According to the report of the State Revenue Agent, there are in Texas 1958 whiskey saloons and 2134 beer saloons; total, 4092. Ten dollars a day to each is, I take it, a moderate estimate, which is, in round numbers, forty thousand dollars a day. In thirty days it amounts to one million two hundred thousand dollars; for twelve months, fourteen million four hundred thousand dollars, or seven hundred thousand bales of cotton at twenty dollars a

But suppose we eliminate the beer saloons, and take only those that are licensed to sell alcoholic liquors, and for convenience call the number two thousand, which is but fair, because many of them licensed to sell only beer, sell liquor also. Their receipts must average twenty thousand dollars a day, one hundred thousand every five days, six hundred thousand dollars a month, and seven million two hundred thousand dollars a year, nine-tenths of which is absolutely worse than wasted.
