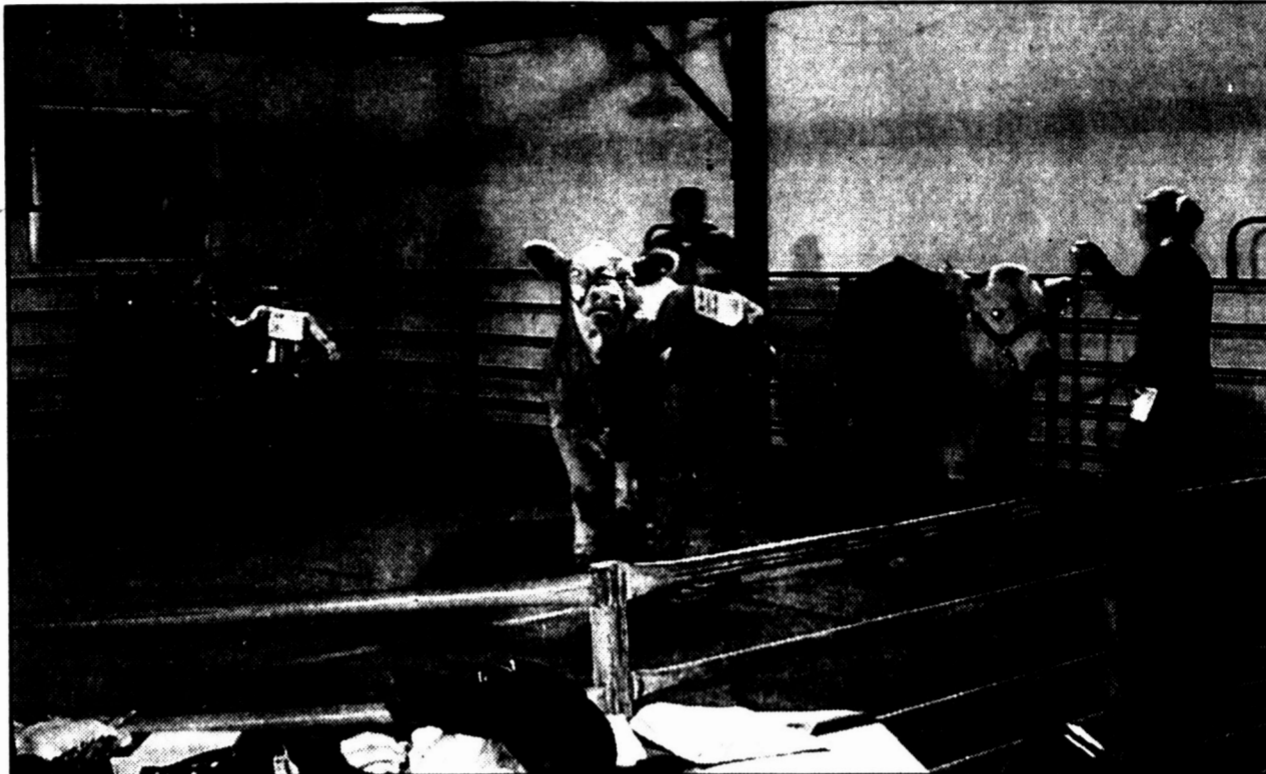

## Comptroller delivers money from tobacco settlement

Donley Hospital District receives \$65,275

AUSTIN — State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced that checks totaling \$300 million have been mailed to Texas cities, counties and hospital districts across the state to help them recoup some of the costs of providing health care to the indigent patients with tobacco related illnesses.

The Donley County Hospital District received \$65,275.33. The hospital board reportedly has no immediate plans for Donley County's share of the settlement other than to place the money in an interest bearing account.

"The funds being distributed amount to 'found money' for Texas cities, counties and hospital districts. The money is the result of a clause in the Texas tobacco settlement increasing payments from the tobacco companies as a result of the 'Most Favored Nation' provision. When the State of Minnesota and the tobacco industry reached agreement, the clause kicked in the extra revenue for Texas," said Comptroller Rylander.

Rylander said that even though the signature on the checks is hers, State Senator Bill Ratliff, House Speaker Pete Laney, Representative Rob Junell, and the Attorney General's Office deserve credit for negotiating the agreement that brought the money to Texas. Thanks are also due to the Texas Department of Health for handling the administrative work necessary to distribute the funds to the correct entities.

