Broncos to face Seymour for Area title

Not willing to see their stellar 2010 season end just yet, the Broncos are getting their game faces on in preparation for their next playoff game with Seymour.

The District Champions are fired up and ready to play for the Area Championship this Saturday in Lubbock at Lubbock Cooper High.

After breaking the 29-year Dis-

trict Champion drought, the Broncos are more than determined to be playing well into December as they vie for a state berth. Because of earning a bye in the first round of playoffs, the Broncos will move on to the Area round, which is just a stepping-stone away from where they want to be. They know the game with Seymour will be tough, but they are ready and willing to do what it takes to get the

win.

"Seymour went 6-4 on the season and beat New Deal in the first round of the playoffs," head coach Gary Jack said. "New Deal had lost about three starters so they weren't the team we saw early in our season, but Seymour is a tough team and is out of a really tough district."

The Panthers finished third to Albany (10-0) and Stamford (9-1)

who are both ranked high in the standings. Jack knows the Broncos will have to play hard.

"It will be tough from here on out," Jack said. "There are good quality teams left. It will be a very exciting game."

The game will be played Saturday, November 20 at Lubbock Cooper High in Lubbock at 2:00 in the afternoon.

"Lubbock Cooper has a brand new stadium and we're expecting a big Bronco crowd," Jack said.

To find Lubbock Cooper take the Tahoka Highway exit from Loop 289 and go five or six miles south.

There will be a bonfire at the McAnears' farm south of Clarendon on Hwy. 70 on November 18 at dusk. Also there will be a Bronco send-off at 8:30 a.m. on Kearney Street.

Shelton runs well at state

She set her sights on something big early on, and for one Lady Bronco athlete those goals became reality.

Audrey Shelton has worked hard for the reward and the payback came this past weekend in Round Rock. Shelton went through every obstacle she could get there and not surprisingly ran in the State Cross-Country Meet Saturday, November 13 against 103 other runners.

Her time of 12:46 for the two-mile course was good enough for 25th place. Not bad for the sophomore's first trip to state.

Shelton was among really good runners and against a course she had never faced before. She ran hard and gave it all she had and even though the results were not what she had in mind, the participation was a first for Clarendon's cross-country runners.

Shelton did not begin her training when school started this fall. She was dedicated throughout the summer and made it her goal to not only make it to the Regional meet, but advance to the top meet in the state. She practiced alone, with friends, and with her coaches and every ounce of fortitude and drive came from within. A great testimony to what someone can accomplish with the right determination.

"Audrey is one of the best high school athletes I have ever coached when it comes to determination, attitude, and work ethic," coach Molly Weathered said. "She is a great leader. She has worked extremely hard. Not only did Shelton run all of the scheduled practices, but she also ran on her own. Even through the weekends. She never took a day off from running. I am very proud of her."

Shelton led her team in the District and Regional meet this season. The Lady Bronco team competed at the Regional meet and placed 7th overall. But Shelton is not finished running yet. She will be a very experienced presence in the spring when track season rolls around and then gear up for another cross-country season next fall as a junior.

You can bet that if there is a race to be run, Audrey Shelton will be the first in line to practice whenever and wherever she can. It's in her blood.

Local girl rolls truck

A Clarendon girl remained hospitalized this week after she rolled her vehicle Sunday afternoon while using her cell phone.

Krista Reynolds, age 16, was in Lubbock's University Medical Center in the pediatric ICU, her father, Steve Reynolds reported. She was texting and driving and not wearing her seat belt, he said.

DPS Trooper Chad Simpson said Reynolds was driving a 1998 Ford F-150 pickup and negotiating a curve on FM 2362 west of Clarendon when the right tires traveled off the roadway and into the south ditch. Reynolds overcorrected while steering to the left, went back onto the highway, and then over corrected to the right.

Simpson said the truck then slid sideways into the south ditch, rolled 2 1/4 times, and went through a fence before coming to rest on its right side in a pasture.

Reynolds was ejected from the vehicle as it rolled, Simpson said.

Responding to the accident in addition to the DPS were the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department, Associated Ambulance Authority, the Donley County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Department of Transportation.

Mr. Reynolds said his daughter was suffering from a broken pelvis and fractured vertebrae, but the family was considering it fortunate that her injuries were not much worse.

Donations are being accepted at all Clarendon banks to help the family deal with travel and other expenses during Krista's hospitalization in Lubbock.

Sanchez pleads guilty to assault

A man accused of committing sexual assault in the Clarendon nursing home was convicted of the crime last week.

Richard Sanchez entered a guilty plea in district court and was sentenced to eight years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Sanchez was sentenced for the second degree felony offense of sexual assault, enhanced to a first degree due to his previous criminal history.

Sanchez was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place on March 12, 2010, and April 26, 2010. He was accused of sexually assaulting a resident of Community Care Center of Clarendon, where the Donley County Sheriff's Office said Sanchez had worked for five years.

Sanchez was indicted by the Donley County Grand Jury on June 28, 2010, on three counts of sexual assault.

"The Donley County Sheriff's office spent many hours investigating this case which resulted in this plea today," said Inman. "Sheriff Blackburn and Chief Deputy Randy Bond provided this office with multiple tools to proceed due to the thorough investigations they conduct on each and every case. This area is fortunate to have such an experienced law enforcement staff."

In addition to the sentence, Sanchez is also required to pay \$1,797 in court costs.

District Attorney Luke Inman, assisted by Greg Buckley, prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Also last week, the court heard other pleas from two other defendants, resulting in convictions.

Services honor contributions of America's veterans

Donley County honored America's veterans with several services last week in Clarendon and Hedley.

The Adamson-Lane Post 287 of the American Legion hosted a service in Rowe Cemetery Thursday with Rev. Lloyd Stice, pastor of Clarendon's First United Methodist Church, delivering the keynote address, and special services was held for those Missing in Action and still held as Prisoners of War.

Dick Bode of Alanreed later spoke at the Hedley School. He lived through five years of German occupation and later served in the US Air Force. He said Americans are "ordinary people doing extraordinary things."

