Broncos sting Highland Park in double overtime

The Clarendon Broncos kept the suspense running high as they went into double overtime during their district game with Highland Park.

The Broncos won last Friday's home game, 68-60.

The Hornets, newcomers to district 6-2A this year, owned a 9-10 overall record and were 2-0 in district play going into Friday evening's game.

The Broncos and the Hornets had an even matchup throughout the game. The Broncos were down by two with 10 second left in the game. Senior Travis Woodard was fouled on an offensive rebound and went to the line to shoot two to tie the game. Both shots went straight through the net.

The Broncos defense held off the Hornets in the last seconds to force overtime play.

The overtime was an exciting one with both teams trading baskets for four minutes. Highland Park's Raheem Travis put in two free throws to take the lead with four second left in

the OT. Clarendon called a time out to set up a play for the final seconds.

As expected, the Broncos gave the ball to Travis Woodard. Woodard took the ball down the court, drove just past the three-point line, and put up a shot with less than a second left. Travis gave himself the birthday present he wanted most as he sunk the basket and forced another four minutes.

"I just kept hoping that the ball was going to go in. I thought it was really flat. I guess someone from above must have made it go in because it wasn't pretty," said Woodard.

Clarendon maintained their composure throughout the game, but it was never more evident than in the second overtime. The Broncos made one field goal and 7 of 8 free throws while holding the Hornets to only three points to clinch the game, 68-60, for their first district win.

Scoring for the Broncos were Travis Woodard, 27; Sam Holton, 12; Ben Wilson, 8;

Derek Shields, 6; Carey Thornberry, 6; Nathan Sears, 4; Chris Linquist, 3; and Josh Williams, 2.

"We really wanted to win this game for Coach Osuna," Woodard said of the Bronco head coach who had a death in his family last week.

"Coach Ray kept us pumped up and we made it through. We've known all along that we should have beaten some of the teams that have beaten us," Woodard said. "Everybody feels relieved and more confident from getting this first win. We know for sure that we can really play. It's helped us to come together more as a team."

The Broncos did not fair as well earlier last week when they played the Wellington Sky-rockets on Tuesday, January 12. Both teams played a physical ballgame and had the hot hand early.

The Broncos went into halftime down by

only one. Led by Seniors Derek Shields, Travis Woodard, and Nathan Sears in the third quarter with a 10-point lead it looked as if the Broncos would dominate the rest of the game. It was not to be.

Wellington came out with a vengeance and tied the game within two minutes. The Sky-rockets shut down the shell-shocked Broncos offense and put on a scoring clinic as they outscored Clarendon, 30-10, in the fourth quarter to win the game, 55-65.

Scoring for the Broncos against Wellington were Travis Woodard, 18; Nathan Sears, 10; Derek Shields, 9; Carey Thornberry, 6; Chris Linquist, 4; Sam Holton, 4; Jeremy Ray, 3; and Josh Williams, 1.

The Broncos will host the Panhandle Panthers on Friday, January 22. Game time is scheduled for 8 p.m.

Clarendon will start the second half of district in White Deer on Tuesday, January 26, at 8 p.m.

Seventy-nine percent of taxes are paid

Approximately 79 percent of the current year's local property taxes have now been paid.

Taxes not paid on or before January 31 will incur penalty and interest of 7 percent if paid in February. The amount increases each month thereafter until the tax is paid.

Accounts unpaid on July 1 will incur an additional 15 percent collection penalty in addition to the regular penalty and interest of 18 percent. The penalty amount is prescribed by Texas state law.

This notice is a reminder to those who have not paid their 1998 taxes. In an effort to cut office costs, second notices will not be mailed to individual taxpayers during January. Delinquent notices will be mailed in May to those who still owe 1998 tax at that time. Partial payments will be accepted.

Taxes are payable to the Donley Appraisal District, P.O. Box 1220, Clarendon, TX 79226.

Texas Beef Producers help launch new age for beef

While the world waits 12 months for the start of a new millennium, Texas beef producers are getting a jump-start with a New Age of their own.

In 1999, Texas beef producers will join their national counterparts in launching a public relations campaign promoting convenient, easy-to-fix, affordable beef entrees.

For producers, these new products signal a transition from scores of fresh beef cuts that require different levels of preparation time to new products that consumers can prepare quickly yet still provide the eating comfort of traditional beef dishes.

Beef producers are helping leverage promotion of these new products with a \$25 million national advertising campaign funded by the \$1 per head beef checkoff program. Their

goal is to increase consumer awareness of the convenience of these beef products while solidifying beef's place at the table and expanding its share of the burgeoning convenience meal market.

