The Clarendon College Bulldogs swing back into action this week when they meet the McMurry and Wayland College B teams on Friday and Saturday, respectively, this weekend. Both games are away from home. The next home game will be against the McMurry B team on January 21 at 8:00.

The Bulldogs are sporting a 7-3 won-lost record going into the game Friday. They have a point average of 65 points per game in pre-Christmas competition, while the opponents have averaged 61 points per game.

High point man for Clarendon in ten games preceding the holidays is Jerry English, who has poured in 169 points for a per game average of 16.9. Close behind is Don Dorman, freshman from Samnorwood, with 130 points and a 13 point average. L. A. Sartain Resigns Pastorate Here

Rev. L. A. Sartain, who has been pastor of the local First Baptist Church for the past four and one-half years, has resigned to accept the pastorate of the First Baptist Church at Sundown, Texas near Lubbock. It is with regret that his many friends see him go, but at the same time they wish him and his family the greatest happiness and God's rich blessings in his new field.

During the four and one-half years that Rev. Sartain was pastor here, the Lord was good in many ways. One hundred and thirty-seven people were baptized during this time and 257 others were added by letter and statement. There has been an average of 236 in Sunday School and 100 in Training Union for the four and one-half years. The best of these years has been 1951 with an average of 252 in Sunday School and 120 in Training Union. "We give all the glory to the Lord as we humbly thank Him for a small part in these blessings," Rev. Sartain stated.

In leaving, Rev. Sartain had this to say to his former members: "It is our prayer that the Lord shall bless and lead you as you call a pastor and that you will give him your loyal support in everything he suggests. May God's richest blessings be on each of you personally as you continue to serve Him. When you are down toward Sundown, come by to see us."

FARM NEWS From the County PMA Committee

APPLICATIONS FOR PAYMENT

The applications for payment are ready for your signature. Let us remind you again that if you carried out a 1951 practice to come by at your earliest convenience and sign up.

INTENTION SHEET FOR 1952

If you intend to carry out any one of the 13 practices approved for Donley County for 1952, you must file an intention sheet in the office. These forms were mailed to each producer in the county. If you have lost or destroyed your copy of the form there are some extra copies in the office. Remember that this form must be on file in the county office before an approval can be issued to you.

WHAT DOES YOUR SOIL INVENTORY SHOW?

At the beginning of the new year, it is a good time to take stock of our land as well as our other farm assets and liabilities, believes Mr. James B. Smith, chairman of the Donley County PMA Committee. "It's time to check up on our balance in the soil bank as well as our balance in the bank that handles our checking account," he says.

He recalls the seemingly thoughtless way that millions of acres have been wasted by depletion since the country was first settled. Westward expansion took care of population increases in both the United States and Europe for the past 300 years. Today further expansion is both limited and costly, and farmers are faced with the challenge of stepping up the production on the acres they now farm, to provide the extra food and fiber for an ever increasing population.

As a start in meeting the challenge, the chairman suggests that every farmer take an inventory of his farm to determine what he should do to check the soil losses and to build up fertility that he may contribute his share to see that production will provide food for our increasing population. Specifically he urges each Donley county farmer to:

1. Check carefully any conservation plans that have been prepared for his farm with the help of the Soil Conservation Service, Farmers' Home Administration, Extension Service, or other agency.

2. Go over his farm thoroughly for signs for soil deterioration such as sheet erosion, gullies, inroads of weeds, reduced yields and so on, and then work out a year-by-year program of conservation operations to take care of the most needed job first while at the same time contributing to current needed production.

3. Enlist the services of the PMA and other U. S. Department of Agriculture Agencies to help in getting the job underway in 1952, building on the conservation operations already started.

"Conservation" as used in connection with Agricultural Conservation Program is more than just "saving the soil" for some future time. It is using the soil to produce what is needed now and at the same time assuring continued abundant production from these same acres in the future.

To date only 870 poll tax receipts have been issued and seven exemptions. This is only about half of the average for Donley County. Those over 60 do not have to have exemptions but those just coming of voting age must secure their exemptions at the tax office. Herefords — Two Classes of both heavy and lights, with four placings in each class of \$25.00, \$15.00, \$10.00 and \$5.00.

Group of three fed by one boy — \$25.00.

Grand champion steer, \$25.00. Reserve champion steer, \$15.00.

Breedlove secretary and manager of the show says that the show will be held at the fair ground buildings in Clarendon and next week all livestock will be prepared for the showing on the following week. SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Many employed wage earners over 75 years of age have applied for old-age and survivors insurance benefit payments, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office.