"Senator Ratliff, Speaker Laney, Representative Junell, and the Attorney General's staff negotiated the 'Most Favored Nation' tobacco settle-

ment in midsummer. Their vision and perseverance is paying off for the State of Texas," Comptroller Rylander said.

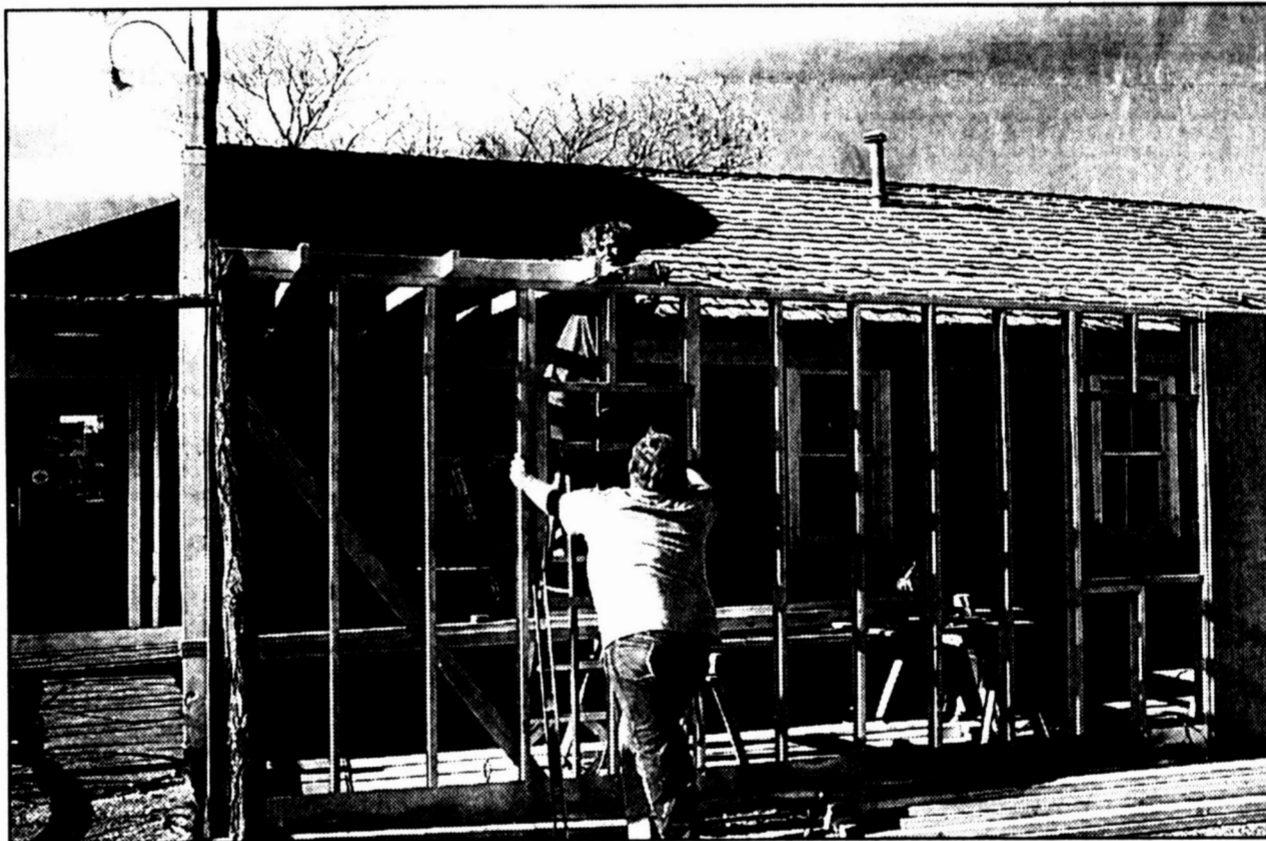
"Texas cities, counties, and hospital districts that provide care to indigent patients will receive just under \$2.3 billion over the next five years. The checks mailed out today are the first down payment," said Comptroller Rylander.