That evening, more than 300 people were at Clarendon Col-

lege Bairfield Activity Center for a candlelight vigil that recognized both the men and women who have served and are currently serving the United States. Several community members helped with the program, and Dr. John Howard, who is also a captain in the US Navy, delivered the keynote, which honored the real heroes of America and called for support not just for the fallen but also for the families of those still overseas and for those who come home permanently changed. Howard also drew attention to the need for better treatment of Ameri-

can veterans, particularly noting issues of health care and homelessness.

Another program was held

last Wednesday at the Clarendon school, and the local VFW post provided free breakfast to veterans on Thursday.

Conservatives had high hopes when the Republicans took over Congress in 1994, and there were many accomplishments that came about in spite of a Democratic hold on the White House at the time. America saw the reform of the welfare system and were introduced to something that is still considered mythical today – budget surpluses. (Yes, it really happened.)

But for the big reforms – ideas like abolishing the federal Department of Education, reforming Social Security, and some real downsizing of government – conservatives were told they had to wait until the party controlled both the legislative and the executive branches. And all eyes turned to Texas and the great hope of the right – George W. Bush.

But hopefully the tide is turning, and the people are finally becoming aware of what their government has become. Let's see what the future holds.

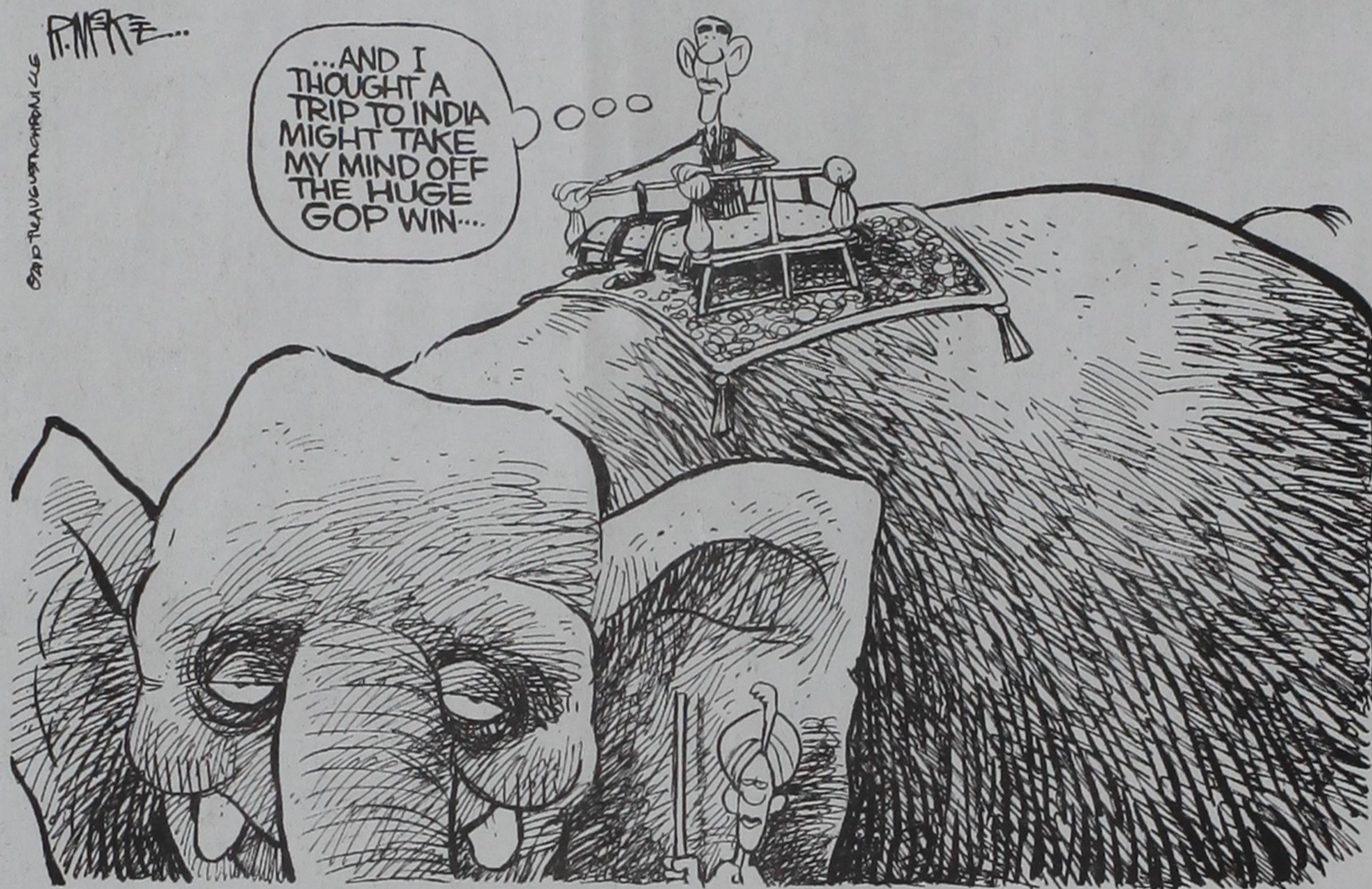

Obama should reach out to GOP

In light of last the midterm election's results, the big question is whether President Obama will be Bill Clinton or Jimmy Carter. In other words, will he learn from his mistakes and be reelected in 2012 or will he be a one-term president? We were given some indication of where he is headed from last week's post-election press conference, but the real outline of the next two years won't be clear until the new Congress takes office in January.

Bill Clinton is the classic model to follow. After seeing Democrats lose the House and Senate in 1994, he moved to the center and compromised with the Republicans on key issues such as welfare reform and raising the minimum wage, and he was reelected in 1996.

The first step for President Obama to reach out to Republicans would be to agree to a one- or two-year extension of all Bush-era tax cuts including personal income tax rates, 15 percent rate for dividends and 15 percent for capital gains. He could couple this with a request that everyone withhold judgment on other matters until his deficit reduction panel makes its recommendations on Dec. 1, and he could urge both parties to then work together to implement as many of these recommendations as possible.

The president should also heed the

message of the voters and place heavy emphasis on doing everything possible to create jobs and lessen the unemployment rate. Other divisive issues such as immigration reform and energy policy should be put on the back burner until he and the Congress take decisive steps on the economy.

The size of Republican gains in the House sends a very clear message. The public wants action and wants it sooner rather than later. However, House Republicans could risk losing the next election if they oppose everything suggested by the president and are seen by the public as being responsible for two years of gridlock.

