## Youthful Window Peepers & Parents Being Warned By Sheriff

Sheriff Truett Behrens is issuing a general warning this week to all parents of young boys in their teens and the boys themselves regarding window peeping in Clarendon.

I am issuing the following statement for the safety of your own son and to help prevent a horrible incident. A number of Clarendon residents are ready to start shooting and ask questions later if such would be possible. One youth was caught peeping in windows last week and upon investigation the Sheriff's department learned that quite a number of boys had been following this peeping practice frequently all over town.

Folks are getting jittery, for they never know whether it is a prowler or a peeper, but over all they want to enjoy the privacy of their own premises and own home. It is dangerous to be messing around anyone's premises after dark, Behrens stated.

I am asking all parents of boys

in this area to take particular notice of the activities of their boys and know where they are and what they are doing when they are out at night. You may think your own son is not guilty of peeping—and in all probability he is not—but on the other hand he may be one of those who are taking an awful big chance by peeping in windows. We don't want any of our boys hurt or killed but it is going to take the cooperation of parents to eliminate this situation, the Sheriff added.

This warning is for those living in the rural areas as well as here in town who have boys. Some rural youths have been reported along with boys here in town. In addition to these youths, some adult peepers have been reported also which makes the situation much more serious. Please take heed of this warning so none of our boys will return home a gunshot victim, the Sheriff concluded.

