Lady Broncos to open district play Friday night

The Lady Broncos played a round-robin style tournament in the Salt Fork Classic last weekend. Clarendon, Allison, Wellington, Spearman, and White Deer all participated in the tournament.

The Lady Broncos most taxing day was on Thursday as they face two opponents on the same day. Clarendon drew Allison for their morning game.

The game was close from beginning to end. The Lady Broncos only led by one at the half. Clarendon came out in the third quarter fired up and outscored Allison, 16-8. Allison surged in the fourth quarter, but it was not enough as the Lady Broncos went on to win, 45-40.

Scoring for Clarendon were Geri Butler, 19; Kelley Lemley, 11; Cat Chamberlain, 5; Kim Alexander, 4; Lindsey Shelton, 4; and Johnnie Sparks, 2.

The Lady Broncos played a rough White Deer team in their evening matchup. The game was ugly from the very start. Fouls and missed free throws plagued both teams. Clarendon had a great third quarter scoring 22 points to pull

away from the Does. The Lady Broncos went on to beat the district opponent, 56-44.

Scoring for the Lady Broncos were Geri Butler, 20; Lindsey Shelton, 9; April Bryley, 7; Kim Alexander, 7; Cat Chamberlain, 5; Kelley Lemley, 4; Shannon Cooper, 3; and Johnnie Sparks, 2.

Friday's game pitted the Lady Broncos against another district rival, the Lady Skyrockets from Wellington. Clarendon seemed a little weary from their Thursday matchups but put up a good fight against Wellington. The Lady Broncos led at the half by one and overcame a deficit in the fourth quarter to force overtime. But the Lady Skyrockets were too much for Clarendon in the OT. Wellington won the game, 42-53.

Lady Broncos scorers were Geri Butler, 20; Kelley Lemley, 8; Kim Alexander, 8; Cat Chamberlain, 4; and Courtney Newhouse, 2.

Clarendon's Saturday afternoon game against Spearman was a great one. The Lynettes had the Lady Broncos down four at the end of the third quarter, but the Lady Bron-

cos kept their cool and came up with one of their best quarters this season. The Lady Broncos' pressure defense frustrated Spearman and caused them to turn the ball over several times. Clarendon also got the hot hand and outscored Spearman 20-10 in the fourth as they went on to their 55-49 victory.

Scoring for the Lady Broncos were Kelley Lemley, 18; Geri Butler, 16; April Bryley, 9; Kim Alexander, 5; Cat Chamberlain, 5; and Lindsey Shelton, 2.

Geri Butler of Clarendon was named to the All-Tournament team following the game. Other All-Tournament team members were Jaicee Herren, Allison; Brook Lesley, Spearman; Jenn Schnell, Spearman; and Tiffany Williams, Wellington.

"We went 3-1 in the tournament and all four games brought about some good learning situations for us. Playing four games in three days was also very good for us physically after a week off. It was very nice to have 10 players suited up and playing hard after the injuries we've had earlier this season," said Head Coach Steve

Schmidt.

"Our best game, by far, was Saturday afternoon's matchup with Spearman. It was a well played hard fought game from start to finish. Our girls showed their fire, intensity, poise, and execution we've been wanting all season."

"This was a round-robin tournament, so the best record wins. Three of the teams, Clarendon, Wellington, and Spearman, went 3-1. The plaques were awarded according to the total score of each team's four opponents. Spearman ended up first, Wellington second, and we were third," said Schmidt.

"We start the district off Friday against a very physical White Deer team. We will take no one lightly in district play. We know we're capable of beating everyone or getting beat by everyone. We'll have to play well."

The Lady Broncos play White Deer at home this Friday evening, January 8. Game time is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Clarendon will travel to Wellington for their second district game on Tuesday, January 12, at 6:30 p.m.

Broncos warm up for District in tournament

The Clarendon Broncos came back early from Christmas break to play in the Salt Fork Classic hosted by Clarendon College last weekend.

The Broncos faced some good opponents in each of their games.

Clarendon was matched up with Allison in the first round on Thursday. The Broncos busted out of the gate early outscoring Allison 18-8 in the first quarter.

Senior Travis Woodard set the pace for the Broncos by scoring 11 of his 13 points in the first half.

Allison made a small comeback in the third quarter but could not capture the lead. The Broncos went on to win the game, 51-42.

Scoring for Clarendon were Sam Holton, 14; Travis Woodard, 13; Chris Linquist, 8; Ben Wilson, 7; Nathan Sears, 4; Jeremy Ray, 3; and Carey Thornberry, 2.

The Broncos faced district opponent Wellington in the winner's bracket. The ballgame started out as a defensive battle with neither team scoring much. The Broncos went into half time with a 22-15 lead.

Clarendon continued to keep the lead through the third quarter but could not get hot shooting. The Skyrockets, outscored the Broncos in the second half by 13 and went on to win the game, 40-46.