Democrats can be somewhat heartened by retaining control of the Senate. However, it will be almost impossible for Democrats to put together 60 votes on most issues, and bipartisanship is required if anything is to pass. Republicans in the Senate will make a serious mistake if they are seen as creating gridlock by refusing to work with the Democrats across the board.

When all is said and done, the public will first look to the president for working toward bipartisan solutions to the basic economic problems facing the country. If the president can demonstrate that he is moving heaven and earth to bring about bipartisan solutions and if

we still have gridlock, the Republicans could lose it all in 2012. If there is any message from the last two elections, it is that the public is very fickle.

Democrats in the House have some very serious internal matters to resolve. And this is true no matter how the leadership elections come out. Because many moderates and conservatives were defeated, the caucus will, on its face, be more liberal. However, if the Democratic Caucus always takes liberal positions and refuses to move to the center, Democrats risk being in the wilderness for years. Some how the liberal majority in the House Democratic Caucus will have to be willing to accept a number of half loaves or all they will get is crumbs for years to come.

Elections in this country have consequences. However, we do have another one in two years. The future of the Obama presidency is yet to be determined, and the Republicans' hold on the House of Representatives is still a tenuous one, no matter what the amount of gains in 2010. Let's hope we have a year of real legislating before the next election cycle starts in earnest.

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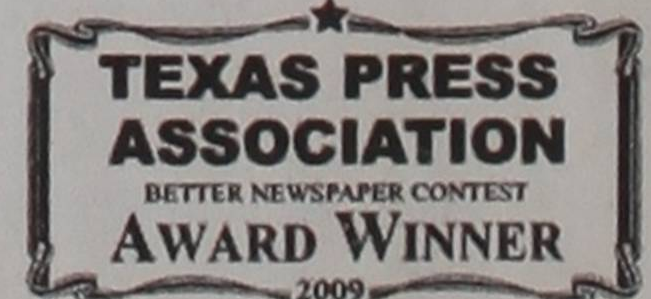

Daughters of Confederacy mark Smith's grave in Rowe

The unmarked grave of a Confederate widow was memorialized last Tuesday by the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Members of Sabine Pass Chapter 2459 in Wellington - Ava White, Betty Gilbreth, Mary Morgan, Shirley Henard and Vickie Porter - dedicated a marker in Rowe Cemetery at the gravesite of Belle Langford Smith, charter member of Julia Jackson Chapter 141, Fort Worth.

Mrs. Smith's membership was granted as the widow of Captain Nat Smith. Captain Smith, from the state of Kentucky, served in Company B, Regiment 6, from June 1861 through April 1865.

The copy of the original membership application stated the date, June 5, 1915, with the recommendation signatures of Confederate Veterans and UDC officers on the document.

The dedication of a UDC grave marker brought forth the memory of the member presented by Vickie Porter, included scripture reading

and prayer voiced by Mary Morgan; and the Lord's Prayer was said in unison by all attending. The unveiling of the marker, covered with a red cloth, was by Ava White and Betty Gilbreth.

Betty Gilbreth presented the Dedication of the Marker and tributes to the memory of the member, with Mrs. Smith's service to UDC being noted.

Ava White delivered the benediction.

The first and second grade students of Hedley Elementary School sang "Dixie" and "God Bless America" during the ceremony.

Mrs. Shelia White, first grade teacher, and Mrs. Diane Conatser, second grade teacher, were leaders of this group.

The chapter members said they were pleased to have people attend from Hedley, Memphis, Clarendon and Wellington.

The Confederate battle flag did fly as the breeze kept it aloft throughout the presentation.