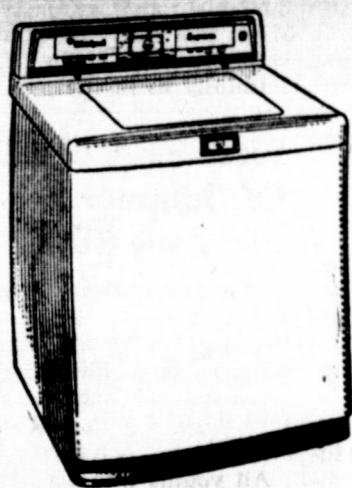

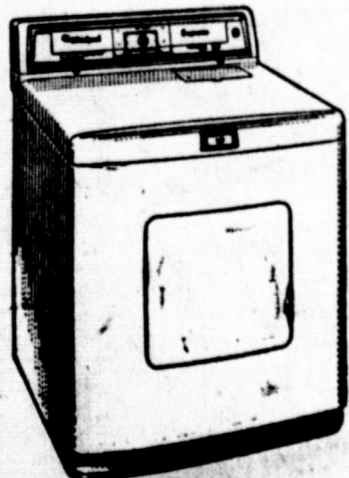

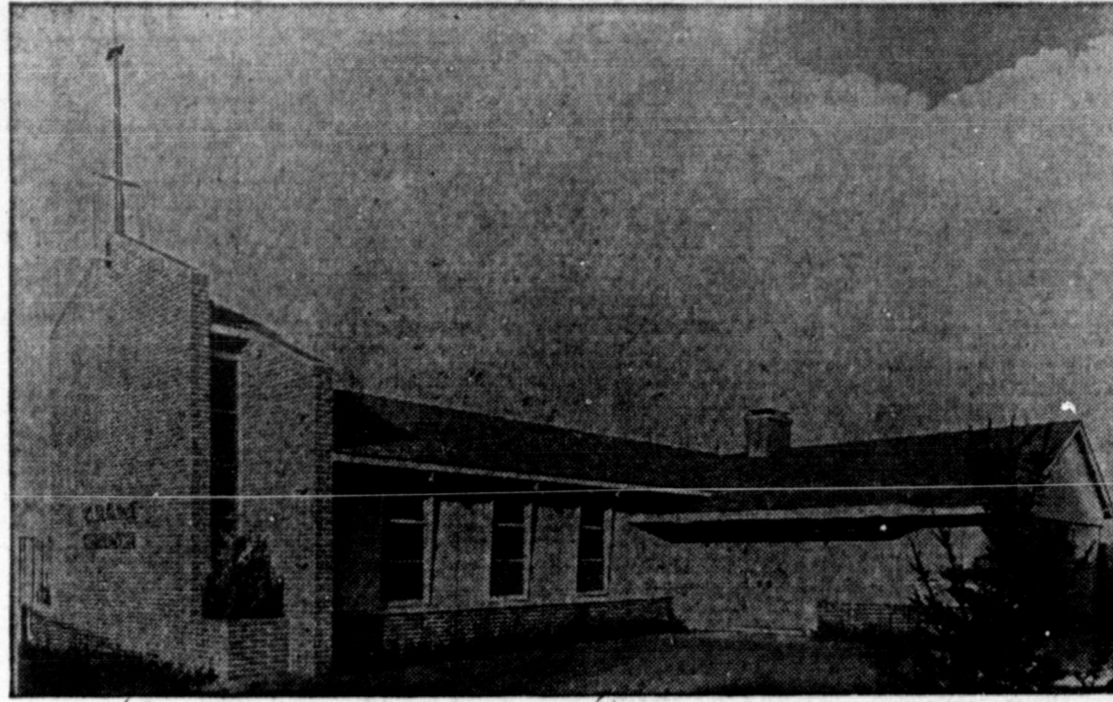

If he does not make a certification as to the variety of wheat harvested and sign such form, all of the wheat of such class or sub-class which he tenders for price support will be subject to a variety discount of 20 cents per bushel.

### DONLEY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Printed below are some thoughts on soil conservation prepared by Arthur L. Golden, minister of the Perryton Church of Christ, in observance of Soil Stewardship, May 6, 1956. This article came to the attention of one of the Donley County Soil Conservation District supervisors, who thought that perhaps the people of this Soil Conservation District would appreciate and benefit from reading it.

#### "WE ARE STEWARDS OF GOD'S EARTH"

"The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof," Psalms 24:1. You and I owe God for everything. This land we live on belongs to Him. We are stewards of that which we are using, whether it be 20 acres or 20 sections. As each nation has used or abused its sacred trust of stewardship over God's soil, it has prospered or deteriorated. The barren wastes of once fertile Mesopotamia, Canaan and Egypt prove this.

God formed man and woman, blessed them and said unto them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it . . ." Gen. 1:28. This word, "REPLENISH" points up the fact of our obligation to God to put back into his earth AT LEAST AS MUCH as we take out of it. We are poor stewards, and selfish indeed, if we think only of our own pockets, our own barns and cellars. In 1975 what will the 200 million children of ours have with which to produce their living? Just so much waste lands and barren subsoil? "Many shepherds have destroyed my

vineyard, they have trodden my portion under foot, they have made it desolate, and being desolate, it mourneth unto me; the whole land is made desolate because no man layeth it to heart." So said God; Jer. 12: 10-12.

The selfish man in Luke 12: 15-21 was a rich farmer who thought only of how to take from God's earth and God's people to fill his own enlarged storehouse. God said, "Thou fool! Thy soul shall be required of thee." This man put nothing back into God's plan for others. Regardless of how many acres your fences enclose, no matter how many cattle or sheep you call yours, in God's great plan you are only the 'steward', and will give an account to Him as to the way you handled them all. You are charged with the responsibility not to abuse God's earth, but more than that, you are obligated to improve it.

Everything materially depends upon the soil; our goods, our houses, our clothes, our very lives. The top soil of our nation can spell the heritage of our grandchildren. However, it goes deeper than that. The spiritual attitude of this generation will determine the way we either use or abuse our 'stewardship'. There is an average of only 9 inches of topsoil left in this United States! Greedy men who strip our forests, play under sod and take everything, never replenishing God's soil, will surely leave a heritage of desolation. Truly it may be fulfilled, "THE SINS OF THE FATHERS SHALL BE VISITED UPON THE CHILDREN TO THE THIRD AND FOURTH GENERATION." Ex. 34:7.

It has been well said, (by Frank Herzel) MORE THAN BREAD, p. 130) "The destiny of the whole creative process is in our keeping.

The productive topsoil is all we have to live upon—trees, grasses, flowers, beasts and man. When the topsoil goes, . . . we all shall go." May we never forget—that not only must we "GIVE OURSELVES to the Lord" 2 Cor. 8:5; but we must be "Good stewards of God," 1 Pet. 4:10.