The money from the settlement is in addition to the \$15 billion amount negotiated by the State of Texas with the tobacco industry and is for the benefit of cities, counties, and hospital districts. While the Legislature must determine how to spend the \$15 billion state share, they have no control over the distribution and spending of the money designated for the local entities.

Altogether, more than 300 checks were mailed out to cities, counties, and hospital districts across Texas. The check amounts were determined by several factors, including 1990 U.S. Census data and the providers' legal responsibility for indigent health care.

Under the terms of the agreement, the Comptroller's office will distribute another \$100 million in April 2000 and \$50 million in April 2001, using a formula based on unreimbursed health care expenditures.

An additional \$1.85 billion to be received from the settlement over the next four years will be deposited to a Permanent Trust Account. The income from this permanent fund will be distributed pro-rata to the cities, counties and hospital districts providing indigent health care in proportion to their amount of unreimbursed health care expenditures.

## Last member of pioneer family dies

Muffett Sims Merrell, age 97, of Overland Park, Kansas, died Wednesday, January 6, 1999, in Delmar Gardens at Lenexa, Kansas.

Funeral services were held at 1:00 p.m. on Monday, January 11, 1999, in Robertson Chapel of Memories in Clarendon with Rev. Smiley Johnson, Pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church in Clarendon, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors, Inc.

Born in Clarendon, she was the surviving member of a pioneer family who helped establish Clarendon and whose father, John T. Sims brought cattle to Kansas City in the 1800's. Mr. Sims was also Mayor of Clarendon for several years.

Sims Street in Clarendon was named for her family, and survivors say that what is now City Park was once known as Sims Park.

She married Louie B. Merrell on April 28, 1924, at the First United Methodist Church in Clarendon. She and her husband later moved to Memphis. Mr. Merrell was Western Division manager of Anderson-Clayton Company. He predeceased her in death on December 27, 1953.

Mrs. Merrell attended Kidd Key College in Sherman, Texas, and became a music teacher.

She moved to Kansas City in 1968 and published short stories following studies in professional writing at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, the University of Oklahoma at Norman, Oklahoma, the University of Kansas at Lawrence, Kansas, and the Instituto Addende in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, where she spent many winters.

She was a member of Asbury Methodist Church.

In addition to her husband, she was preceded in death by her father, John T. Sims; her mother, Zella Sims; a brother, John T. Sims, Jr.; and sisters, Cassandra Morris, Fannie Florence Whitmore, and Nettie Sims.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Leon A. Triggs, Jr., of Overland Park, Kansas; 2 grandchildren; 4 great grandchildren; and 1 great great grandchild.

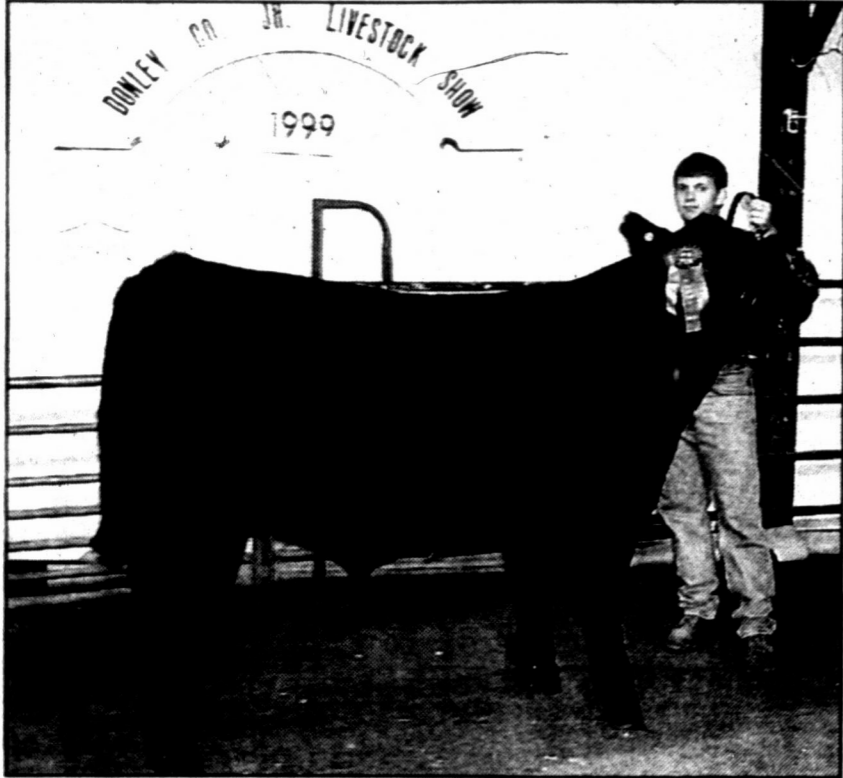

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# North West Texas Cotton Conference set for Jan. 19

