#### Two Cowboys Drown In JA Stock Tank

Last Wednesday was a tragic day on the JA Ranch when two youthful cowboys drowned in a stock tank while driving a herd of cattle across the Mitch Bell pasture 23 miles southwest of here. The two victims were Emmitt Johnson, 18, of Lefors, and Merle Scott, 20, of Vega.

The double-drowning occurred about 11:30 a. m. when several JA cowboys were moving a cattle herd across the Mitch Bell pasture. Johnson tried to swim his horse across the tank while the others were driving the herd along the dam at the opposite end. He was thrown into the water when the horse reared, and he couldn't swim. Without waiting to take off his boots and chaps, Scott jumped into the tank. Apparently he was exhausted at the time he reached Johnson and was unable to fight off the drowning man's attempts to grab him. Both men sank in water

#### Plastics Develop New Farming Methods



Farmers and greenhouse owners are learning to use flexible plastic films in a number of new ways to step up operational efficiencies.

The current widespread interest in plastic film as an aid in the conservation of farm water, for instance, is dramatized in this experimental installation completed recently under a program sponsored by the College of Agriculture at the University of California, Lengths of film were taped together to form a water-retaining liner for this farm reservoir which is 130 feet long and 100 feet wide.

In regions where rainfall provides inadequate moisture for normal plant growth, film-lined irrigation ditches can distribute supplementary water to thirsty crops. The plastic effectively eliminates

the water losses caused by seepage.

Protection of silage is another promising on-the-farm use. Properly covered with plastic tarpaulins, silage stored outdoors remains in a high state of preservation. Tarps are easily rolled back for interim

The same material is used in greenhouses as an airtight covering during steam sterilization of seed beds and soil fumigation and, as a watertight liner, the plastic permits double decking of greenhouse

The applications look so promising that one supplier of fumigants and agricultural specialties, Larvacide, Inc. of New York, already is offering a line of vinyl plastic tarpaulins and film rolls tailored to the These heavy duty tarps and rolls have built-in resistance to sunlight, steam and gas fumigants. 





#### De-Inking Process Developed

AUSTIN-A University of Texas chemist and a former student have patented a de-inking process that may help solve the critical newsprint shortage.

The method of de-inking waste paper was developed by Dr. Norman Hackerman, chemistry department chairman, and William J. Krodel, now employed by a Los Angeles, Calif., chemical company.


