MEDAL OF HONOR AWARDS FOR HEROISM IN KOREA

In the first 10 months of the fighting in Korea 14 men were cited for the Medal of Honor and at this time several others in the Army, Navy, Marines and Air Force have been recommended but the awards have not been published. In an adjoining column are the names of all those thus far presented. At ceremonies in the Pentagon an award was made posthumously to Cpl. Mitchell Red Cloud, Jr., an American Indian from Friendship, Wis., the Medal being accepted by Mrs. Nellie Red Cloud, the hero's mother. He lost his life while serving in the Infantry. In World War II he was a mem ber of the Carlson Raiders in the Marines.





LT. HUDNER

Lt. (j.g.) Thomas J. Hudner, of Fall River, Mass., is the Navy's first winner of the Medal of Honor for action in Korea. Lt. Hudner, a pilot attached to the USS Leyte, risked his life in an attempt to rescue a fellow airman, Ensign Jesse Leroy Brown, first Negro officer to lose his life in any United States war.

Ensign Brown was also the first Negro Naval aviator. His home was in Hattiesburg, Miss., where his widow and small child reside.

Lt. Hudner was graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy in 1946. He is unmarried. His parents reside in Fall River. His previous decorations include the Air Medal and a Gold Star in lieu of the second Air Medal.

According to the agronomists of the Texas A&M College System and Soil Conservation Service, legumes, when properly fertilized and inoculated, have very beneficial effects upon the soils where they are grown. One of the most important effects is the influence legumes have on improving soil structure or condition. The soil structure should be crumbly or granular so as to allow for deep root and water penetration and air circulation within the soil. 

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