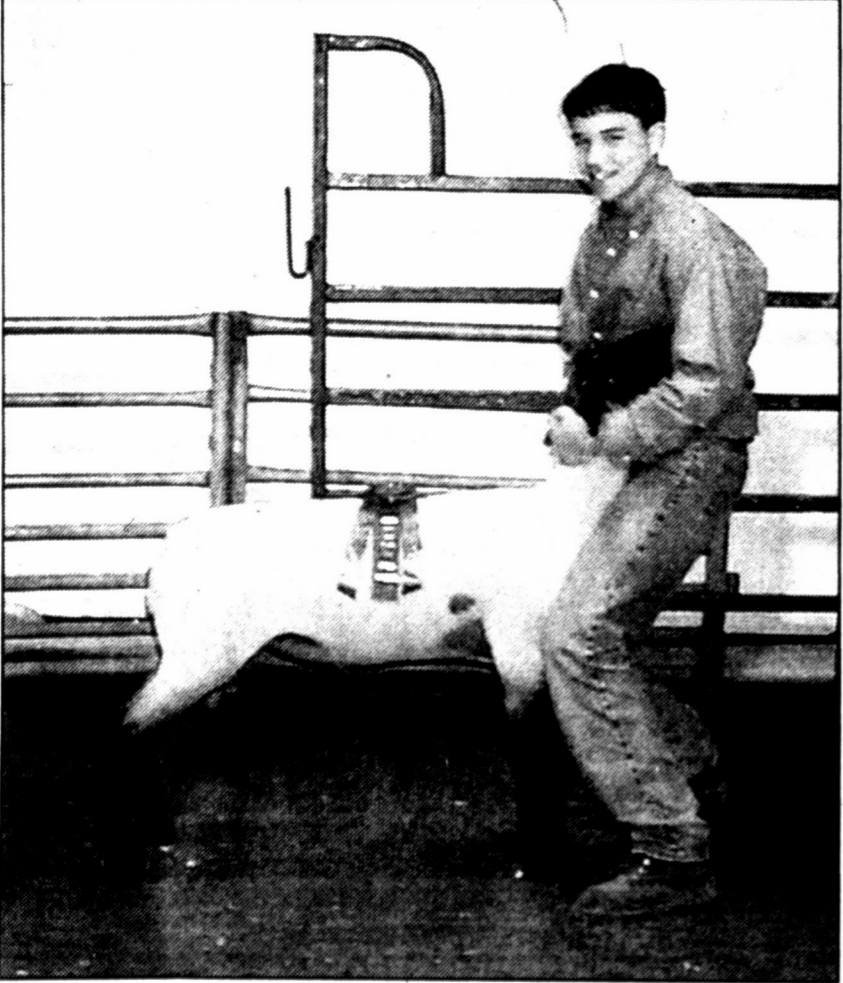

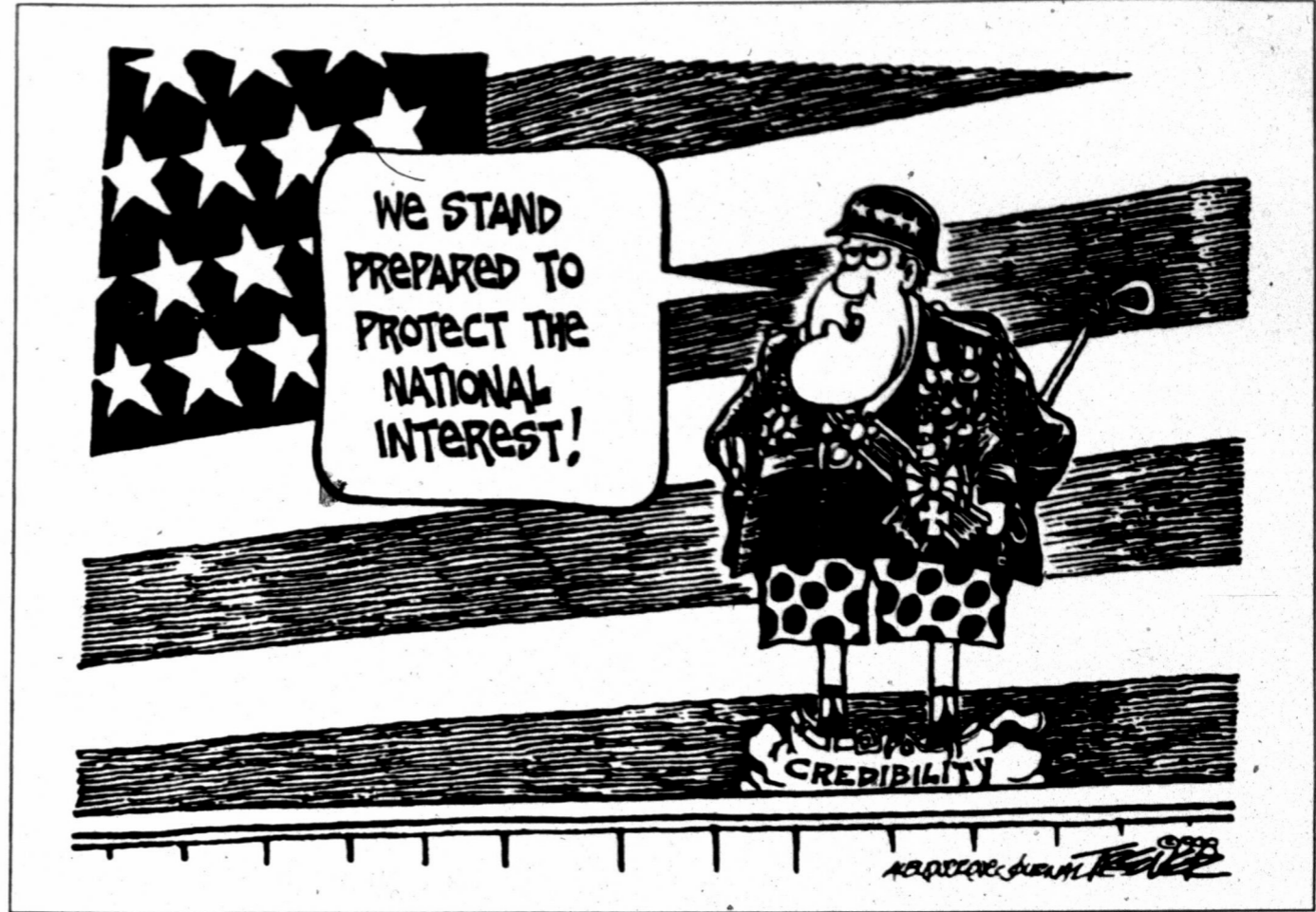

# Postage hike took effect this past weekend

WASHINGTON -- Congress denounced it, four years of record profits preceded it, postal executives planned a \$124,000 retirement party while demanding it, and now postal consumers are paying for it. The most controversial stamp hike in Postal Service history will take effect Sunday, January 10 and the nation's largest coalition of everyday consumers of the Post Office says the process that brought it about screams for more accountability. The increase in first class stamp prices to 33-cents means another billion dollars a year in revenue for the Postal Service, money members of the Coalition to Make Our First Class Mail FIRST CLASS say the agency doesn't need and will almost surely waste. "There is not one good reason advanced by the Postal Service to justify the upcoming billion dollar increase in first class mail rates," said John F. Robinson, president and CEO of the National Minority Business Council (NMBC) which is a member of the coalition. "Combine that with the fact that no one -- not even Congress -- was able to halt this greedy money grab from the captive customers of the

class mail monopoly and you can see why we must have more protection for postal customers in 1999. "The final say on first class mail rates must be taken away from the Postal Service Board of Governors and given to the independent Postal Rate Commission." Robinson pointed out that Congress -- outraged by Postal Service shenanigans - voted 393-12 to demand no first class rate hike. Even that didn't deter the Postal Service Board of Governors who voted to approve the increase anyway. While the controversy raged, postal executives were busy throwing a retirement party for outgoing Postmaster General Marvin Runyon. The tony affair included a three-course dinner, live music, and a beautiful location inside the elegantly restored Union Station. The final bill was more than \$124,000. All paid for by the same postal customers who these executives claimed must save the Postal Service from a crushing debt. Robinson said the retirement party is just the latest example of Postal Service mispending money. Others include:

- Millions of dollars spent on feel-good advertising for the first class mail monopoly.
- Sponsoring a bike team in the Tour de France with its largely European audience.
- Losing almost \$85 million on starting up new non-delivery related products that largely compete with private business and do nothing to help get the mail delivered on time.
- 1998 year-end bonuses to 900 postal executives that averaged \$10,400 each despite ongoing serious

delivery problems. "The Postal Service is clearly an agency that is out of control, and Congress has the power to rein it in," said Robinson. "It would be great if consumers would use their first 33-cent stamp to send a letter to their congressional representative demanding more control over postal rates." # State Park to offer hunter safety course

QUANAH -- In response to a continuing public demand, Copper Breaks State Park will offer the state-approved hunter safety course on Saturday, January 16, 1999, and Sunday, January 17, 1999, according to Fred Woermell, lead ranger at the park. The first part of the 12-hour course is required by law for all hunters born after Sept. 2, 1971. Proof of course completion must accompany hunting licenses. Enrollment is limited, with participation by reservation only. Participants must be 12 years old to receive

certification. Younger hunters may attend the course if accompanied by an adult, but they cannot be certified. A non-refundable advance payment of \$10 per person is required for reservation in the course. Park admission, normally \$2 per person will be waived for class participants. Hunting licenses are also available at the park during regular office hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. ## Local sales tax rebates increase for November

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander today delivered her first sales tax rebates, kicking off 1999 with a total of \$163.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,096 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 5.1 percent increase over the \$155.7 million allocated to cities and counties in January 1998.

Communities in Donley County followed the state trend with Clarendon, Hedley, and Howardwick all posting gains.

"I am delighted to begin serving in the office of Comptroller as the State of Texas begins another promising year," Comptroller Rylander said.

"Sales tax rebates to cities and counties are 5.1 percent higher this January than those for the first month of last year, as consumer continue to show their confidence in the growing Texas economy."

Clarendon's tax rebate increased 19.52 percent for a total of \$13,887.52. Hedley's rebate of \$436.41 was an increase of 196.37 percent, and Howardwick rose more than 43 percent for a total of \$896.73.

January's payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers in November, at the start of the traditional holiday shopping season, and reported to the Comptroller in December.

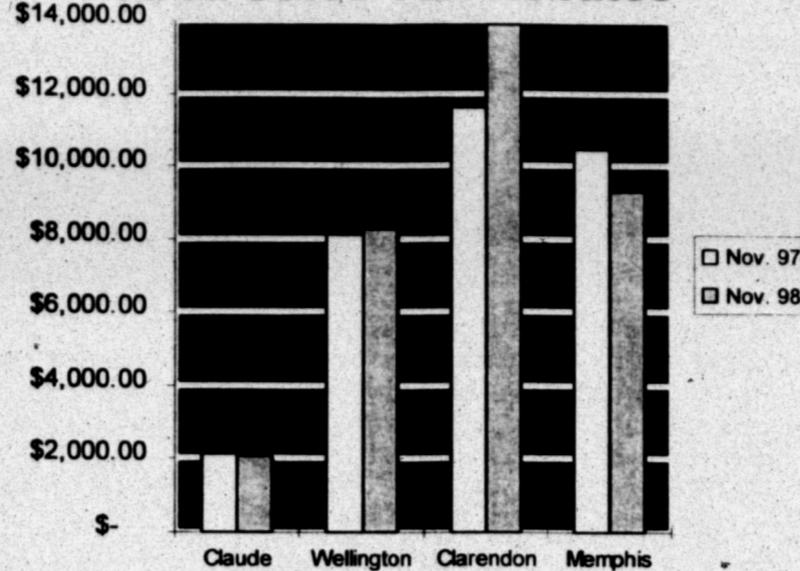

The JV will play a home on Monday night, January 18, following the 8th grade game.