The Broncos played the Spearman Lynx in the third place game on Saturday afternoon. The physical Lynx team came out strong against the Broncos never letting Clarendon into the game. The Broncos' cold shooting and foul trouble led to their 44-63 loss to Spearman.

Texas Cattle Feeders issues 1999 industry outlook

While fed cattle prices should trend higher in 1999, the meat complex will still stagger under the weight of burdensome supplies, which will limit the upside potential in the market. With that analysis, Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA) Market Director Jim Gill said the outlook for 1999 is a mixed bag, with a few bright spots to provide encouragement to cattle feeders.

One of those bright spots will be a drop in beef supplies.

"Beef production in 1999 will be near 24.4 billion pounds, 5 percent below the 25.6 billion pounds this year," Gill said during the annual TCFA Year End News Conference held recently. "This will be the first year to show a decrease in beef production since 1993 and will put annual consumption near 64 lbs. on a retail weight basis."

Leading the drop in beef production will be decrease in carcass weights, Gill predicted.

"Average carcass weights are expected to be lower than the record 724 lbs. in 1998, dropping to a more normal 700 to 705 lbs."

However, cattle feeders will still have to deal

with burdensome pork and poultry supplies, which will keep a lid on the upside potential in fed cattle prices.

"Pork production in 1999 is expected to be near 19 billion pounds, a one percent increase from the 1998 record of 18.8 billion pounds. Poultry production next year is expected to increase another two percent to 34.6 billion pounds, compared with 33.8 billion pounds in 1998."

While those figures are concerning to cattlemen, consumers will continue to enjoy steady retail beef prices and an abundant selection of meat protein at the grocery store. Retail beef prices averaged around \$2.76 per pound, Gill said.

"With the anticipated drop in beef production in 1999, retail prices may edge higher, but competition from record pork and poultry supplies will temper any price increase," Gill predicted. He anticipates average retail beef prices will increase slightly in 1999, settling around the 1997 average of \$2.80 per pound.

On the input side, grain production in 1999 is expected to be near 9.3 billion bushels, given

normal weather. That's down from the estimated 9.8 billion bushels harvested this year, Gill said.

"Exports will pay a typically crucial role in prices and the instability in the Far East and Pacific Rim markets will likely have a major impact on final prices to feedyards."

The downward trend in feeder cattle supplies will continue, with numbers tightening over the next several years.

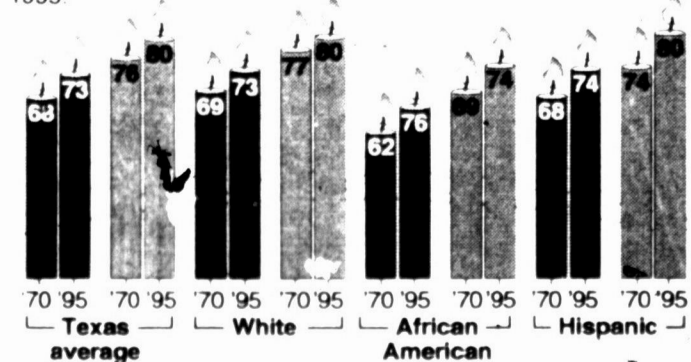
"This reflects the continued cow and heifer liquidation in 1996, 1997, and 1998, Gill said. "Prices, which averaged near \$76 per cwt. in 1998, will likely remain steady during 1999, provided the fed cattle market moves higher next year."

And, in spite of the challenges ahead, Gill expects that cattle feeders will see a slightly better market in 1999. His price outlook for the first quarter has fed cattle prices ranging from \$55 to \$63 cwt. In the second quarter, some strength returns to the market, with prices anticipated to range from \$63 to \$70. Third quarter prices are projected to remain relatively steady at \$64 to \$69, and fourth quarter prices should range from \$63 to \$68 cwt.

Teachers complained that the testing is stressful on the children and that changes are made with no apparent reason. Chisum said he would carry their concerns to Education Commissioner Mike Moses.

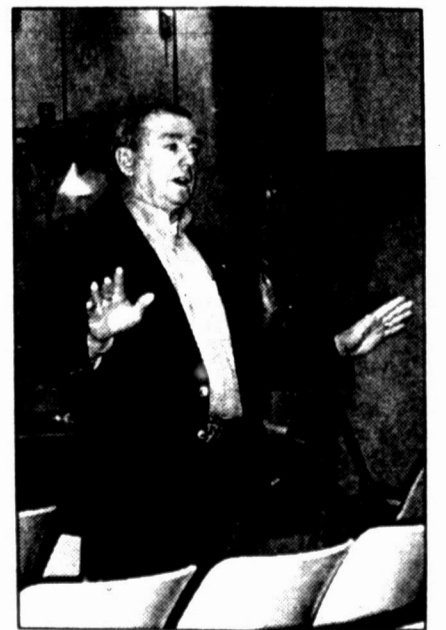
Chisum also said a state study group is looking into health care for all public school teachers. This health

Baylor research improving treatments for severe brain injury

HOUSTON - Research on the brain's blood flow might lead to improved recovery from severe head trauma.

