## Beta Sigma Phi Chapter To Sponsor Blood Typing

Mu Gamma Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi is sponsoring a Blood Typing Program in Clarendon for two days on August 22nd and 23rd and at Hedley for one day on August 27th. The equipment will be at Estlack Machinery Co. in Clarendon and at the Lions Club Den in Hedley from 5:30 to 8:30 each day.

A member of the Chapter stated: "This is not a Blood Donation Bank. We are asking only that you have your blood typed. This project will be beneficial not only to each of us as an individual, but will be a benefit to the whole county. Each man, woman and child is urged to take advantage of this free service at the same time you come in for your free Chest X-ray which is being brought here by the state. It will take only a few more minutes of your time to get your blood typed. You may have the X-ray taken without being obligated to have your blood typed, but we hope you will want to take advantage of both."

In case of accident or illness it could be of great importance to know your blood type. A card file will be kept on each individual with their name, type of blood and address. A card, pocket size, will also be sent to each individual with the same information on it. Plan now to visit either in Clarendon or Hedley and be sure to bring your children.

## Services Held Sunday For R. O. Reynolds

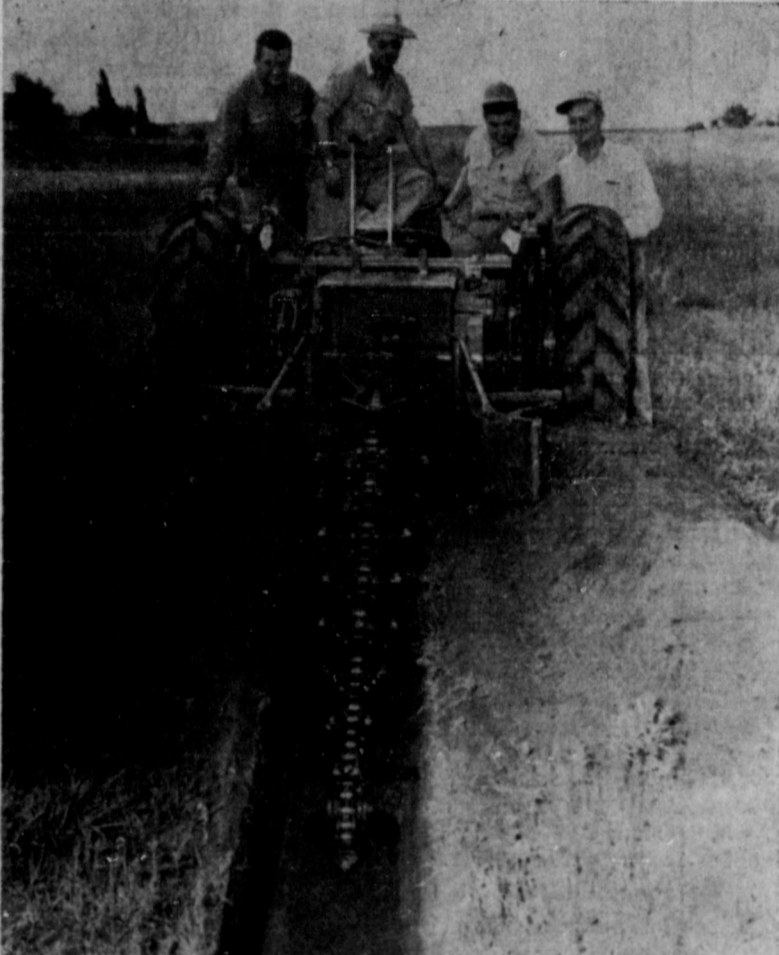
Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the First Baptist Church for Robert Oliver Reynolds with Rev. Ernest Phillips officiating.

The Blackhawk Trench Hog ditcher was purchased recently by the City Commission from Palmer Implement Co. and mounted on the Ford Tractor already owned by the city. The ditcher can dig a trench up to 5 1/2 feet deep and 24 inches wide. It can dig a 260 foot ditch 14 inches wide, 4 feet deep in one hour's time. This new machine will save considerable time and money in replacing pipes and digging extensions as called for in the recent bond election.

## Candidates To Receive Degrees At West Texas State

A total of 218 candidates expect to receive degrees at the close of the summer session at West Texas State College, Canyon. Commencement exercises are scheduled for August 22 at 8 p. m. in Buffalo Stadium.