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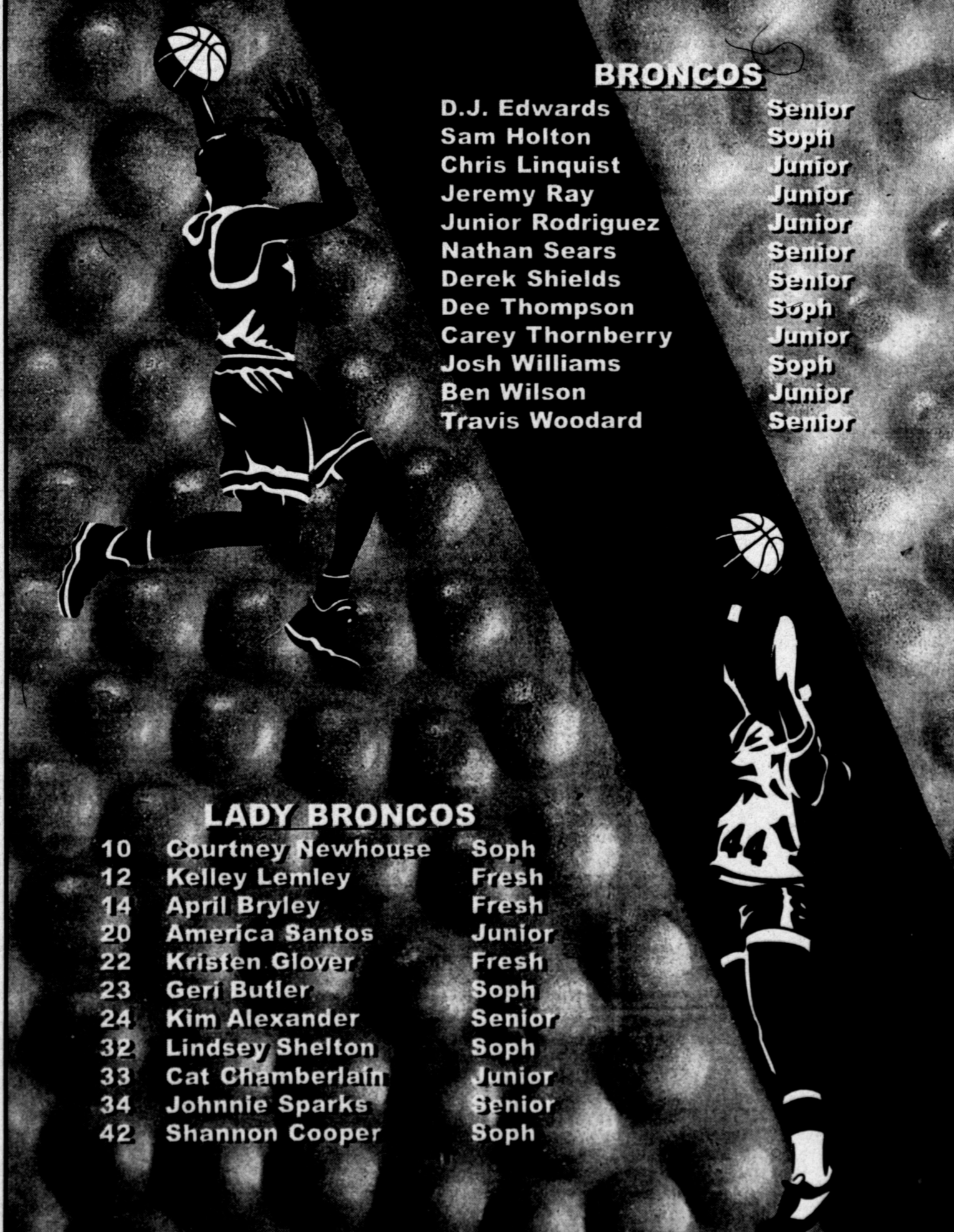

## Clarendon native has second book published

Red River Press of Burkburnett announces the publication of *Comanche Love*, a sequel to *Two Feathers*. The author, Eunice Johnson Halbert, was born in Clarendon in 1913.

The new book continues to examine what could have taken place in Cynthia Ann Parker's life from the time of her abduction at the age of nine until she became a young woman.