"Traumatic injuries are the leading cause of death in persons ages 1 to 45," said Dr. Claudia Robertson, program director for the study at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine and Ben Taub General Hospital. "In more than half of these deaths, head injury is the leading factor."

Each year, nearly 2 million Americans require medical attention for a brain injury. Of those injured, nearly 74,000 will have a long-term disability, and another 75,000 will die.

Through a study funded by the National Institutes of Health, a diverse team of researchers is looking for new treatments to improve the long-term outcome of head-injury patients.

"One of the problems with severe head injury is that the blood flow to the brain is lower than it should be," Robertson said. "Blood flow supplies the nutrients the brain needs to sur-

vive."

This reduced blood flow can cause additional damage to the already injured brain.

As part of the five-year study, researchers will use a new technique to identify patients at greatest risk of additional brain injury. The technique, transcranial Doppler, uses an ultrasound of the brain's major blood vessels to reveal decreased blood flow.

"Patients with impaired flow will be given standard treatments to increase their blood pressure," said Dr. Alex Valadka, a Baylor neurosurgeon involved in the study. "Although increasing the blood pressure can reduce additional brain injury, it causes an increased risk of lung problems. The Doppler will help us determine who can benefit most from increased blood

pressure treatments."

A second part of the study involves the use of an amino acid, L-arginine, to improve blood flow.

"L-arginine is normally present in the body and metabolizes into nitric oxide, which dilates blood vessels and regulates blood flow," Robertson said. "Some of the patients identified with impaired blood flow will also be given this treatment."

Over five years, the group will test the new techniques on 300 patients. Patients will be evaluated at one, three, and six months after injury to assess their long-term outcome.

"The loss of productive years of life due to head injury is devastating. Through research, we hope to improve recovery and decrease disability due to head injury," Robertson said.

Local tax rebates buck statewide trend

AUSTIN - State Comptroller John Sharp delivered his final sales tax rebates for 1998 recently, a total of \$176,396,918 in monthly sales tax payments to 1,095 Texas cities and 118 counties, a seven percent increase over the \$1.64 billion allocated for the same period in 1997.

Local rebates bucked the state

trend unfortunately. Clarendon's rebate fell 9.05 percent to \$11,779,80, and Howardwick dropped 3 percent for a total of \$1,092,49. Hedley was down 31.41 percent to \$159,41.

December's payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on October sales and reported to the Comptroller in November.

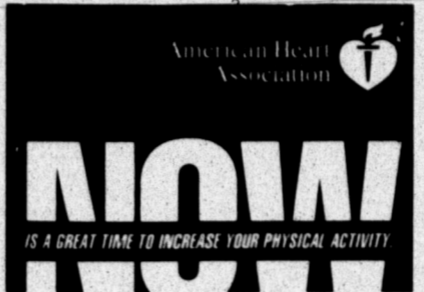

New license plate becomes Texas' top-selling specialty plate

AUSTIN — Texans love this state. And, they show their pride every chance they get. According to figures from the Texas Department of Transportation, the "State of the Arts" license plate has surpassed the standard personalized license plate as Texas' fastest selling specialty plate.

The Texas Commission on the Arts (TCA), which developed the State of the Arts plate as a means of raising money to promote the Texas Cultural Endowment Fund, sold on average 456 plates per month from December 1997 through October 1998. Texans purchased on average 299 personalized plates over the same period. TCA has sold more than

13,800 plates since the State of the Arts plate was introduced in 1995.

You have probably seen the plate. It resembles the Texas state flag with a white star embedded in a blue background, the word "Texas" and the five-character license plate number in the white stripe, and "State of the Arts" written across the bottom in the red stripe.

"Although the plate was developed to help support the arts and culture of Texas, we realize that many of the purchases are made because of the plate design itself," said Gaye Greever McElwain, TCA's administrator of marketing. "Texas is a state filled with extremely proud citizens, and any-



thing that symbolizes our pride — in this case, a license plate that resembles the Texas flag — is highly popular."

"We couldn't be more pleased with the number of Texans interested in the plate," said John Paul Batiste, TCA's executive director. "Our job is to encourage all Texans and visitors to experience what our state has to offer in terms of art and culture, and our license plate program has provided a highly successful financial mechanism to continue our efforts."

The State of the Arts specialty plates are available for \$25 each (\$20 goes to promote the Texas Cultural Endowment Fund and \$5 reimburses the Texas Department of Transportation's cost to produce the plate). For an additional \$40, Texans may personalize the specialty plates

using up to five characters.

TCA was organized in 1965 by the Texas Legislature to develop a receptive climate for the arts in Texas. TCA provides funding and other supportive measures, such as arts education and cultural tourism program, for a variety of arts-related activities, including visual and literary arts, film, and multi-media, music, dance, and theater.