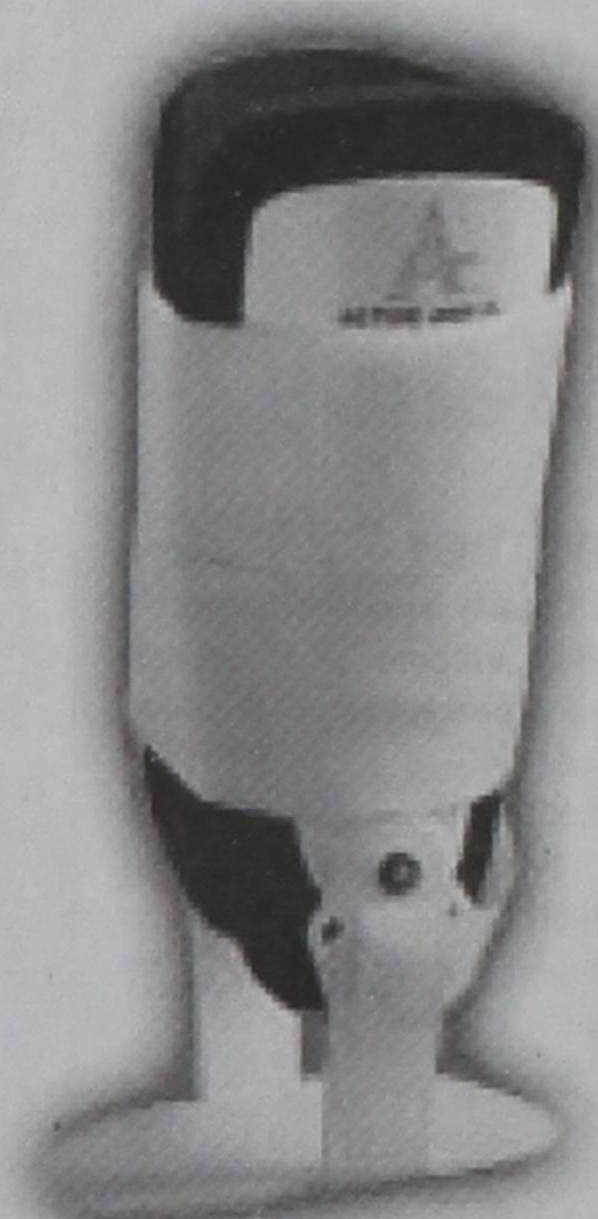

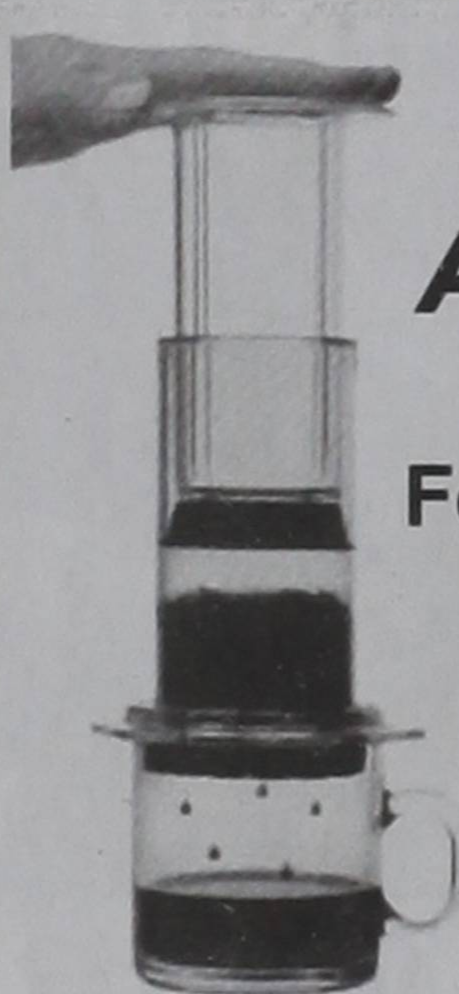
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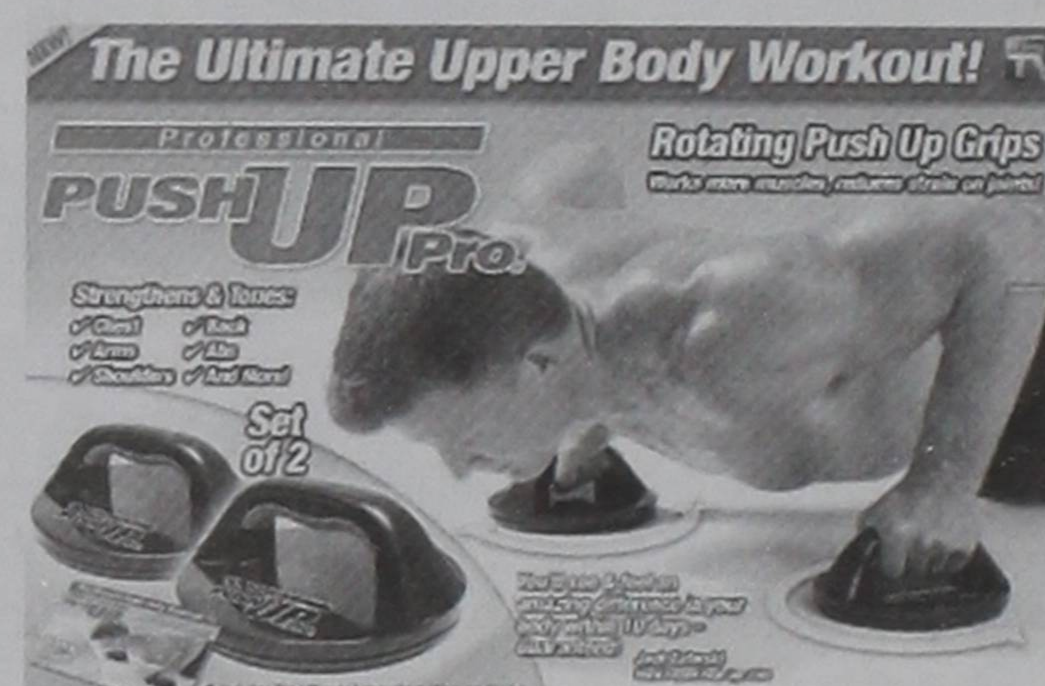

