAR RISING STAR

According to the Rising Star X-Ray of last week visitors in that city recently were inquiring about the location of the silver showing southwest of the town that was reported by a geologist a few months ago. Inquiries have also been made about the big cement bed located in the mountains just south of the town.

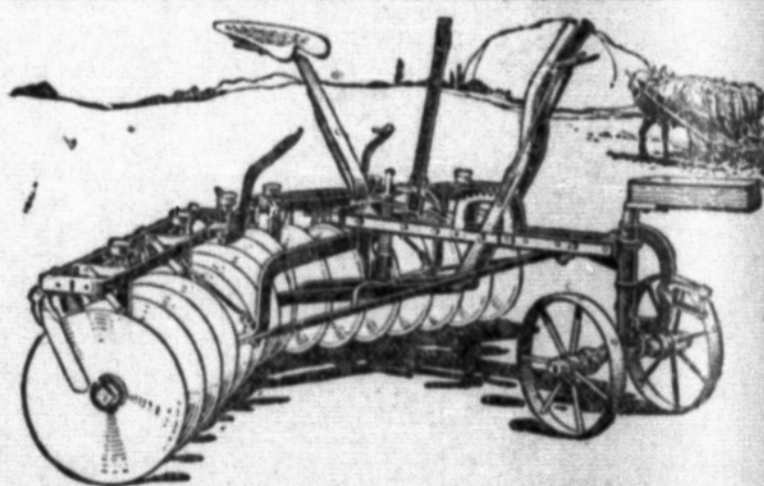