The \$10 million television ad campaign will run Jan. 18 to Feb. 7 and in the post-Easter period from April 5-25 on network and cable television channels. Time slots will include prime time, daytime syndication, early morning, and sports programming. The industry will support the broadcast effort with print ads in women's magazines and other strategic print publications.

The ad campaign brings back the "Beef. It's What's for Dinner." tagline and Aaron Copeland's classic "Rodeo" music that differentiated the industry's earlier ads. More than 70

percent of consumers surveyed had awareness of the beef industry's tagline. Veteran actor Sam Elliott will do the voice over.

Through these ads, consumers will become aware of the convenience of innovative beef dinner options from several beef product manufacturers, said Texas beef producer Roger Welder of Victoria, chairman of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association's advertising committee.

"The ads recapture the values and images important to producers and consumers," Welder said. "But most importantly, they make an announcement to consumers and beef industry channels that the new fully prepared beef products are out there and they're designed to fit into today's time-crunched lifestyles."

Besides the national television

advertising roll-out, the marketing behind the heat and-serve products will include public relations, promotions, retail and foodservice partnerships, and co-marketing with beef entree manufacturers. While national checkoff efforts highlight national beef products, the Texas Beef Council will work with the state's media to focus on convenient beef products made in Texas. TBC also will promote the products with retail partners and at Texas consumer events.

Research shows that today's consumer spends less than 30 minutes in the kitchen-one fifth of the time that consumers of the 1960s invested in cooking meals. Younger consumers have little knowledge of how to cook unfamiliar beef cuts.

As a result, consumers increased

Clarendon College eyes the future

Last Friday about 30 area people attended a "visioning workshop" or planning session at Clarendon College to set goals for where the school should be in about ten years.

I admit to having some skepticism about attending the workshop. In 1996, an economic development team from West Texas Utilities put on a similar workshop. That workshop was a futile exercise that did not produce any common goals for our community, but it did end up with a nice maroon and white report which is now gathering dust on several shelves in town.

I think many of the other attendees last week came in feeling the same way - "Oh, boy. Another workshop." But this workshop was different.

CC invited a broad cross-section of people from its eight-county service area that included business leaders, alumni, educators from area schools, representatives from the Pampa Center Foundation, and members of the board of regents. The workshop leaders broke this diverse group into four small teams, which brainstormed several ideas then presented those ideas to the whole group.

Amazingly, many of the ideas from the different teams overlapped. And when the entire group voted, the top ideas from each team created a clear picture of what Clarendon College should look like in the next decade. Everyone seemed to agree with those goals, and the general consensus was that the four hours spent at the seminar was time well spent. We were then told that a similar workshop held on Thursday with CC students, faculty, and staff produced many of the same goals.

When was the last time any group agreed on any issue dealing with Clarendon College?

I'm not printing an enumeration of the workshops' goals until I see the results of both sessions, but hopefully we can keep the momentum generated by those two workshops energized and get Clarendon College moving forward.

For 100 years Clarendon College has met many challenges, overcome many obstacles. As CC embarks on its second century, we must honor our heritage by focusing on the institution's future and making the necessary changes to meet new challenges.

We all depend on Clarendon College as a cornerstone of our local economy and as an agent of opportunity via education. All of the groups involved - the regents, faculty, administration, and students as well as the community, alumni, and supporters from this entire area - must work to achieve these common goals. Ultimately, we are all in this together.

their purchases of ground beef and steaks from the rib and loin. These consumption patterns have lowered demand for the chuck and round cuts. This has been a drain on beef producers since chuck and round represent more than 60 percent of a beef animal's red meat yield.

The beef industry's challenge is to promote chuck and round cuts as versatile and convenient. And with the introduction of a host of new,

heat-and-eat beef products this has become possible.