Although it is a work of fiction and written specifically for young readers, *Comanche Love* adheres as much as possible to the historical facts. It embodies elements of pathos, sparkles of wit and humor, and apt but not burdensome bits of description. Needless to say, there are accounts of angry,

frightening events, times of grief and anxiety, but there also are occasions of laughter and nostalgia.

Mrs. Halbert's parents were Carrie and David Johnson. After teaching in the Windy Valley and Chamberlain schools, she graduated from the University of Texas in 1936.

After her marriage to Grady Halbert she moved to Foard County. When her husband retired from ranching and farming, they moved to Crowell where they now live.

Halbert's first book, *Two Feathers*, proved to be well received and she was encouraged to write the sequel, *Comanche Love*.

Although she did not begin her writing career

until she was 83, she has an excellent rapport with young people. Perhaps she is able to speak their language because she is still young at heart, collects dolls and teddy bears and is a regular reporter for her study club and for the Friends of the Library.

Occasionally Halbert tries her hand at poetry and in this novella she opens with a poem and closes with a soliloquy, both in blank verse. She told her publisher that she wrote them both within a few hours, listening in her mind to the drum beat of Longfellow's "Hiawatha" as the words came to her. In publishing language, this sequel, too, is a "good little read."

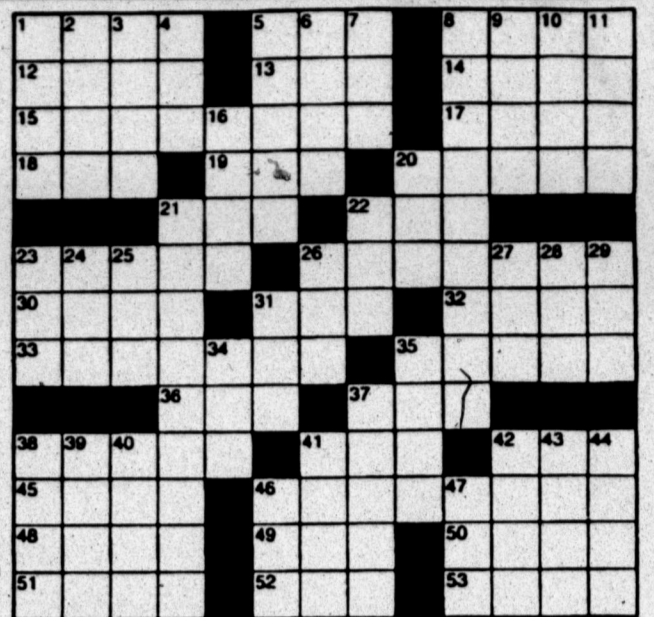

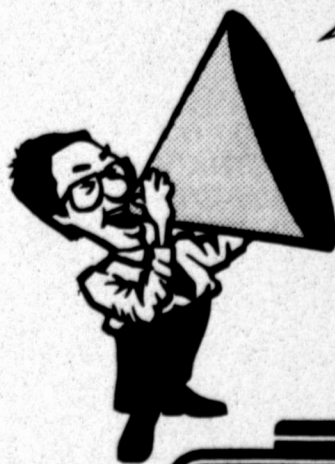
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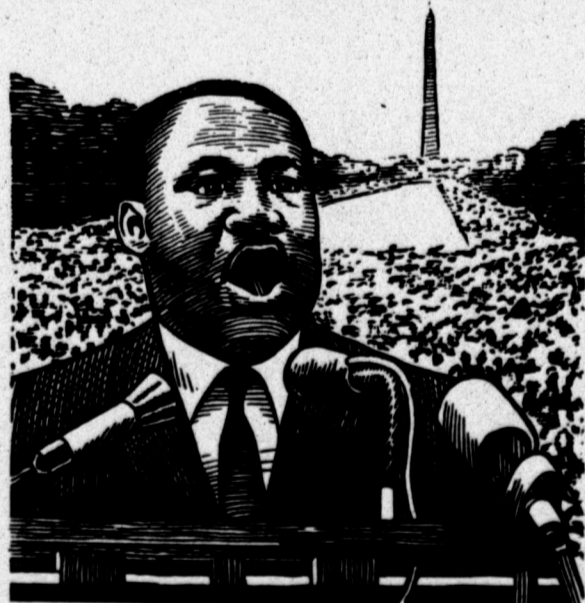