While Sanderson is greatly surprised at the comparatively large number of insured persons in this age group, his office has no way of knowing the total number. The reason for this lack of information is that many insured workers who have passed their seventy-fifth birthday have not applied for benefit payments.

"They do not yet realize that they and their dependents can now qualify for these monthly payments," he says.

Under the amended law, a worker over 75 years of age may engage in any kind of employment or self-employment and have benefit payments regardless of the amount of his earnings.

Between the ages of 65 and 75, the insured person may now have \$50 a month in work covered by social security.

Sanderson urges all insured workers aged 75 or older, and who have not yet applied for benefit payments to do so without delay.



March of Dimes Fights Odessa Polio Epidemic

AUSTIN — Community action aided by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is assuring prompt attention to patient needs in Odessa where polio has attacked in epidemic proportions. Lloyd Gregory, state chairman of the March of Dimes, announced today.

Equipment and personnel, supplied by the March of Dimes organization, are converging in Ector County from Denver, Houston, Galveston, San Antonio, Abilene, New York City, and other points as the National Foundation marshals its strength against the sudden, ruthless attack which has caused nine deaths in this West Texas community of 42,000.

Total cases last week had reached 68 as clean-up activities and emergency treatment preparations were taken. Two resident physicians and a teaching nurse were flown in by the National Foundation which has also supplied six tank respirators, six hot pack machines, wool, suction

machines, and other equipment. One iron lung was flown to the city when the Odessa Medical Center first opened its doors to polio.

Locally, the Ector County Chapter of the National Foundation, under the leadership of Fred McKinzie, chairman, and Mrs. T. E. Brandon, women's chairman, is supplying civic, parent-teacher, and other groups with facts about polio—its symptoms and the precautions to help prevent spread of the disease.

Over the State, many NFIP local county chapters were forced to ask hospitals to defer bills for patient care until after the annual March of Dimes in January. National epidemic aid funds near depletion, the state MOD chairman said, and will have to be replenished by the annual campaign. The March of Dimes will have been mortgaged for over \$5,000,000 by chapter commitments for patient care which can not be paid immediately, Gregory stated.

Gregory gave assurance, however, that no patient shall go without needed care because he is unable to pay for it.

Better Breeder Given Summer Chance To Show At Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show

FORT WORTH — George R. Shepherd, superintendent of the carload-and-pen bull division is hopeful that the 1952 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show will be even larger than a year ago which itself marked an

increase of almost 100 per cent in entries over the preceding show.

"For many years, Fort Worth was the unquestioned marketing center for replacement bulls and the carload-and-pen division is a long step toward re-establishing that position," Shepherd said.

"This division is featuring a number of different classes for each breed so that the small breeder may show as well as those with large herds."

In the Hereford division, pens of five and carload lots of 12 or 15 may be shown, either as calves, senior calves or yearlings. Aberdeen-Angus may be shown in pens of three or five as is the case with Shorthorns.

Shepherd declared, "The livestock industry of the Southwest has certainly proved its sincerity in helping to make Fort Worth the replacement bull market by its many purchases and efforts to make the show a success. Those who have purchased bulls here and many new prospective buyers have been contacted throughout the nation, and from the many inquiries received, we are looking forward to a very active bull market during the show."

The carload-and-pen division offers \$6,335 in premiums, of which \$1,167.50 is provided by the American Hereford Association and \$1,000 each by the American Shorthorn Breeders Association and the American Aberdeen-Angus Breeders Association. The Stock Show offers the remainder. Stock Show dates are January 25 through Feb. 3rd.

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Legislative Council To Study Many Texas Problems

The Fifty-first Legislature, recognizing a definite need in this State for an agency to assist the Legislature and its individual members in obtaining accurate and reliable information on spe-

cific legislative problems and matters affecting the general welfare of the State, and to assist the members in drafting proposed legislation, established the Legislative Council.

As most people know, the Legislature meets in regular session every two years and passes bills to meet the problems of the State. The regular sessions of the Legislature usually last about five months.

At the last regular session of the Legislature, ending June 9, 1951, and beginning January 9, 1951, 233 bills, resolutions and constitutional amendments were considered by the Legislature. Approximately 450 bills were actually passed by the Legislature and became the law of this state.

The membership of the Legislature actually feels a need for some method to obtain accurate information in reference to these various bills. It is not difficult to find someone in Austin to advise members of the Legislature on how to vote on a proposed law, but it is difficult to be able to know whether or not the advice that you get is accurate and unbiased.

