

Airplane Used to Hunt Seals

Winter Aviation Proves of Great Utility Along Newfoundland Coast.

Patch" as It Drifts Down With Arctic Current-Keeps Communication Open

Marcia, and nearly a dozen specially constructed ships fit out in St. John's, capital port of the island, and proceed to the great fields of ice where the seals swarm by thousands and hundreds of thousands, and the crews of the ships, called "sealers," engage for two or three weeks in a slaughter of the "whitecoats." The ships are loaded, often to the hatches, or even the gunwhates, with the pelts of the seals, On reaching St. John's the several inches of fat are removed from the skins and rendered out for the valuable oil. The skins are dressed for leather, often the furs are stuffed and made into initation seals. The industry has a turnover of millions of

But the seals do not come all to gether. There is what is known as the main patch," which contains the great bulk of the seals. There are minor pans which have broken off, and also carry seals. If the main patch is missed by the ships it may mean loss for the owners and the men. These men sign on only for the hunt, and are paid by a share in the total catch of the ship. Everything. then, is contingent on striking the main patch. This is sometimes missed, and

ometimes located. Where the Airplane Comes In.

It is here that the airplane comes in. Major Cotton's plan is to set out from a base at Botwood, on the mainland, fly over the vast ice fields, with an experienced scaling captain as observer, and locate the main patch and wireless to the ships.

There may be many miles of thick ice between the ships and the main patch. The airpiane scouts around and locates channels in the ice, in this way, according to the plan, the great sealing industry of Newfoundland will be made certain and scien-

Cotton had many difficulties to overcome. In the first place, it meant winter flying. He was told by aviation experts in England that it could not he done. There was the matter of freezing of the radiator, for instance. How was he going to fly in very cold tmosphere without his radiator freezng solid? Then, how was the plane to take

off from the snow? How was he to conquer the gales and snow bilzgards of the interior of Newfoundland, not to speak of the ice fields, where many ships had gone down in storm and many hundreds of sealers had per-

Flying in Newfoundland in the winmeans, often, flying in a temperature 20 degrees below zero F. It means being up in storms and blizzards and gales. It means taking off from and landing on deep and uneven snow, often snow banks ten feet deep. First Achievement.





Watch, Lost Ten Years in Mountains, None Worse

Vancouver, B. C .- After ten years' exposure to the weather, a gold watch recently found by a member of a mountain climbing club has been restored to its owser, who says it is keeping perfect time.

F. W. Johnson of this city found the watch. It was on a jutting rock, at a height of 7,-500 feet. From an inscription on the back he found the owner, Rev. Benjamin F. Bacon, of Yale university, who identified it as his property. The watch was given to him by an Oswego (N. Y.) church congregation in 1892. He lost it ten years ago while on a trip into the mountains near Glazier, B. C.





MANY DEEP TESTS TO BE MADE IN CALLAHAN CO.

Anthony McCauley in the Baird Star of last week, gives a lengthy, as well as a most flattering report on oil operations in Callahan county. The developmen's on which this report is based are not connected with the local Cross Plains-Pioneer tield, the greater part of which is just across the line in Eastland county, but is contined largely to the great snallow field, the deep tests that are in process of drilling and a number of other prospective deep tests that will be made in various parts of Callahan county. Concern ing these developments the report states that the recent rains have supplied an abundance of water to enable a number of the deep tests that have been shut down to resume operations and make possible the drilling of others on the schedule. Within two to three weeks at least a dozen wells, headed for the deep sands will be under operation, and these added to the ever increasing number of shallow wells being put down, will make the oil industry of Callahan County hum.

Another deep test well is soon to be started on the Hall ranch, about ten miles west of Cross Pains Ne gotiations for a large block of acre age on which this well is to be drilled, are progressing satisfactoril

The Crissman deep test well, six miles northrast of Baird is down 3. 100 feet, with noa dditional develop ments to report.

A feature of the deep wells in this county, almost without exception, is the fact that shallow oil could have been produced at a profit. But as they were financed to go to the deeper sands, it was not deemed advisable to stop at such shallow depths as 400 to 600 feet. So widely scattered are these deep wells that it argue well for the tuture of the shallow oil incustry in this courty, since men with small machines are getting in here in large numbers and taking over these semiproven areas as fast as they can come upon them and find them open. Many such leases still remain in the hands of the men who drilled the deeper wells, and in all probability they will reenter the field and do their part to open up the shallow

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