The largest number have applied for the master of education degree, 59 for the bachelor of science, three for the bachelor of business administration degree, 1 for the bachelor of music education, 6 for the bachelor of arts, 2 for the master of business administration and 16 for the master of arts. Of the 218 candidates, 149 are earning the advanced Master degree.

Among those from this area who will receive their degrees are Chloe Darden and Velma G. Brown of Clarendon and Zella Noble of Hedley, candidates for the Master of Education. Wanda Lea Shaw of Hedley is a candidate for the Bachelor of Science degree. Zoy Fronabarger Risinger, a former Clarendon resident and who now lives at Bula, Texas, is seeking the Bachelor of Arts degree.

General Perrine is a former Clarendon resident and his wife is the former Nancy Cole, daughter of Mrs. A. T. Cole of Clarendon. It was reported here that Gen. Perrine has the bulbar type of Polio.

## FARM NEWS From the County PMA Committee

### KEEPING PASTURES GREEN IN SUMMER

Improved pastures show some of their good points during the dry, hot months of July and August. These are, therefore, good months to look at pasture to see how much grazing they appear to be producing.

Experiments of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in renovating old permanent pastures at the national research laboratory at Beltsville showed that improved pastures can be pastured earlier in the spring, produce more during the dry, hot months of summer, and then can be pastured again to a later date in the fall. In the period from July 15 on, these renovated pastures at Beltsville produced 45 per cent more than those which had not been renovated.

In Donley County, pasture improvement has been one of the practices in the Agricultural Conservation Program for several years. Farmers generally have found that improved pastures produce more than unimproved ones during the summer. The improved pastures are greener and grow more vigorously. They can be identified quickly by anyone looking for them.

### DEEP PLOWING

Most wheat farmers are through harvesting wheat in Donley County. If there should be any one of those farmers who would like some Deep Plowing at this time, please come by the PMA Office.

The largest vote in recent years was cast in the First Primary Election here in Donley County last Saturday. The total vote was in excess of 2,000 as the top total vote for any one candidate was 2,005. This honor went to Mrs. A. G. Lane who was re-elected County Treasurer. Walker Lane followed next with a total of 2,004 votes.

The local race which drew the most interest was the Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector race between Guy Wright and Truett Behrens. Behrens lacked only a few votes carrying a two to one margin over Wright and will be Donley County's next Sheriff. Three other races which carried lots of interest were not settled as there will be a run-off in each instance. Jack E. Gray and J. N. Weaver were the two top candidates in the Judge's race; Edd Mooring and J. R. Bulls were the top two out of five candidates in the Precinct 2 commissioner race and Hubert Rhoades and W. H. McDonald were the top men out of four for commissioner of Precinct No. 1. In the other two contested county races, F. M. Murray Precinct 4 commissioner was re-elected and R. C. Hill unseated C. Huffman in the Constable of Precinct 2 race.