"Each one shall give an account unto God", 2 Cor. 5: 10, 11. May God bless us as we humble ourselves under His mighty hand, that He may exalt us in due season."

#### Will Wilson Resigns From Supreme Court To Make Campaign For Att'y General

Supreme Court Justice Will Wilson has resigned his post on the State's highest tribunal to launch a fighting campaign for Attorney General of Texas. His resignation was made effective June 1.

"The most compelling call to duty for me today is to serve the people of Texas as their Attorney General," Wilson said. With a career as Dallas' racket-busting district attorney, followed by six years on the Supreme Court, Wilson said he left the court "with reluctance." However he surprised few Capitol observers in responding to the challenge to serve as Texas' number one law enforcement officer.

"I have been asked why I am willing to leave the Supreme Court," Wilson commented. "Like the old cavalry general, I've always believed in riding straight for the sound of the guns.

"Certainly I know that I am deliberately turning my back on the security of a quiet harbor and certainly the course we will steer lies through troubled waters. But that's where the need is greatest.

"Texas' greatest need today is vigorous enforcement of our Texas laws. I believe I can serve Texas best in filling that need."

Most seasoned observers agree that Judge Wilson would have been re-elected without opposition to the Supreme Court. Both of his colleagues up for re-election are unopposed.

"I cannot remain on the Supreme Court while I campaign for Attorney General," he said.

On the issue of corruption in Texas government, Wilson's statement was quick and clear-cut: "We're way past that as an issue. The only issue today is who is best qualified to clean it up.

"I believe my record as two-time assistant attorney general, prosecuting district attorney and supreme court associate justice qualify me to do the job."

Wilson was elected to the Court in 1950 by a heavy majority. He is one of the youngest men ever to serve on the high bench. While District Attorney he gained national recognition in stamping out organized crime in Dallas.

Selected by U. S. Attorney General J. Howard McGrath as one of the five district attorneys in the United States to speak before the Department of Justice's Conference on Organized Crime in Washington in 1950, Wilson was commended as one of the outstanding prosecutors of crime in the nation.

As assistant Attorney General of Texas under Gerald Mann and Grover Sellers in 1941-42, Wilson successfully prosecuted cases involving millions of dollars for Texas school children.

Wilson served in World War II in combat throughout the South Pacific in army campaigns ranging from New Guinea to Luzon and was decorated for patrol activity behind enemy lines.

Born forty-four years ago in Dallas, Wilson received a Bachelor of Science degree in geology in 1934 and was graduated from Southern Methodist University Law School with the top record in his class.

Married and the father of two children, he and Mrs. Wilson live

at 2201 Stamford Lane in Austin.

# Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

**AUSTIN**—Nearly 100,000 young Texans take off their mortar boards and roll up their sleeves this week.  
 Analysts predict that figures, when complete, will show a record number of diplomas and degrees awarded this year.

Texas Education Agency pegs public high school graduates at between 64,000 and 65,000. Degrees being conferred by state-

supported colleges and universities are estimated by the Texas Legislature Council at 20,000. Private and church-supported schools swell the graduate rolls several thousand more.

Awaiting these young people, said commencement speakers, is unprecedented opportunity. Examples of the '56 high school graduate's future, as outlined by an Austin speaker: (1) a longer life span—44 years ahead for boys, 49 for girls; (2) higher earnings averaging a quarter million dollars apiece; (3) less work, dwindling to a 30-hour week and (4) ever-increasing ease and leisure as technology advances.

Concrete evidence of the speakers' promises is the job placement story. University of Texas Student Employment Bureau reports five to ten job offers per graduate at better than ever salaries. Personnel in some deans' offices speak wearily of the impossibility of coping with the

year-end flood of would-be employers.

High school officials say many graduates began work between their last exam and commencement night.

### MIXED REACTION TO HIGHWAY BILL

A bonanza or a blunder—Texans are in disagreement as to which term applies to the new federal highway bill.

Senate passage of the bill left only a few details to be ironed out in House-Senate conference before sending the measure to the President. Final enactment will set into motion a 13-year, \$51,000,000,000 interstate highway construction program.

