ilar causes, if no clear proof. In one year over a million dollar
worth of property was destroyed worth of property was destroye
by the failures of beer-drinking engineers and switchmen on this road alone.
The Chicago \& Alton Railroad officials, less than a year ago "The use of intoxicating drinks and frequenting of gambling. places, or other places of lambling sort, have proven a most fruitful source of trouble to railways as well as to individuals. Recog. nizing the fact, this company wil exercise the most rigid scrutiny in reference to the habits of em ployees in this respect
toxicating liquor by any employe of this company while on duty strictly prohibited, and no employee will be allowed to have such liquors in or about any sta tion, shop, or other premises this company at any time or un der any circumstances.
' 'Any conductor' trainman, en ginineer, fireman, switchman, o other employee who is known to use intoxicating liquors, or fre guent gambling places, or othe places of low resort, either whil y and permanently discharged from the service of this compa ny."