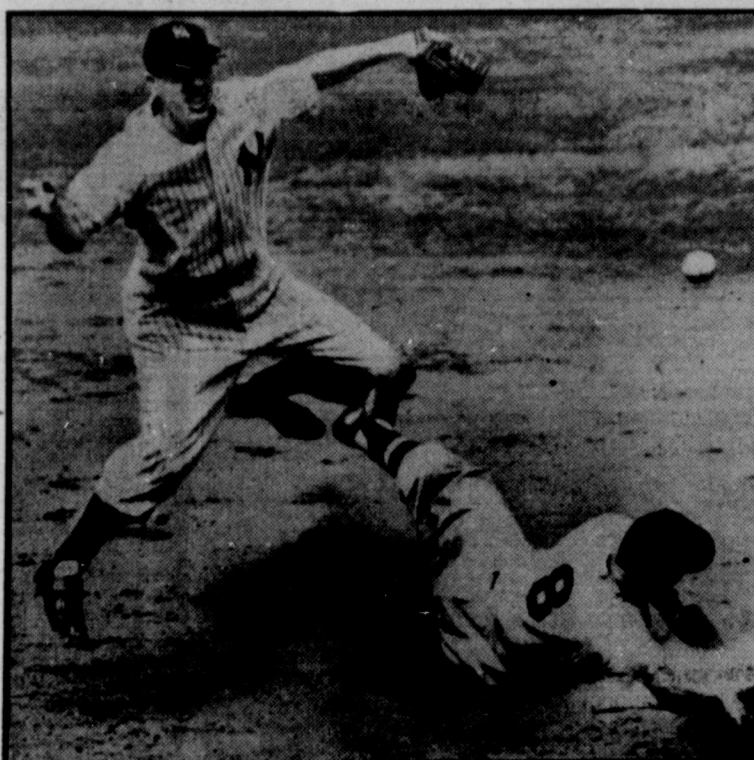

Planting a winter cover crop is one of the best ways to keep your soil at home during the blowing season next spring. Cover crops are especially important on sandy land in clean tilled crops such as cotton. A large part of the cotton will no doubt be harvested mechanically this year leaving very little residues on the surface to hold the soil. Seeding cover crops is a "must" on thousands of acres of land too

sandy for chiseling or other types of emergency tillage to be effective for wind erosion control. Rye is one of the most dependable cover crops for sandy land. Winter legumes such as austrian winter peas and hairy vetch are more valuable for soil building; however more favorable weather conditions are usually necessary for them than for rye. Probably the best plan is to use a mixture of wheat or rye with austrian winter peas or hairy vetch. With adverse weather, the small grain will likely make a cover. With favorable weather the winter legumes will make good growth also.

Some of the benefits of winter cover crops are as follows:  
1. Adds nitrogen to soil.  
2. Increase ability of soil to absorb and hold moisture.  
3. Offers protection to the soil

against wind and water erosion.  
4. Aids in breaking plow pan.  
5. Adds organic residues.  
6. Aids in preventing crusting.  
7. Helps to make better use of commercial fertilizer.  
Planting date for winter cover crops is August 15 to October 15. Early planting is usually better in order for plants to make a good growth before cold weather. All legumes should be inoculated before planting. Most soils in the District are low in phosphorus and the equivalent of 200 lbs. of 20% superphosphate is recommended for best results. Your District has two grain drills and two row seeders to rent

for seeding winter cover crops.