Texas Highway Department officials are frankly jubilant. They are poised to begin letting contracts Aug. 1, using the new supply of federal funds. "We'll be scraping the bottom of the barrel in the July letting," said State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer.

Greer said the new law would mean a minimum increase of \$57,000,000 a year in federal road building aid to Texas—or double the present amount.

He called it "the most far-reaching piece of highway legislation yet enacted." He predicted an era of unparalleled development.

Gov. Allan Shivers was less enthusiastic. He charged turning a state function over to "bungling bureaucracy" made it unduly costly.

His objection was to the provision giving the Secretary of Labor, rather than the states, power to set wages on all contracts. "This means a third less highway mileage than the people would otherwise get," said Shivers.

"Tax money always dwindles in value," said the governor, "when it is sent to Washington for processing and, returned to the states."

### HOPE HELD FOR LABOR LAW

Champions of Texas' "right-to-work" law haven't given up the fight.

Railroad attorneys and Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd contend that the U. S. Supreme Court decision on a Nebraska law did not touch on the constitutional issues involved in Texas. This was pointed out in a supplemental brief filed last week with the Texas Supreme Court.

A ruling is expected soon from the state's high court on the hard-

fought "Amarillo case" involving railroad unions' right to demand closed shop contracts.

Union leaders interpret the U. S. Court ruling as knocking out state anti-closed shop laws in the railroad industry. Shepperd and railroad lawyers say the decision, if anything, strengthens the case for the Texas law.

### HIGHER AND HIGHER LEARNING

A rising skyline has been proposed to meet the University of Texas' critical classroom needs.

Pres. Logan Wilson suggests that the only two remaining sites on the original 40-acre campus be used for eight-story buildings. Most present buildings have four floors. For development five to ten years hence, Dr. Wilson recommends expanding to the east of the present campus in the area adjacent to Memorial Stadium.

### "TV TRIAL" APPEALED

Fairness of the first televised murder trial in Texas history is being challenged in the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Defense attorneys charge that Dist. Atty. Tom Moore of Waco

was more interested in "putting on a show" in the Waco trial of Harry L. Washburn, than in giving the man a fair trial.

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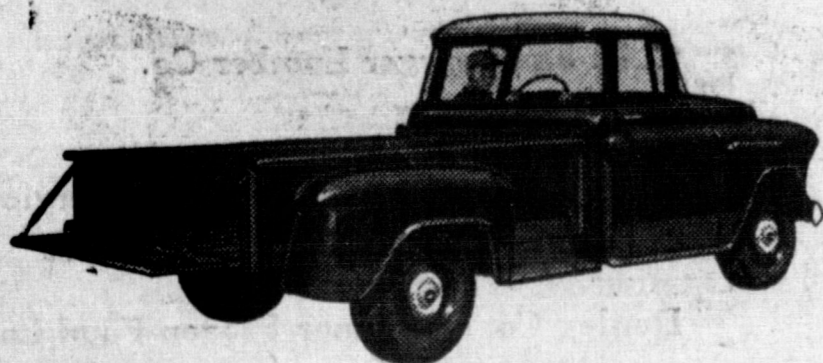

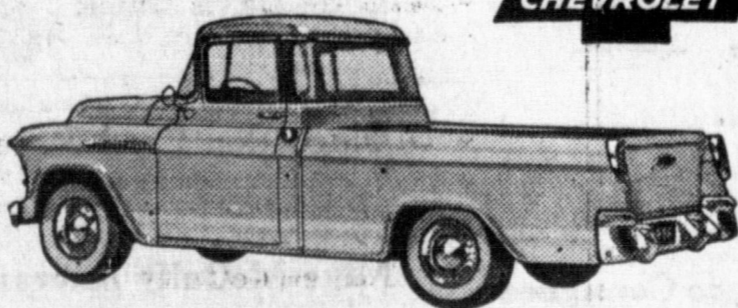

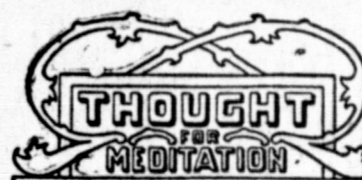