Nutrition Quiz Bowl winners announced

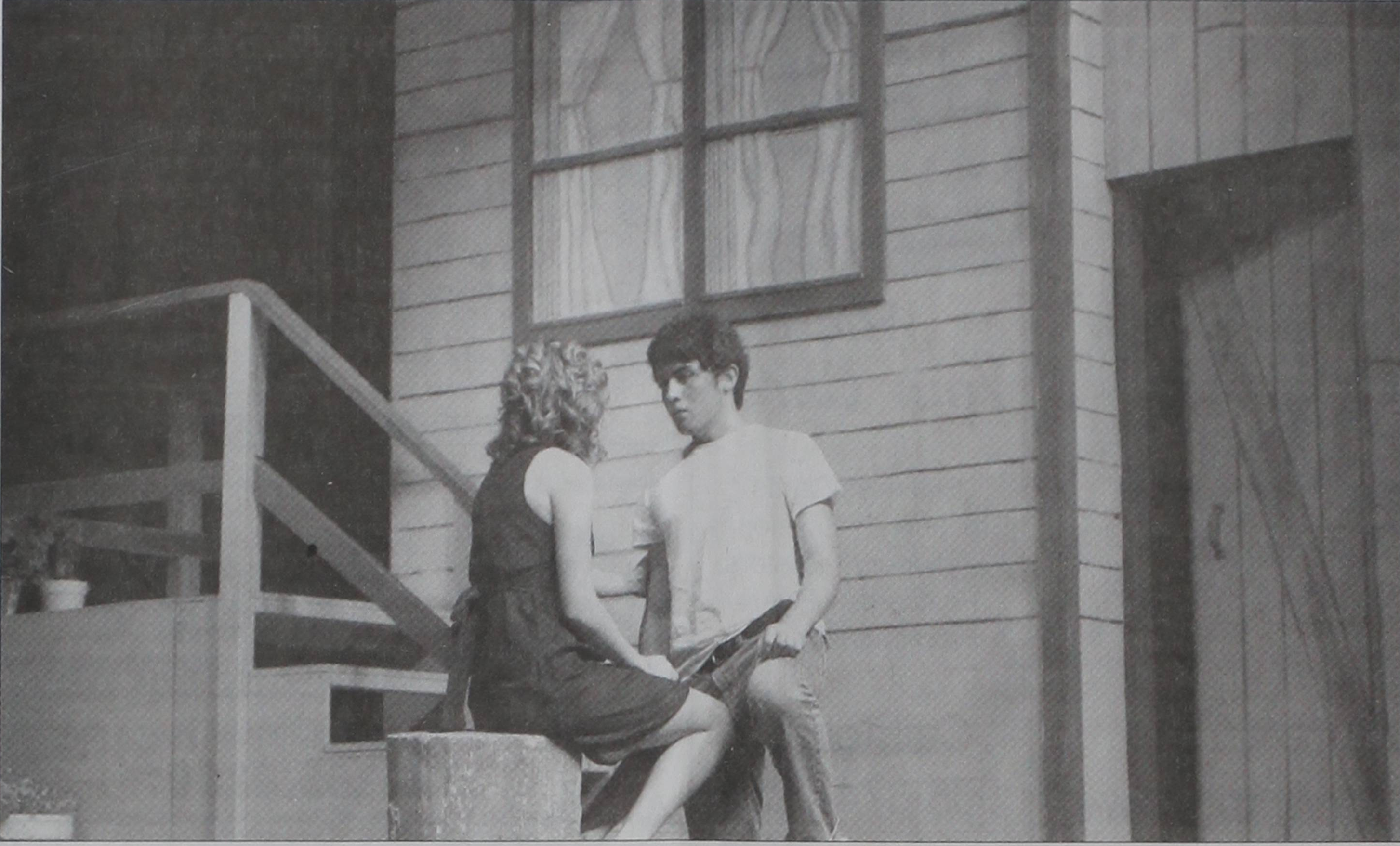

Snow gives Panhandle a winter wake-up call

The Panhandle got a winter wake-up call last week with up to five inches of snow in parts of Amarillo, causing damage to trees which had not lost their leaves. The weather-guessers quickly pulled out their book of excuses that start "the front moved faster than anticipated," "it picked up more moisture than expected," and so on. We got rain, about an inch, which is very nice going into winter months.

This set my memory in overdrive, recalling similar situations when the weather caught me off guard. The first significant incident happened in the late 1940s. Our school bus picked up my sister and me one Monday morning. A hor-

rible ice, snow storm hit and Friday afternoon we got home. We lived 16 miles south of McLean on all dirt roads, our bus driver was Bill McClellan, who took us under her wing saying, "Patsy and Peggy you are with me; I'll take care of you." And he did.

All roads were impassable, and few telephones were available. Sometime during that week Dad rode his horse to the nearest working phone and reported back to Mother that all was well. A few years before she died I asked Mother if she worried about us during that time and her answer was "no." She knew we were in good hands. Would that happen now? I can just see all the govern-

ment agencies involved.

We have had some weather surprises here in Howardwick with a big ice storm keeping trick-or-treaters home a few years ago. The last I remember was Christmas 2000 when we had 20" dumped on us Christmas night with 20 people staying at my house. There again it was a big surprise, coming up from the south. My advice to everyone, keep a supply of toilet paper; you may get a weather surprise and you should be prepared.

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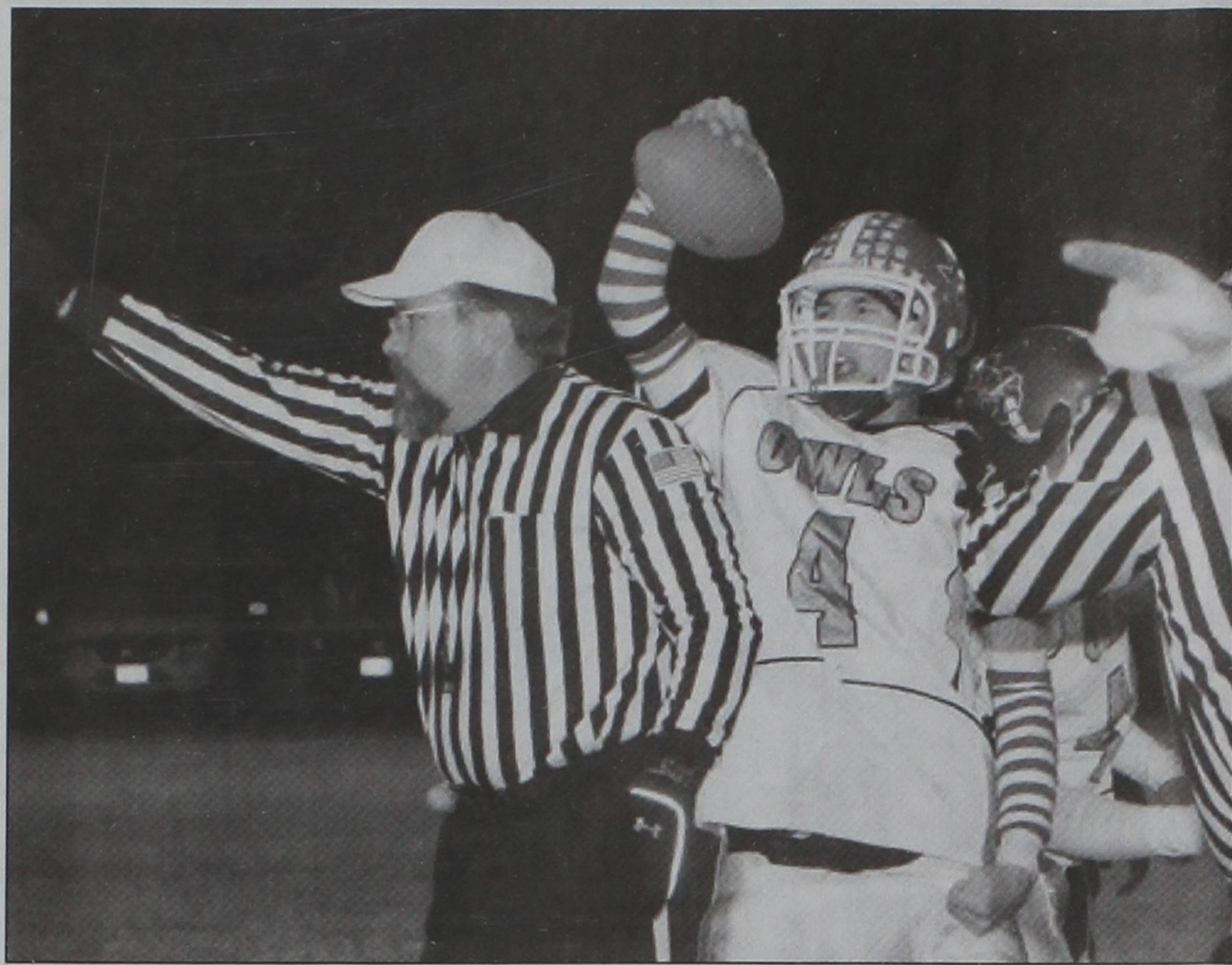

Timothy Wayde Wilson pleaded true to the allegation in the State's Motion to Adjudicate Guilt of Defendant and was convicted and sentenced six years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

On July 29, 2009, Wilson pleaded guilty to the second degree felony offense of burglary of a habitation and the second degree felony offense of burglary of a habitation. The State filed the motion to adjudicate on June 8, 2010, alleging six violations of community supervision. Wilson was sentenced to six years in the TDCJ and must pay \$780 in court costs to Donley County, a \$4,000.00 fine and \$22,000 restitution.