These beef products have great relevance to dual-income and single parent families who are working longer hours. 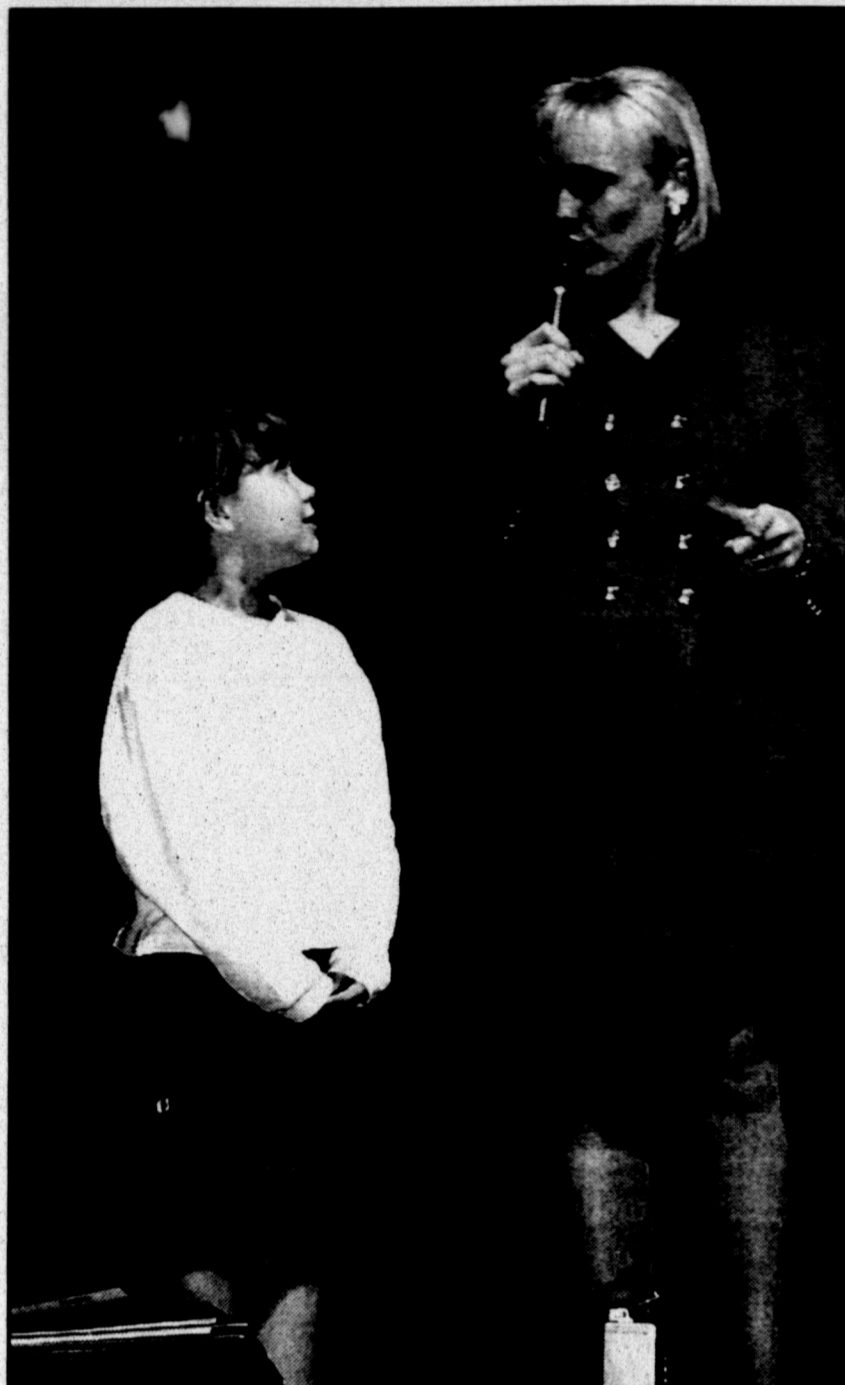

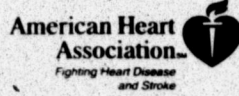

Trees offer short-term and long-term benefits that few other cover plantings can match. Because of their extensive root systems, trees are as effective, and in many cases more effective, than other types of vegetation for keeping soil where it belongs - on the ground and out of waterways. Trees also provide shelter for many kinds of birds and animals.

In addition, trees offer another benefit, one that is gaining more attention as people grow increasingly concerned about the greenhouse effect and global climate change. Changes in global climate are caused, in part, by the buildup of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Because trees use carbon dioxide in the photosynthetic process and store carbon in their wood, large-scale reforestation may be one way to counteract the greenhouse effect.

Trees provide these benefits for decades, because once farmland is planted in trees, it tends to stay in trees. The records of previous farmland reserve programs bear that out. For example, approximately 90 percent of the acres planted in trees under the Soil Bank program of the 1950s and 1960s have remained forested, while many of the Soil Bank acres planted in grass have been returned to crop production.

Taxpayers benefit from trees, too. Government expenditures to promote tree planting will "buy" decades worth of conservation on planted acreage. In addition, those programs that foster tree planting on cropland are expected to shave billions of dollars from the US Department of Agriculture's agricultural support program expenditures.
