On to Amarillo, Now.

Weatherford, O. T., May 27.—Track laying began on the Choctaw this morning from this city to Amarillo, Texas. Track can be laid at the rate of two miles per day. The grade has been completed to Texoma, the new town that has been established on the line of Texas and Oklahoma in Grant county. This station is on the exact line and is five miles south of the north fork of the Red River, the point where it crosses the state line. From Texoma westward has been completed and the grade to Amarillo will have been completed as fast as possible.—Wichita (Kap.) Eagle, of 28.

Let the Evening News readers understand that railroad news is given by newspaper correspondents and their source of information must be considered. The above correspondent doesn't know but that our Amarillo people have "whacked up" the bonus—which they have not yet done. When that right-of-way from the Texas line is paid for by us, the Choctaw will come, and it will probably not come unless we pay for it.

REPORT OF A PURCHASE.

South McAlester, I. T., May 27.—A rumor is current in this city to the effect that the Santa Fee has acquired by purchase control of the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf Railway, extending from Memphis, Tenn., to Weatherford, Ok. The report comes from Oklahoma City, but has not been confirmed.

Galveston, Tex., May 27.—Gen. Manager L. J. Polk when asked about the reported purchase tonight of the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Gulf, said it was news to him. Asked if the deal could have been made without his knowledge, he replied that he would very likely know something of the transaction, but that he knew nothing about any purchase being made or pending.

Lenlandling, Idaho.—May 18th, 1901. Editor, Amarillo News:—Immigration is coming into this western country by the thousands. Both the Union Pacific and Northern Pacific are bringing them by the train load; but the most of them stop in Washington, some in Oregon, and Idaho is getting a liberal share. When I first came here, five years ago, we had five neighbors; now there are nearly fifty. This is not a very good farming country; it is too rough and rocky. The people, that are here, are here mostly for the timber, and it is going at a rapid rate. As I write this, I can see six large booms of logs lying in the bay. Logging is to this country what cattle raising is to Amarillo; it is the life of the country. I have seen as high as five steam-boats in the bay at once, and all seem to be doing a good business. Timber will soon be getting scarce around the edge of the lake, and then they will have to go back into the mountains. This is a beautiful lake, amid fine mountain scenery; but I often long to see the city on the Plains, and all of my old friends there. Time, as elsewhere, crowds us here. W. L. Stephens.