Eddie Brian Defries (a.k.a. Edward Brian De-Fries) was placed on probation for a period of three years for the third degree felony offense of driving while intoxicated 3rd or more. Pursuant to the plea agreement, Defries is required to pay a \$2,000 fine to Donley County, is required to pay \$558 in court costs, and \$140 restitution.

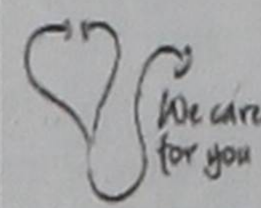
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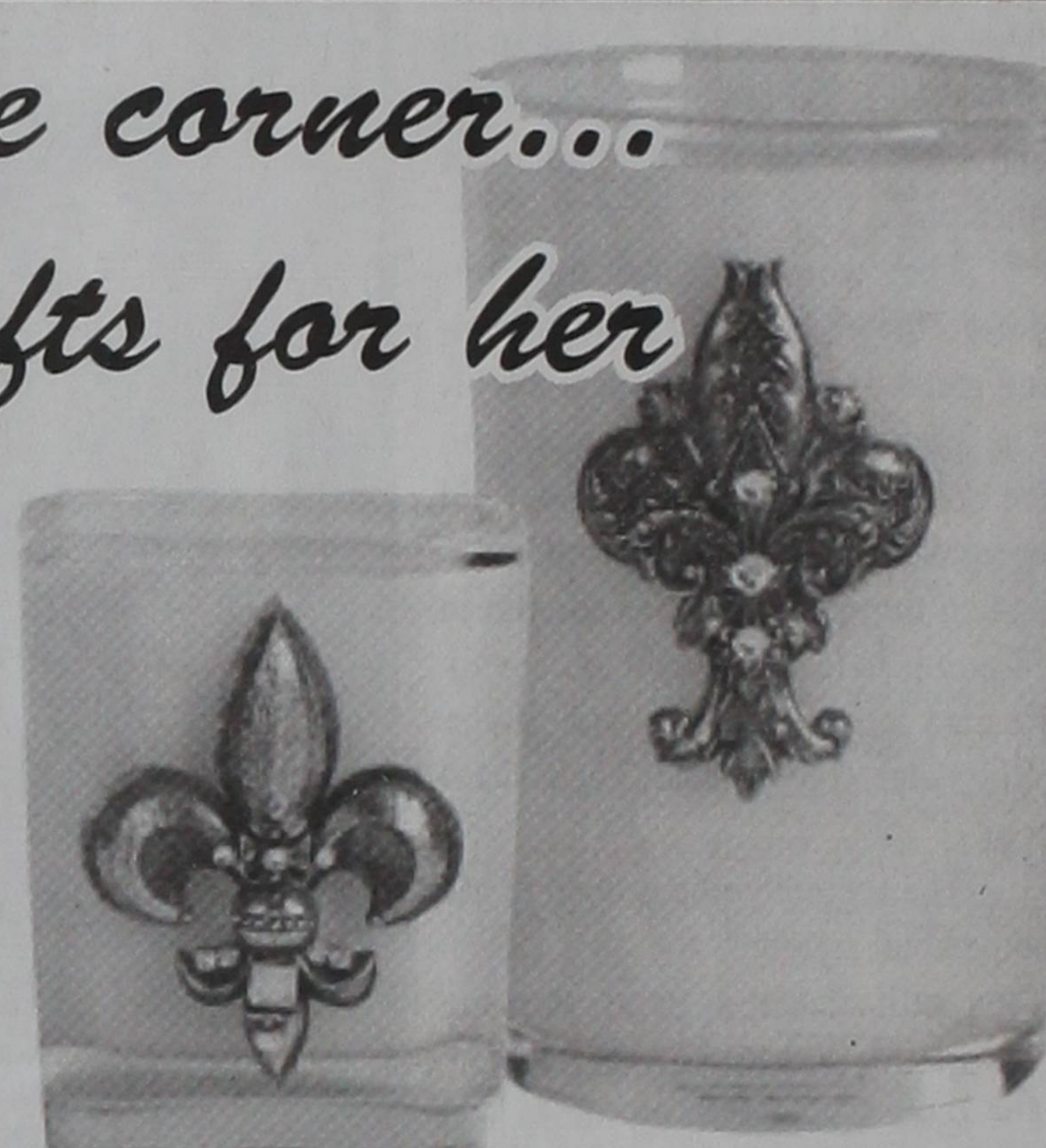