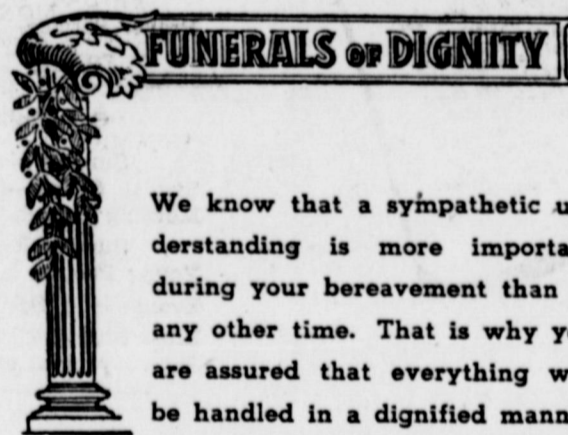

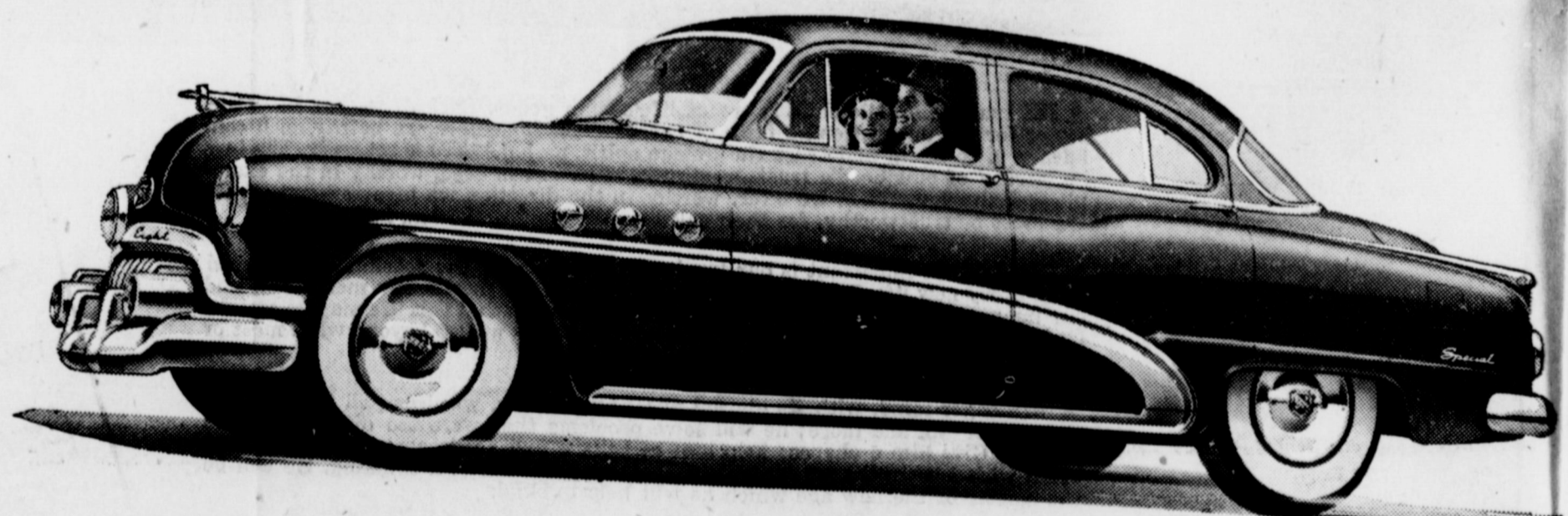

575,000 4-H'ers Get Training to Cut Farm Accident Toll



Farm safety surveys made by 4-H'ers show that matches within reach of small children and stairways littered with toys, jars and other articles were much in evidence as fire and accident hazards in rural homes.

Chicago—(Special)—More than 575,000 4-H Club boys and girls throughout the nation are receiving training in farm accident and fire prevention this year. The outstanding feature of this training in the National 4-H Farm and Home Safety program is to check and remove from farms and homes any conditions likely to cause fire, accidents or injuries. These 4-H surveys are acclaimed a valuable contribution to the nation-wide campaign to reduce the annual toll of 15,000 farm people dying and 1,300,000 being injured as a result of rural accidents each year.

Here is a report, made by a 4-H girl on behalf of her local club, after making a safety survey of every home in the community: "In all homes having stairways that we visited, the stairs were full of toys, jars, tools and other articles," she stated. "In many homes people used kerosene to build fires. They also had oily cloths and papers stored close to the stove and flue. Matches and unlabeled bottles of poisonous

liquids were within reach of small children.

"On several farms visited, boards with rusty nails pointing upward were much in evidence. In our local schoolhouse, the ceiling plaster in the classroom was loose. If it fell it would cause severe injuries to the pupils."

"After we had made our survey, we called a community meeting. Attention was called to the hazards we had found. Immediately following the meeting everyone present began work necessary to make our community a safe one. Every hazard we had found was corrected."

Medals of honor are presented to five county winners having the best 4-H records in safety work, and a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago is awarded to the State champion. Eight of the latter will be selected as national winners, who will each receive a \$300 college scholarship. Awards are provided by General Motors for the eighth consecutive year. The program is conducted under the direction of the Co-operative Extension Service.