The Legislative Council is composed of five State Senators, appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, and ten State Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Lieutenant Governor is Chairman of the Legislative Council and the Speaker of the House of Representatives is Vice-Chairman of the Legislative Council. The Council meets during the time the Legislature is not in session and studies problems that are likely to be presented before the next Legislature.

The present Legislative Council was appointed about July 15, 1951. They have a staff of four people with office in Austin, who compile information and assist the Council in the studies made by the Council.

The problems of the State to be studied by the Legislative Council are submitted to the Council by the high officials of the State, members of the Legislature themselves and citizens of the State of Texas. From the list of subjects submitted to the Council, the Council decides which subjects will be investigated.

The Council has a Subject Matter Committee that recommends to the Council what problems will be studied out of those submitted to the Council. The Chairman of the Subject Matter Committee is Rep. Harold M. LaFont, of the 120th District. His committee is composed of five members of the Council.

Twenty-two subjects have been submitted to the Council for study, and they are as follows:

1. Tax Structure of the State;
 2. Urban Local Governmental Units;
 3. State and Local Highway Construction;
 4. Uniform Commercial Code;
 5. State Law Enforcement Agency;
 6. Distribution of Judicial Work;
 7. Juvenile Delinquency Laws;
 8. Texas Constitution;
 9. Study of Reorganization of State Government;
 10. Public Health Laws;
 11. Texas State Library System;
 12. Higher Education;
 13. State Agencies Project;
 14. Texas Southern University;
 15. Housing Facilities for Texas Education Agencies;
 16. Public Utilities Commission;
 17. Teachers' Certification;
 18. Analysis 1950 Census Data;
 19. Procedure of Statutory Revision;
 20. Court Decisions Manifesting Legislative Problems;
 21. Surface Water; and
 22. Study of Gilmer-Aiken Bill.
- From the list of twenty-two subjects, the Subject Matter Committee has recommended six subjects for the Council to begin immediate study upon. They are:
1. Study of the State Tax

Structure to eliminate inequities. 2. Study of Urban Local Governmental Units, to study opportunities for economy through organization of Urban Governmental Units and State and Local Governmental Relationships.

3. The State and Local Highway Construction and Maintenance problems of the State of Texas. 4. The study of the recommended Uniform Commercial Code, to determine whether or not this Code should be adopted and become a part of the Texas law.

5. The study of the law affecting Surface Water. 6. Study of the Gilmer-Aiken Law.

When the Council has completed the study of these six matters, they will begin work on others from the list as recommended by the Subject Matter Committee.

This is the first time the Panhandle of Texas has been represented on the Legislative Council of Texas. Rep. LaFont would like to have the advice and suggestions of the people of this area who are interested in the problems of the State.

Texas Department of Public Safety

AUSTIN—Public Safety Director, Homer Garrison, Jr., reminded Texas motorists today that they will be subject to additional and much more stern penalties if they are convicted of serious traffic law violations when the state's new Motor Vehicle Responsibility Law goes into effect on Jan. 1st.

If an operator's license is suspended or revoked for violating any traffic law carrying that penalty, under the new Safety Responsibility Law the Texas Department of Public Safety must also suspend the registration of all motor vehicles registered in the name of that person, unless he gives proof of future financial responsibility in the amount of \$15,000. The same proof must be furnished and maintained before an operator's license can be reinstated, if it was suspended for violation of a traffic law.

Proof of financial responsibility is also required in the following circumstances:

1. For forfeiting any bail or collateral that was given to secure appearance in court for trial on a charge of violating any law that provides for suspension or revocation of an operator's license upon conviction.

2. For operating a motor vehicle without being legally licensed to do so.

3. For operating an unregistered motor vehicle.

Proof of financial responsibility for the future may be furnished by depositing with the Texas Department of Public Safety a certificate showing ownership of an insurance policy that will cover damage claims resulting from a traffic accident, up to \$15,000; by depositing \$15,000 in cash or securities with the Department; or by posting bond with the Department in the same amount.

"I think it must be evident to the public by this time that our new Safety Responsibility Law really means business in assuring greater safety and security on our streets and highways," Director Garrison said. "The requirement of permanent proof of financial responsibility is, of course, in addition to the penalties that are provided by the traffic laws themselves. This is one of the provisions of the new law that is going to help us put chronic law violators and accident causers off the road permanently."



Switchgrass is a vigorous perennial, sod-forming grass, and usually grows 3 to 5 feet high. The stand looks like a colony rather than sod. The flowering head is a widely branching open cluster. The leaves are usually from one-fourth to one-half inch wide and 6 to 18 inches long.