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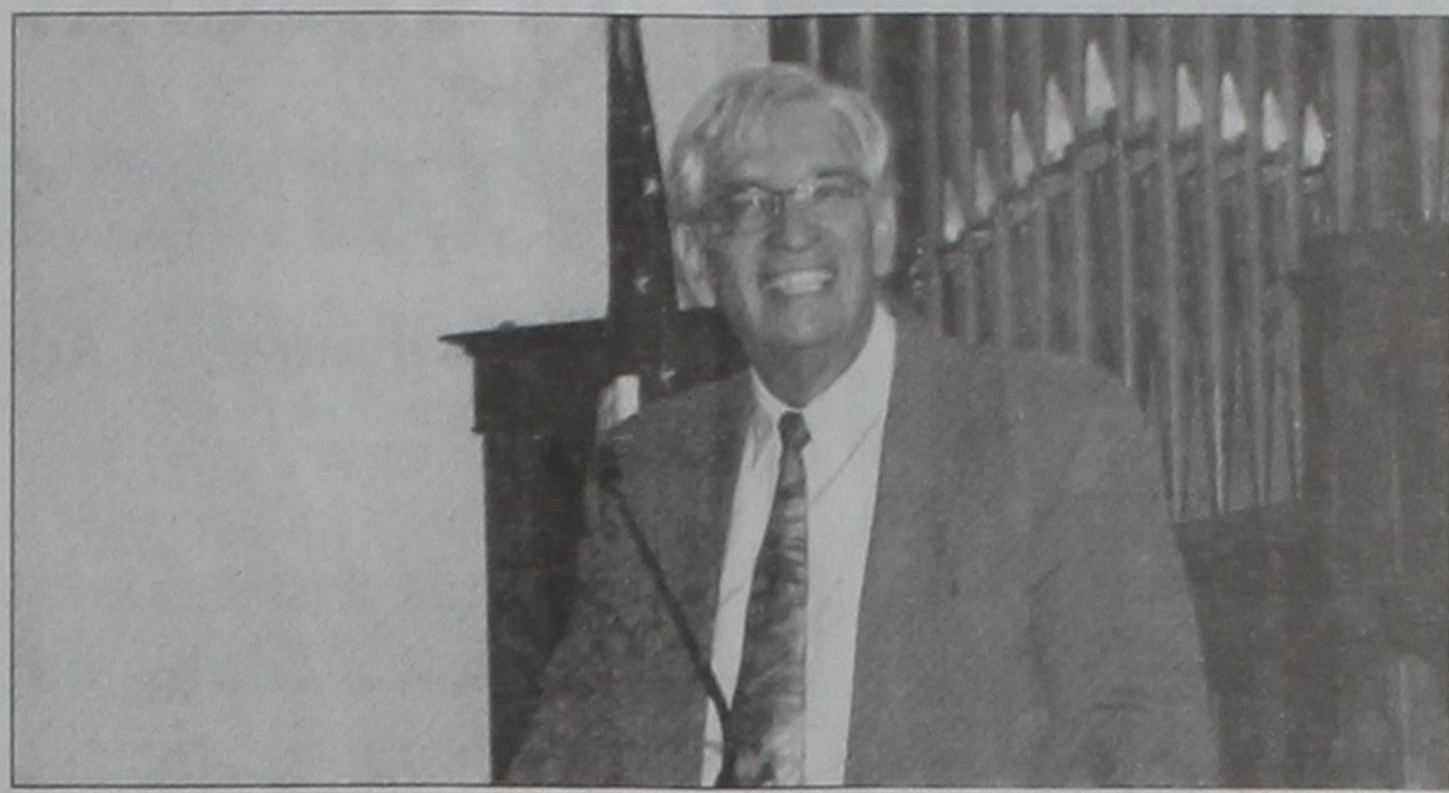

City Aldermen okay enlarging animal shelter

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen approved a plan to improve its animal shelter during the regular city meeting last Tuesday, November 9.

City Administrator Lambert Little proposed expanding the metal building by 15 feet and adding foam insulation to allow for more room and better conditions for captured animals.

The expansion has been discussed for some time but has generated more interest after a local woman's cat was captured by the city and then abandoned at the municipal airport.

At the meeting, Little offered a personal apology to the cat's owner, Regina Wootten, "for the fiasco that should not have happened" and offered his assurance that nothing like that would ever happen again.

The 16-year-old cat was later found and is said to be doing okay.

In other city business, aldermen agreed to rent a city-owned hanger at the airport to Little for \$25 per month with him agreeing to maintain the structure.

The board also voted not to sell or give away paving bricks that were recovered from US 287 (Second Street) more than 10 years ago and instead dedicated those bricks to street repairs.

A motion to allow the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to create a hazard mitigation plan for the city for \$277 was discussed and approved.

Aldermen approved a proposal by Little to sell surplus items through an online auction house - Rene Bates Auctioneers.

The board rejected an offer on tax delinquent property on the advice of the city administrator who said he thought the property could be better marketed and generate more money.

In his administrator's report, Little said he was optimistic after his first several days on the job, and he asked to have a called session with the board on November 30 for city planning.

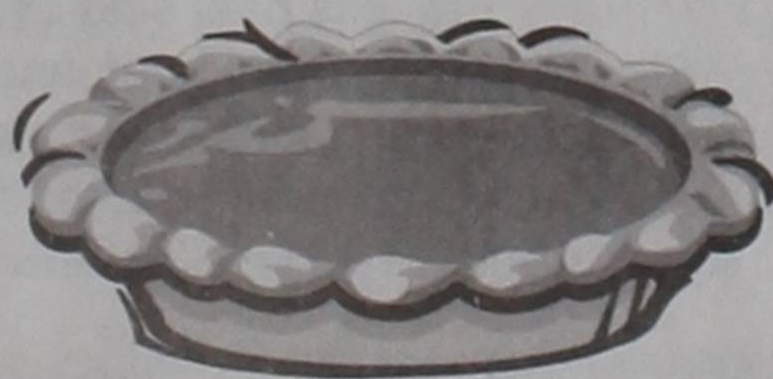

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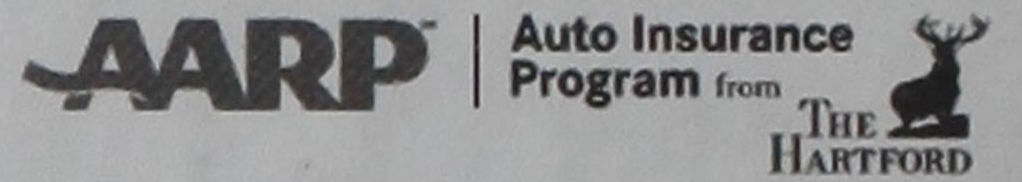