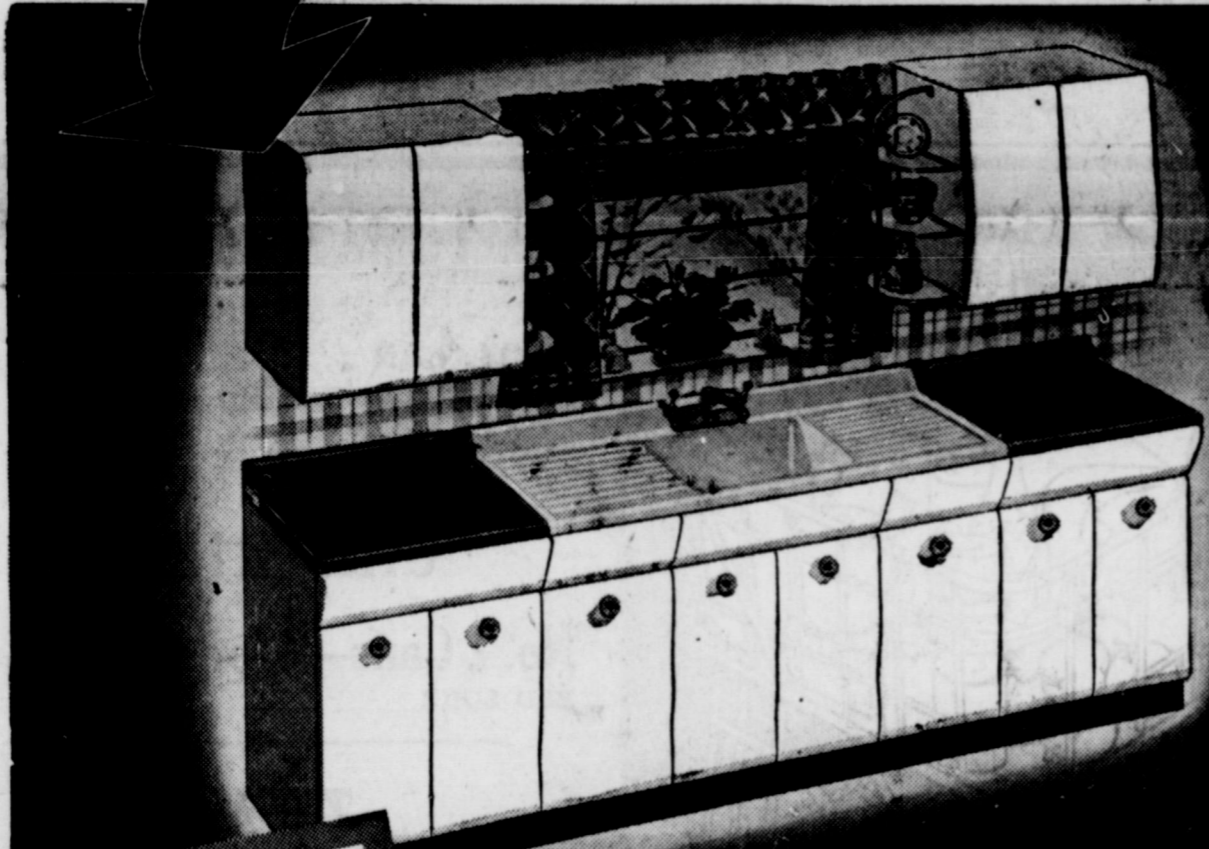

**State Constitutional Amendments**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 35** providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 60a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation thereon.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 60a which shall read as follows:  
"Sec. 60a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' used in this Section shall be defined by law."  
Section 2. That the proposed Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:  
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."  
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote blank. If the returns of said election show a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas."  
Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such Amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36** proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:  
"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor."  
Section 2. The proposed Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:  
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."  
Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment blank and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas."  
Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

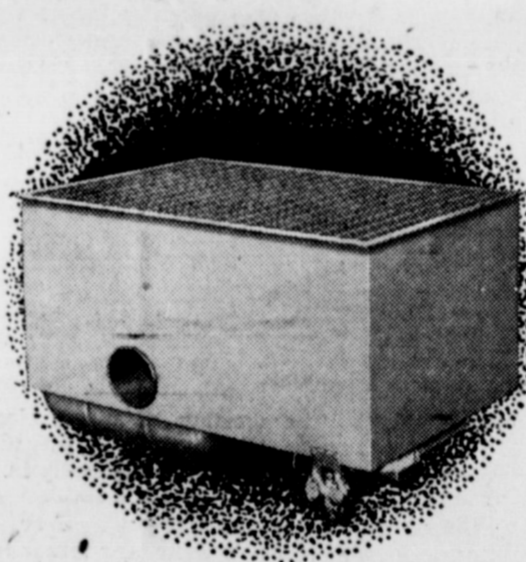

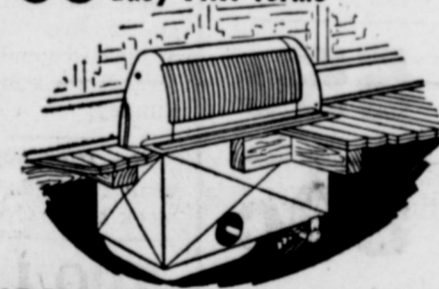