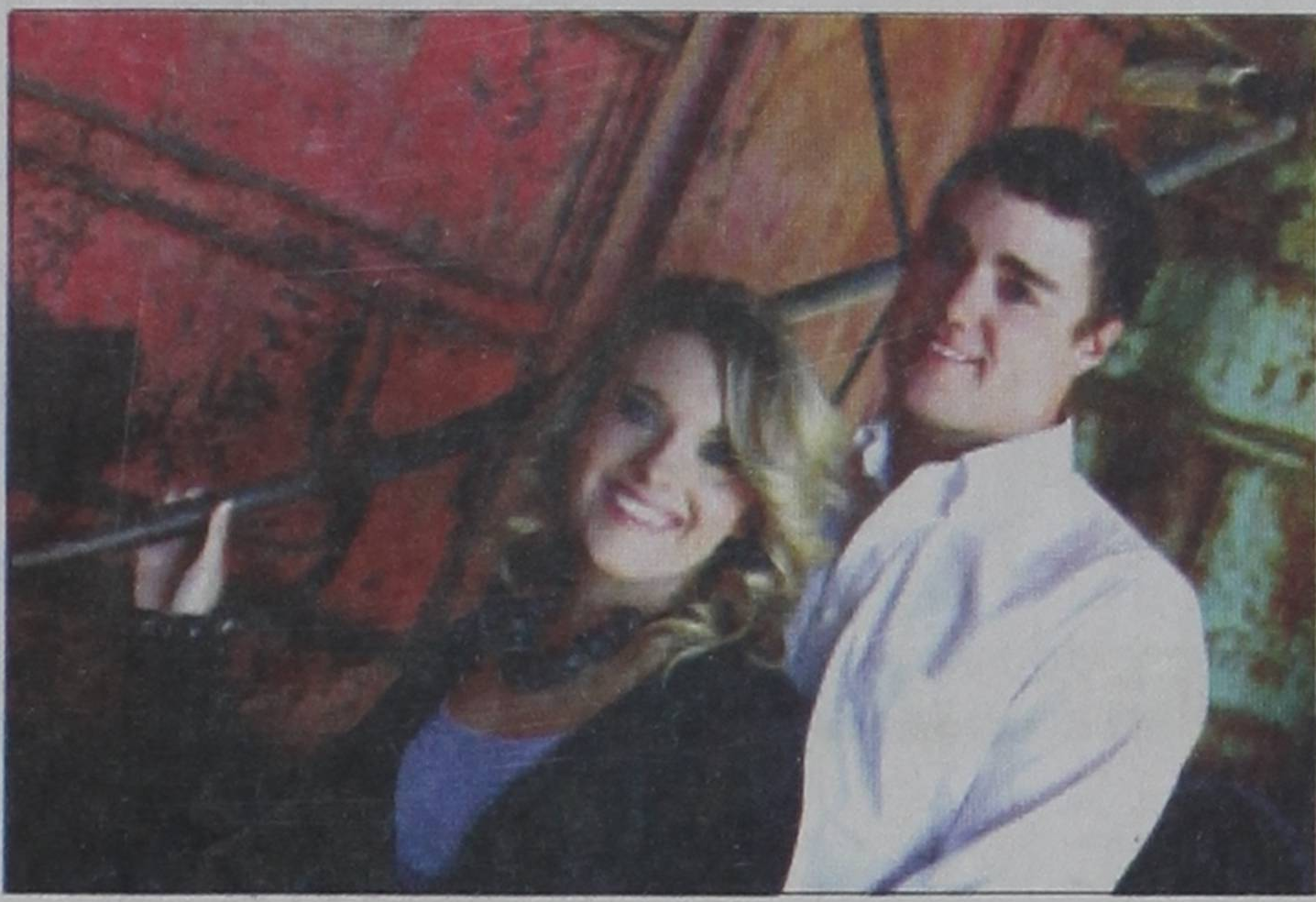

Drugs in the News

New Therapy Approved for Back Pain

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved Cymbalta (duloxetine) for the treatment of chronic back pain and pain associated with osteoarthritis. Over the years, cymbalta has been successfully used to manage a number of conditions such as depression, fibromyalgia (generalized muscle and tissue pain) and neuropathic pain associated with diabetes, in certain individuals. The FDA's approval of this new indication is based on results from four clinical trials. The results showed that persons who received duloxetine for back pain or pain due to osteoarthritis, reported a greater reduction in symptoms compared to placebo (those not receiving duloxetine).

Cymbalta is available only by prescription as 20mg, 30mg, and 60mg capsules. Dosing of cymbalta will depend on the needs of individuals after proper assessment by their primary care physician. Of the 27 million adults with osteoarthritis in the United States, about 85 percent are reported to experience lower-back pain at some point. This new indication will provide physicians an alternative treatment option in the management of this condition.

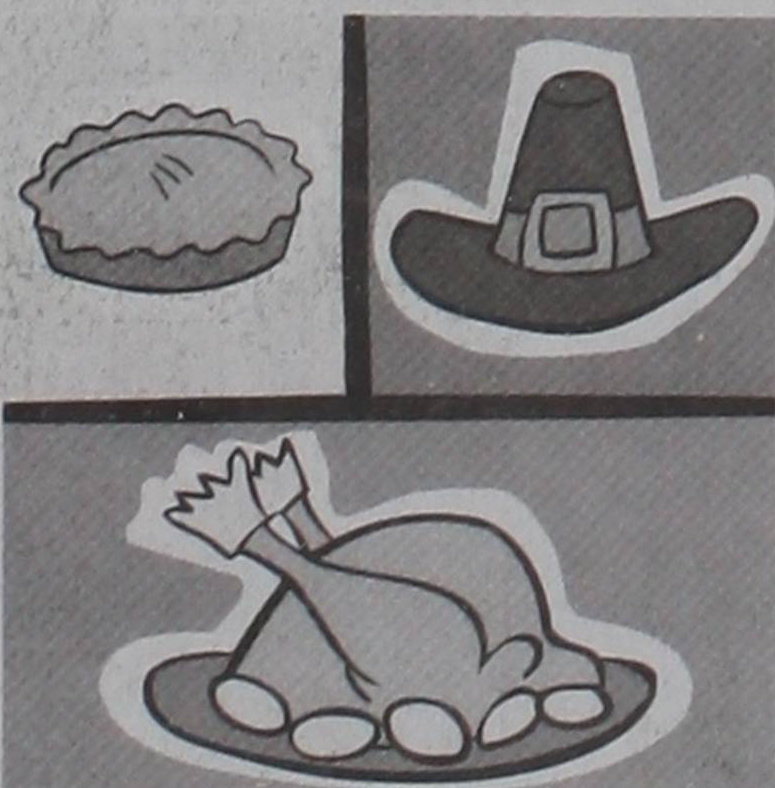
